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CUE FROM SQUAW BRINGS TROUBLE

Indian Brave Saves Son-in-law but Now Faces Perjury Charge.

A father-in-law's affection won liberty for Walter Bomson today but sent his son-in-law to jail. Following the example of Kookoyeah, an Indian woman, in testifying for the benefit of her son, John Mitchell, Joe Allen, an Indian policeman from the Umatilla reservation, gave evidence calculated to save his son-in-law from conviction in federal court on a charge of stealing a valuable saddle from Bomson. Before the federal grand jury Allen stated that Bomson had taken the saddle without permission, and after using it in riding to Pendleton, then pawned it for the purpose of getting money enough to go on what the Indians call a "good drunk." After two days, Bomson having failed to return, Allen testified in federal court on a charge of stealing a valuable saddle from Bomson. Before the federal grand jury Allen stated that Bomson had taken the saddle without permission, and after using it in riding to Pendleton, then pawned it for the purpose of getting money enough to go on what the Indians call a "good drunk."
