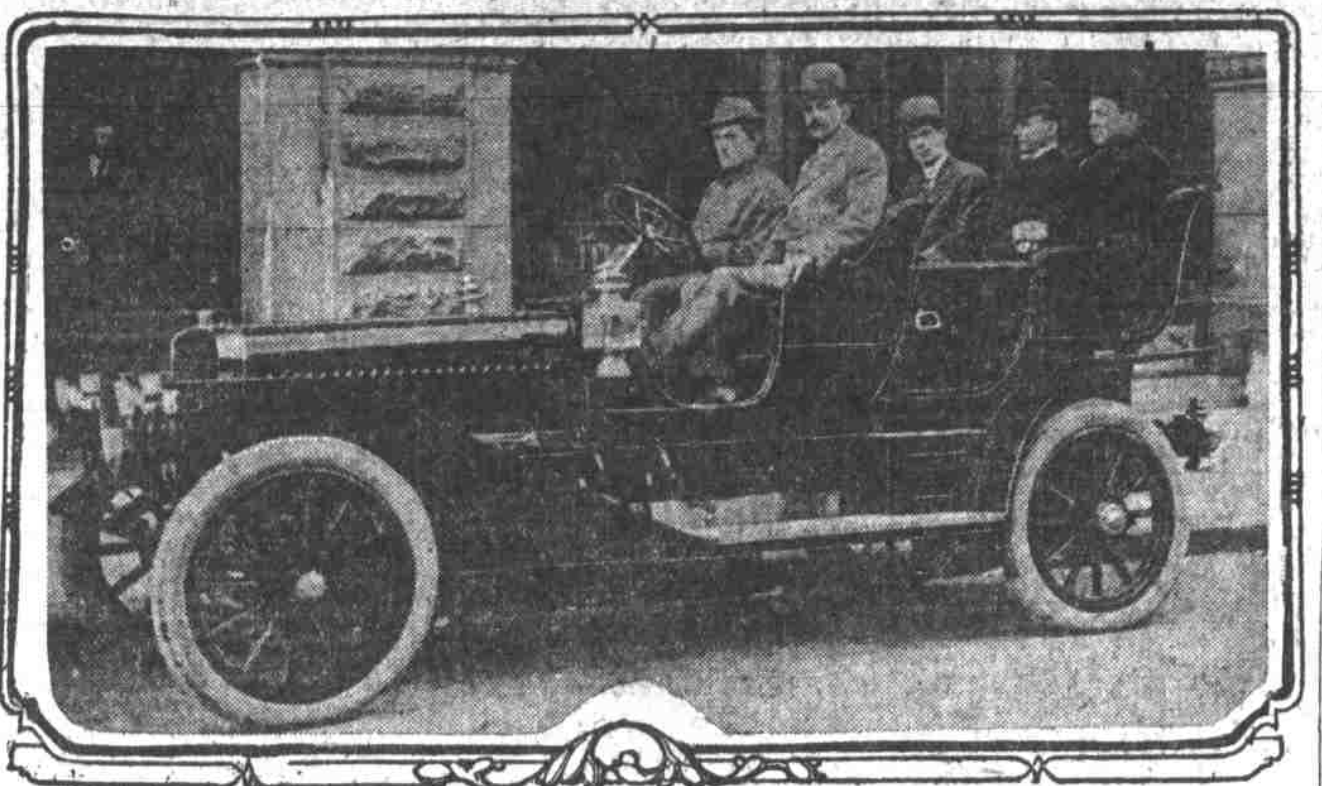

the oil fields at Oil City, Pa., where he invested his first \$400 of hard savings. From that time on, he was a millionaire. Rogers was worked out as naturally as water runs down hill.

Brains of Big Trust.

Known by the world as the brains of the Standard Oil company, as "rogue" and "king" of the oil business, as a "Bengal tiger" deprived of prey, the human side of the great financier has been lost to his generation. He has been watched by the men and women who know him as a man in the little New England town. To the people of Fairhaven, who have watched his sensational rise in power, Henry H. Rogers was plain "Hen" Rogers, a nickname which fastened itself to him as a schoolboy and from which he never tried to escape. In the crude schoolhouse the desk where Rogers sat and studied was deeply carved with the name which was to cling to him through all the years of his greatness, and he was quick to see the value of the desk and preserved it carefully. That old desk and a faded report which he received at the hands of the old teacher of the school over 30 years ago, are part and parcel of the Rogers estate, which money could not buy. It is told of Henry that as a boy at school he had the habit of copying from other pupils until a bad failure showed him the necessity of being thorough, a fault he never again tolerated.

The Game Learned Early.
To Henry H. Rogers life was but the continuation of the game of war which he learned in his boyhood days in Fairhaven. He organized armies, instructed brigades, commanded regiments, with the air of a general. And the life which was so busy that no time could be taken to cultivate popularity was filled with the same traits and with an added element of foresight seldom equalled.

Whatever may be said derogatory of Henry H. Rogers as manager of the greatest interest in the United States, his life was that of a faithful boy to his mother and a true friend to those who trusted him. From the time when duties first called him from the old home at Fairhaven until death called his mother, Henry H. Rogers never missed a Thanksgiving dinner at home with her, and never a day passed, no matter how pressing his duties, that he did not speak with her, either personally or by letter.

The ambition of Mr. Rogers' life was to make his birthplace an ideal town. Following this idea, in 1885 he made his first gift, Fairhaven, and his benefactions now consist of splendid streets, a magnificent stone church, a large public park, a public library, town hall, schools and a high school. For many years he was the superintendent of streets and maintained an assistant in the little town to keep the thoroughfares in perfect condition.

Prompt and Energetic.

In business life Mr. Rogers was prompt and energetic. An inveterate worker, he went to his office at 10 o'clock every week day morning, hurried through an immense amount of work and went directly home in the evening. He has one son, Henry D. Rogers, who has not been taught to make money, but to save it. Mr. Rogers' private secretary was a young lady who had performed the duties for many years, and is said to be the highest paid confidential secretary in the world.

At the time of his death, Mr. Rogers was vice president and one of the heavy stockholders of the Standard Oil company, president and director of the Amalgamated Copper company, of the National Transit company, of the Richmond Light & Railroad company, vice president and trustee of the Ancon Copper Mining company, vice president and director of the Brooklyn Union Gas company, of the United Metals Selling company, trustee of the Mutual Life Insurance company of New York, of the United States Steel corporation, of the Atchafalaya, Topeka Santa Fe and the Milwaukee railways, and held official positions in perhaps a score of other corporations.

DISTRICT ATTORNEY PREVENTS LYNCHING

Hillsboro, Or., May 19.—So strong was sentiment favoring lynching of John D. Rosclair, because in Hillsboro that the crowds gathered last night, apparently bent on revenge. When the conditions were understood, District Attorney Tongue hastened to address the crowd, urging earnestly that the law be allowed to take its course. Rosclair's trial, a fair trial of the case would be held without unnecessary delay. The assurance of the officer seemed to allay the popular passion and further trouble was averted.

In the county jail Rosclair quailed before the impending danger. Inquiring anxiously about the possibility of a mob, he would tremble in terror and try to gain assurances from Sheriff Hancock that he would be protected. Rosclair's daughter has arrived from Sacramento, and was granted an interview with her father. The awful tragedy is about all she can bear, and friends of her father are comforting her and giving assurance of help in the trial which will be on shortly.

Rosclair maintains his stolid demeanor about the murder of his wife. While he speaks freely of other things, he never mentions the tragedy, and does not seem to notice the conversation that he would be protected. KILLS WIFE THEN CREMATES BODY

Bride of 3 Days Hid Louis H. Worley's Purse, Writes Dead Murderer.

Prineville, Or., May 19.—Finding his purse in the stocking of his bride of three days was too much for Louis H. Worley, a Crook county rancher, so he murdered the woman and shot himself. The story is told by a tell tale note which the dead man pinned to the gatepost of his dearest friend whom he wanted to make the discovery and send out information of the tragedy. The note follows:

"Mr. Lamb—This is all a mistake. Ruth said this morning she did not want to live with me, she did not like it here. This morning my money was missing. I did not say she took it until I was certain nobody else took it. She asked me how far it was to Shaniko and this morning she said she was going to Shaniko to earn a living and go back east again. I treated her as good as I could and then robbing me of all my money and going to leave me—I could not stand it any longer, so think we are both better dead."

"Please let my sister know I. Address Lessemr Beaufort, R. F. D. No. 2, Franklin, Mo. Also let Mr. Burkhardt, his neighbor and Bert Friend know. Dear Mr. Lamb, you are not to blame for any of this. Before God, I just found my purse in Ruth's stocking with all my money, and she denied it. This is more than I can stand, so good-bye all. Come and you will find us."

"L. H. WORLEY."

The note was pinned to the gatepost of J. E. Lamb, neighbor of Worley, before his marriage and who brought about the acquaintance which culminated in the wedding. Lamb did not find the note until after the tragedy had been discovered by other neighbors.

Covered Body with Grain.

After killing his bride it seems Worley carried from 100 to 200 bundles of bound grain from a stack near the barn and piled it over the body, so the cremation might be complete. He apparently feared that the burning house would not create flame enough to do the work as thoroughly as he wished. From a stack of grain a large quantity of bundles had been taken, the grain having been carried toward the house, a litter of straw showing the course followed. It required hours to move the bundles of grain. This must have been done secretly.

This accomplished, Worley must have gone to the home of his neighbor, Lamb, Saturday night, pinned the note upon the gatepost and then gone to his own death in the barn.

The married life of the couple must have been stormy from the wedding day. The ceremony occurred Wednesday at the home of J. E. Lamb. Friday the Worley house was dark and it is probable that the murder was committed that day. Officers are slow to believe that money was the cause of the trouble, as but \$10 and some change was found.

ACTION WITHHELD ON REFERENDUM

Secy. of State May Refuse to File Petition Against Circuit Judgeship.

Salem, Or., May 19.—Mandamus proceedings will probably be necessary to compel the secretary of state to file the referendum presented at the office yesterday, which has for its object the repeal of the law passed at the last session of the legislature creating an additional circuit judge for Multnomah county, which office is now being filled by Judge W. N. Gatenes.

Governor Benson has the matter under consideration and will not place the petition on file. He has been in consultation with the attorney general and his decision will be announced tomorrow. In order to give those who wish the petition opportunity to act.

The act which it is desired to have referred to the people carried an emergency clause. The petitioners are working on the hypothesis that the emergency clause is invalid. If it becomes necessary to bring mandamus proceedings to compel the secretary of state to file the petition, it will involve the question of the validity of the emergency clause and the entire matter will be finally determined.

It is with this object in view that the secretary of state will undoubtedly refuse to file the petition.

ILLINOIS ALUMNI FORMS ASSOCIATION

At a meeting held Monday night in the office of John Guy Wilson, Chamber of Commerce building, an association was formed of the graduates of the University of Illinois located within and around the city of Portland. More than 200 graduates of this state university have located in this part of Oregon within the past three or four years. The alumni association as formed tends to cooperate with the university of Illinois organizations already existing in the cities along the Pacific coast in entering the many Illinois graduates and students who will visit Portland and the northwest the coming summer and fall.

MEHEMMED MAY BE FORCED OUT

Young Turks Plan to Alter Succession Rule and Oust Him at the Same Time.

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Constantinople, May 19.—If legislation favored by the Young Turks meets the approval of the parliament, the time honored Turkish law of succession to the throne may be annulled.

According to the present law, on the death of the monarch the crown goes to the senior descendant of the founder of the dynasty. This procedure almost invariably results in the raising to power of an elderly or failing man. The Young Turks want young, energetic and virile rulers. They want adopted the general European law of succession that provides for the coronation of the senior son of the former monarch.

If this legislation is enacted before the death of the present sultan, there is every probability that Mehemmed V. will be asked to seal the amendment with his approval and abdicate in favor of a prince of greater physical vigor and more in touch with the ideas of the modern world.
