

THREE IN RACE FOR OFFICE OF MAYOR

**Simon, Munly and Kellaher
Will Try Conclusions in
June and H. R. Albee, Re-
publican, Might Possibly
Also Take a Chance.**

Three candidates, it is certain, will be in the race for election to the office of mayor of Portland at the municipal election in June. These are Joseph Simon, the Republican nominee of Saturday, June 10; H. R. Albo, the Democratic nomination; and Max Kellaher, who is to be an independent Republican candidate.

It is possible that this number may be increased to four by the addition of H. R. Albo, who has been mentioned as entering the race by his friends and who has not yet made up his mind whether or not he will enter the fray. Mayor Simon, who has been mentioned as refusing to be a candidate for reelection, will not be an independent candidate, but will be the official Munly, the nominee of the Democrats.

Albee, who is the Republican Party candidate, though he has not yet made up his mind whether he had better get into the race or not. His friends are urging him to do so, but he is not sure. The people in Portland who do not like the trend of the Simon candidacy and at the same time are not sure of the Republican viewpoint of Kellaker. It is being urged therefore that should Albee become a candidate these dissatisfied forces would give him the support necessary to win the election over one of the other candidates. Mr. Albee, however, has not as yet determined whether he will become a candidate.
