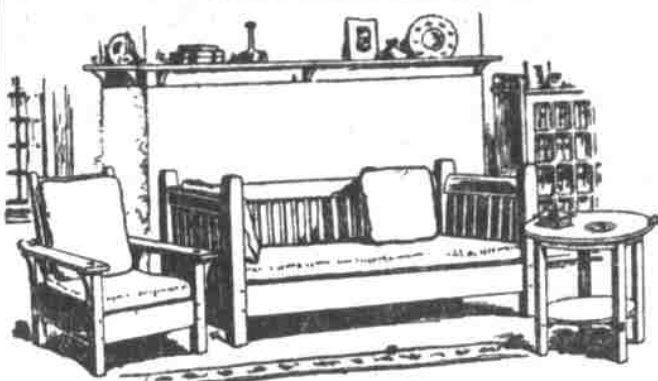

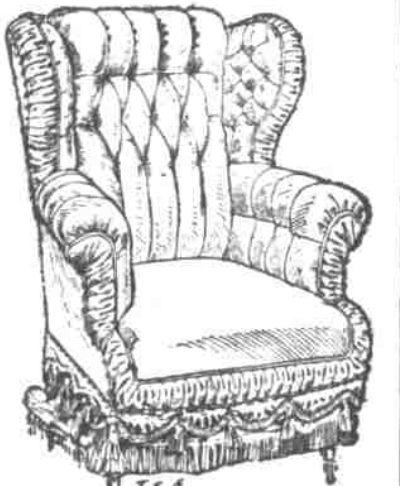

Immense Wealth.

Adrian Iselin was the founder of the banking house of A. Iselin & Co. of 38 Wall street. At the outbreak of the civil war his firm had gained such strength that it helped to finance the government. At his death Mr. Iselin's wealth was estimated at upwards of \$20,000,000.

Adrian Iselin left seven children, of whom C. Oliver Iselin is the eldest and consequently succeeded his father as head of the family and of the great banking house.

The large interests of the family are invested principally in railroads and mining stocks and real estate. Socially the family has for years ranked among the first in New York. C. Oliver Iselin is noted as a sportsman and particularly as a yachtsman. It was he who successfully defended the America's cup in the international yacht races against the Valkyrie and the Ino.

Adrian Iselin is erected a handsome

Catholic church in New Rochelle and was a liberal giver to that church, though himself not a Catholic. His wife, however, was a very devout member of that faith, and all her children, some and daughters were brought up in that faith.
