

TUBERCULOSIS FIGHTERS MEET

Annual Convention at Washington—Straus Says Watch the Cows.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Washington, May 12.—Tuberculosis in New York has increased 33 per cent in two years, according to an assertion made by Nathan Straus of New York in a letter read at the fifth annual meeting of the National Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis, which convened at the New Willard hotel here today.

Straus declared that his assertion was borne out by the official statistics of New York. The reason for this increase, he said, was that dairy cows were neglected. He said the abolition of tuberculosis would begin only when it was made a crime to sell milk from tubercular cows unless it had been properly pasteurized. Hon. J. C. Folger, vice president of the association, presided at today's meeting. The sessions of the association will continue throughout the week.

The convention has assembled at the New Willard hotel for a three days session. Nearly all parts of the country are represented in the attendance, which embraces many prominent medical men, educators, sociologists and others.

Reports showing gratifying progress during the past 12 months will be presented. Since the last annual meeting a large amount of work has been accomplished by the organization. One of the events of the year which was planned and carried out by the association was the successful meeting of the international antituberculosis congress in this city.

Another feature of the year's work of the association has been its traveling exhibits. Three of these exhibits are now conducted by the association and during the past year they were displayed in a large number of cities. As a direct result of these efforts, the legislatures of Kansas, Tennessee and Nebraska have passed laws and made appropriations to carry on the campaign against consumption.

SON AND FATHER DIE IN MIDNIGHT FIRE

Lewiston, Idaho, May 12.—George Brammer and his son met death early yesterday morning when fire completely destroyed their home, located near Gifford, a small town 30 miles south-east of here. The cause of the fire will never be known as the victims were the only occupants of the house and both were dead when assistance arrived. It is supposed to have caught from a defective flue. Foul play is not suspected. Some money was found in the ruins and the family were never known to have had an enemy.

George, the son, made his home with his father, who lived across the road from the Brammer home, and occasionally went home to stay all night with his father. He went home at the usual time last night and neighbors saw light in the house as late as 11, indicating that the family had not retired.

Brammer Sr. was a prominent man in the county, having served one term as county commissioner.

Another son was spending the night with relatives some distance from home. No inquest was held. The victims will be buried today.

J. P. MORGAN TO VISIT THE COAST

And Harriman to Go to Europe, It Is Said, to Raise \$150,000,000.

(United Press Leased Wire.)

San Francisco, May 12.—Following his investment of \$10,000,000 in California securities J. P. Morgan is coming to the Pacific coast this summer, according to an announcement made here today. It is believed his visit has significant bearing upon the stupendous financing that is being undertaken by E. H. Harriman for his railroad systems.

Harriman, it is learned, is going to make a trip to Europe in the near future with the intention of bringing back \$150,000,000 of foreign capital for his railroads. Morgan's connection with this plan has not been made public but it is understood he is taking great interest in the project.

Another proposition in which Morgan will interest himself while in San Francisco is the contemplated erection of a Protestant Episcopal cathedral here. It is understood he has promised Bishop Nichols \$100,000 to be used for this purpose.

Historic Dance Hall Burned.

Tonopah, Nev., May 12.—The most notorious dance hall in the west was wiped out of existence last night when fire destroyed the Big Casino. The property loss is estimated at \$25,000. There was no insurance. A bill was introduced at the last session of the legislature aimed at the Big Casino. The measure provided that all dance halls be abolished. The Big Casino building was the training quarters for Hart, Schreck, Gans and both Sullivan at different times.
