WALSH APPEAL IS ON HEARING

Last Resort of Great Bank Wrecker to Keep Out of Prison.

Chicago, May 11.—Before Judge Grosscup, Baker and Seaman, in the United States circuit court of appeals, arguments were begun today in the appeal of John R. Walsh, who was convicted some months ago of misappropriating the funds of the Chicago National bank, of which he was president.

That Walsh intends to keep up a vigorous fight for his freedom is evidenced by the fact that he has retained David S. Rose, mayor of Milwaukee, and one of the acknowledged leaders of the Milwaukee bar, as associate counsel, with John S. Miller, the eminent Chicago lawyer who has had charge of Walsh's case from the start. If all efforts of counsel fail, then the former banker and railroad president must serve his sentence of five years in the federal prison at Fort Leavenworth.

Public interest in the Walsh case was revived a week or so ago when the Chicago National bank was brought out in the reorganization in the affairs of Peter Van Vliet, the Chicago real estate man who was sent to prison for forgery aggregating nearly \$3,000,000. But whether Walsh had knowledge of the Van Vliet case, or whether he was the public exposure of the real estate man's misdeeds, as other men of more than average prominence in Chicago financial circles are alleged to have had, did not develop at the hearing.

Walsh is believed to have but a meager amount left of his once large fortune. The failure of his bank preceded his own downfall and since then he has seen two Indiana railroads for which he made such great sacrifices pass into the control of others. Until the crash came he was reckoned among the wealthiest financiers in the west. Starting his career as a homeless newsboy he had grown to be a millionaire several times over. His ambition to become a railroad magnate finally got the better of his judgment, and eventually brought about his ruin.

The grand jury investigation which led to his indictment showed amazing conditions of rotteness in Walsh's bank. It was charged that he put the bank's

there are 18,000,000,000 feet of lumber in the tracts tributary to Raymond, in Chehalis and Lewis counties.

The oyster industry is another growing business there. There are about 5000 acres of oyster beds under cultivation, with about 20,000 acres more capable of such cultivation.

Real estate is just becoming an important factor in Raymond's affairs, and lots are now selling from \$100 to \$300 and more for home sites.

Kelso Citizens Show Appreciation.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Kelso, Wash., May 11.—The Portland business men's excursion train arrived at Kelso promptly on time at 12:54 yesterday afternoon, and remained 15 minutes. The greater number of excursionists visited the new opera house, which has a seating capacity of 500, and in a very creditable structure, where they listened to a few words of welcome from W. H. Hubbell and a response by Tom Kelso.

Kelso is a thriving town of 2500 people on the Cowlitz river, one of the finest logging streams in this God favored country. The principal industry is lumbering, there being four shingle mills and four sawmills. The Cowlitz is navigable for light draft vessels, but all of the lumber and timber has to be lightered to the Columbia river for shipment west and to coast markets. The people are all interested in deeper water on the Cowlitz, and they believe Portland can, and should, help them to get it.

If Congress will give them a pailty \$75,000, and there are some signs of it being done, the Cowlitz can be considerably deepened from Kelso and Castle Rock to deep water on the Columbia, and vessels could then come for cargoes to be carried to deep water ports.

Entertained at Chehalis.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Chehalis, Wash., May 11.—Right on time the business men's excursion train arrived at Chehalis at 3:25 yesterday afternoon, departing at 5:15. A large crowd, accompanied by the State Training school band, greeted the Portlanders as they piled off the train. Mayor William West, of Chehalis, acted as spokesman. Mr. West is a pioneer, who came west 50 years ago. He made a brief but interesting talk prior to introducing E. B. Piper, managing editor of the Oregonian, who responded in a five minute speech.

Following the speeches the excursionists visited the publicity bureau, where they were given data on the resources of the Chehalis river. They were then conducted through the town, visiting the milk condenser, which handles 45 tons of milk a day; the door factory, whose output of 1800 doors a day is sold in all parts of the United States; and to a large furniture factory, employing more

than 80 persons. Chehalis is quite an industrial hive, with a population of 5000.

Winlock's Lumbering Industry.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Winlock, Wash., May 11.—The business men's train rolled into Winlock at 2:22 and out again at 2:40 p. m. The short time was employed in a walk and look around town. Lumbering is about the only industry. Winlock is a growing, hopeful place and there are quite a number of Oregonians in business here. The Van Ness Lumbering company is located here and is a very large and flourishing enterprise. Mr. Van Ness is identified with Portland and is enthusiastically appreciative of the effort to get better acquainted.

Towns are thick on the Cowlitz. From Kelso to Navasine the distance is 23 miles, with Castlerock, Spenah and Winlock in between.

14 Minutes at Castlerock.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Castlerock, Wash., May 11.—Fourteen minutes was the time allotted to Castlerock, with the view of getting "better acquainted." This is another of the Cowlitz towns where timber is king. The people all seem pleased that Portland has them in mind and are anxious to do their part in the upbuilding. The present condition of the lumber markets is not such as to make much activity, but the people are hopeful that better times are soon to come, and they will be quick to make the most of it. The Cowlitz appears to be alive with logs, which is attributable to the present slow demand.

On Time at Spenah.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Spenah, Wash., May 11.—As prompt as the clock the special train reached Spenah at 1:55 p. m., and remained five minutes. There the excursionists found one of the largest sewer pipe, drainage pipe and tiling works in the west. It is owned by the Westcoast Pipe and is operated full time. There is no shortage of timber around Spenah.

MRS. EVANS NABS SEVEN HAWKERS

Accuses Them of Disposing of Old and Decayed Strawberries.

Ninety-six crates of badly decayed strawberries were seized from seven hawkers and condemned by Market Inspector Sarah A. Evans last night. They were being sold to the large number of working people returning home when Mrs. Evans came upon them. M. M. Genoman, 31 North Sixth, A. A. Lukovsky, 588 Fourth, H. Schwartz, 251 Hooker, Moses Hafter, 1237 Kelly, W. Chelofsky, 621 First, V. Wageman, 647 Fifth and S. Letun, 435 First, were the men whose berries were seized. Mrs. Evans has sworn to prosecute the hawkers with violating the pure food law.

The hawkers were disposing of their crops in the downtown shopping district and were using as customers the large number of homebound workmen frequenting the streets between the hours of 5 and 6. The berries were in very bad shape being largely a decayed mass excepting the first layer.

BOYS VOLUNTEER TO PARADE AND SING

Two hundred and fifty boys volunteered to march in the east side parade of the Rose Festival at a special assembly called at Washington high school yesterday. They are to march behind their baseball team singing the "1912 Booster Song."

NOTED CHIEF'S BODY IS RECOVERED FROM THE UMATILLA RIVER

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Pendleton, Or., May 11.—The fear that Palouse Chief Hoosis-Mox-Mox had been drowned in the Umatilla river, near Cayuse, was confirmed when the body of the chief was recovered yesterday from that stream. It was on Thursday of last week that the chief, who was 38 years old, attempted to ford the Umatilla river on his little Indian pony. Later in the day the pony was found on the bank of the stream, the saddle being still wet.

The body was found yesterday lodged against some driftwood about a mile below the crossing where the Indian lost his life.

The passing of Chief Hoosis-Mox-Mox is historic, in that he was almost the last of Palouse Indians in the northwest, there probably being not more than a score of them remaining.

The chief was well known and respected among the whites, and was one of the few who were friendly to them during the Nez Perce and other Indian uprisings here in the early days.
