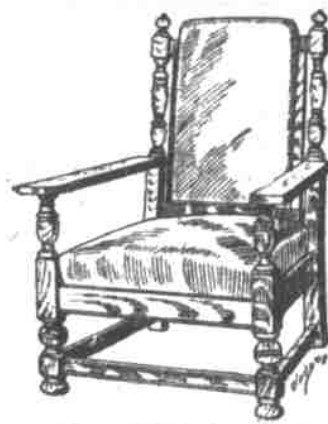
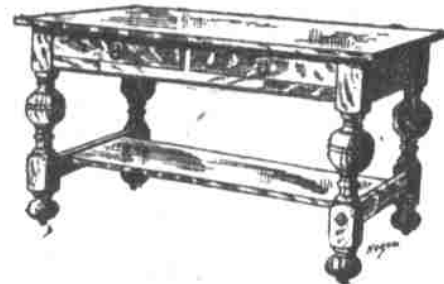

**EIGHT INJURED
ON SCENIC ROAD**

Car Jumps Track on Sharp Curve in Tunnel and Overturns.

The opening of the Council Crest scenic railway was marred yesterday afternoon by an accident in which eight people were injured, one of them seriously. The car, loaded with the sightseers, turned a somersault on a sharp curve in the tunnel, catching the occupants underneath and dragging them for a short distance before the momentum allowed the mass to stop.

Those who were injured were Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Nelson, Mrs. Beryl Ray and Mrs. Mabel Rogers, both of 387 Montgomery street; daughters of Mr. and Mrs. Nelson; C. H. Douglas, 351 1/2 Morrison; I. B. Chipman, 291 1/2 Beach street; C. Hastings, 308 Occident street, and "Shorty" Sutton, driver of the car. Mrs. Nelson was the most badly in-

jured of the eight, having three ribs broken, her thumb broken near the joint, a bad gash out on her head, besides other numerous bruises. J. E. Nelson suffered a badly wrenched arm and back and was badly shaken up generally. Mr. and Mrs. Nelson were both taken to the Good Samaritan hospital. Mrs. Nelson is still there, though she is doing as well as could be expected and will recover. Mr. Nelson returned to the home of his daughters last night and is about today, though pretty badly used up.

Mrs. Ray's Eye Injured. Both Mrs. Ray and Mrs. Rogers were badly bruised. Mrs. Ray has a badly battered right eye, and is bruised and suffering from the shock. Mrs. Rogers has a badly battered face and is covered with bruises and is yet suffering from the shock of her experience.

The other excursionists were scratched and bruised but not seriously injured.

A. Duchamp, the owner of the amusement park at the crest told of the accident this morning. The scenic road is held as a concession by the L. O. Thompson Scenic Railway company of New York. It is in charge of Harry Hile of Portland, who however has been ill with the grip for the past week and was not at the grounds yesterday. His place was taken by Homer Finley, who was in charge at the time of the accident.

From the landing stage the road plunges into a tunnel and then out on a winding course over trestles and along cuts and grades along the hill-

side, back to the landing stage and then around for a second sweep. The cars are run by gravity.

"The car runs through the tunnel twice," explained Mrs. Ray this morning. "On the first trip it runs over one track on a wide curve and on the second trip runs on a track laid inside of the curve of the first track. This makes the curve very sharp and when we reached the curve yesterday the car suddenly turned over onto the outside track, catching the passengers underneath it and dragging them along for a short distance before it stopped. Had another car been just starting on its trip some one would have been killed, for the overturned car was directly on the first track and in the tunnel, so that it could not have been stopped in time to prevent running over those thrown out of the wrecked car. It is very lucky, in my opinion, that no one was injured worse than they were."
