Started Catholic Sentinel.—John F. Atkinson, formerly of this city, the founder of the Catholic Sentinel, died at his home in Brooklyn, N. Y., April 30, at the age of 67 years, from a paralytic stroke following Bright's disease. Mr. Atkinson was well known in this city to which he came in 1867. He was employed for two years in newspaper work, and then founded the Catholic Sentinel with the late Henry Herman. During the past few years Mr. Atkinson had made his home in Brooklyn. His wife, by whom he is survived, was Miss Mary Stevens, whom he married in this city in 1871. Of the four children three survive, Rosa, Edward and Josephine. Mr. Atkinson's brother, Edward, is a resident of this city.

CHILDREN WILL MARCH IN PARADE
