

GRAFT TAIN ON PULLMAN COLLEGE?

Representative Beach Says That School Authorities Drew Interest on Federal Funds—Other Phases of Investigation.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Olympia, Wash., May 20.—After scratching around the edges for nearly a month the muck-rake is to be used vigorously, not only about the capitol, but throughout the state institutions and departments until every jot and tittle of suspicion shall have been investigated.

Following his threat made at the last legislature, when the investigation was first suggested and urged, Representative Beach of Mason county has filed charges against 17 state departments and boards with the investigation committee, asking that a full and open investigation be made of the expenditure of money for which deficiency appropriations were

asked and secured from the last session of the legislature.

During the discussion of the matter before the senate and the house, Dr. Beach, who was easily leader of the anti-local option interests in the house and one of the forceful men of the legislature, opposed every intimation of investigation with all his might, but he repeated time and again that if the probe was to be driven at all it should be used with all the vigor at the command of the people of the state of Washington.

Criminal Action Charged.

Representative Beach sets out clearly that the state laws provide a penalty for any state officer who creates a deficiency, calls attention to the deficiency, appropriates money for the deficiency, or for the state printer, land office, railroad commission, deaf and dumb school, both hospitals for the insane, normal schools and state fair, and urges the commission to investigate the need of such appropriations and punishment of officers if guilty.

Including Hamilton's shortage, the total deficiency for the last period were \$148,000.

Following are the officers for which deficiency appropriations were made at the last legislative session:

Large Deficiencies Shown.

Railroad commission, \$2000; governor for exposition, \$3500; horticultural commissioner, \$1855; land commissioner, \$1000; office for investigation, \$1000; public printer, \$30,000; secretary of state (Nichols, recently deceased), \$200; state superintendent, \$100; state fair of Washington, \$10,699; western Washington hospital for insane, \$15,000; Bellingham normal, \$1733; Cheney normal, \$1307; deaf and blind school, \$8000; Eastern Washington hospital for insane, \$15,000; Ellensburg normal, \$1655; state library, \$1555.

State College Involved.

Setting out in detail some of the facts he wants considered, Dr. Beach makes his most serious charge against the State college at Pullman. A peculiar report about this fund is the statement purported to come from Bernard and other regents that this money was being retained until it aggregated \$1000, when it was to be used for a regent's prize for scholarship at the school. There has been decided criticism of this suggestion from several quarters.

Work Going on Rapidly.

The investigating committee has finished checking up the books of State Treasurer Lewis and the task of going over the office of State Superintendent Dewey is now under way. Dewey's office was run at heavy expense during the past two years but the school work of the state was being organized on new lines and there is a not much likelihood of discrepancies being found in his books.

Interest now centers in the report which it is understood the committee will make to Governor Hay relative to the Schively case. Just how much material matter will be included in this report is not even surmised, but it will likely contain some facts which will startle the people of the state. Between the investigation committee and the Spokane grand jury Schively has been kept busy for several weeks, giving but little time to the work of his office.

A meeting of the committee and Governor Hay has been arranged for today, perhaps late this afternoon, when it is supposed an understanding will be reached covering the future actions of the executive. This conference will determine whether or not a special session of the legislature will be called.

Wreck Delays N. P. Traffic.

Prosser, Wash., May 20.—All east-bound trains on the Northern Pacific railroad were held at this station for nearly three hours yesterday afternoon because of a small freight wreck two miles east of here. In coming around a reverse curve the caboose and one of the local freight cars were bound left the track and turned completely over. Conductor O. F. Benjamin was in the caboose at the time of the accident, but he escaped serious injury.

"AIR OFFICE" IS TO BE CREATED

Through This England Is to
Strive for Aeronautic
Supremacy.

(United Press Leased Wire.)

London, May 20.—If plans favored by War Minister Haldane and other high officials carry, England will soon boast of a unique institution in the nature of an "air office."

The recent British awakening to the advisability of aeronautic experiments is reaching into the war office, and Haldane and his associates are determined that England shall be brought from her present obscure position in the world of aeronautics to a plane worthy of her advancement in other lines.

The new "air office" theoretically will be committed to the joint supervision of the war and navy departments, but it is thought that some qualified individual will be chosen to assume the responsibilities of its head. Captain R. H. S. Bacon, director general of ordnance and torpedoes, and Major F. S. Baden-Powell, of the balloon department of the royal engineers, are prominently mentioned for the post.

Haldane's theory is to combine the actual experiments with mathematical calculations and investigations of natural law. To accomplish this, arrangements have been made for the use of the national physics laboratory at Teddington. Instruction is to develop with experimental work in the laboratory.

PRISON AND PRISONERS

Its Principal Jail an Old Fort Filled With Dregs of Its Population.

During the Spanish regime, what is now prison quarters was an old fort. It is situated on a high hill commanding a splendid view of Havana and the harbor, and is surrounded by a high wall with a moat. There is also a swinging bridge, which can be lifted to cut off communication with the outer world. At present over 1400 male offenders against the law are incarcerated there, 75 of whom are serving life sentences. The majority of the prisoners are illiterate, and a school has been established in which over 500 men are being taught to read and write. This is apart from their daily labors. New buildings are in course of erection, and here the methods of our federal prisons have been followed, as the work is being done almost solely by the prisoners.
