PEACE MEN TALK AT LAKE MOHONK

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Lake Mohonk, N. Y., May 20.—Justice J. C. MacLaren of the Ontario supreme court discussed the boundary dispute between the United States and Canada in an address today before the Lake Mohonk conference on international arbitration. He dwelt upon the peaceful relations that have obtained along the border for 80 years.

Wu Ting Fang, the Chinese minister, spoke in favor of arbitration, declaring his country favored it.

"China strongly favors arbitration," he said, "and hopes that the day will soon come when compulsory arbitration will be made the law of nations."

Allen Baker, a member of the British house of commons, in an address before the conference said he believed England was the chief sinner against peace, because it was starting a mad race in building Dreadnaughts. He said the political situation was responsible for this and condemned the yellow press for sending out exaggerated reports of the continental situation.

IMPROVEMENT CLUB MEETS FRIDAY NIGHT

The question of changing the names of numbered east side streets running north and south by substituting the word avenue for street will also come up, and other important matters will be discussed. Full attendance is particularly requested.

CHICAGO REACHES ITS DEBT LIMIT

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Chicago, May 20.—With the issue of \$1,500,000 four per cent 20 year serial bonds to the First Trust and Savings bank, the city of Chicago has reached the limit of its bonded indebtedness. The bonds were awarded yesterday by City Controller Walter H. Wilson. They were sold at a premium of \$11,500 paid by the bank. The total bonded indebtedness of the city is now \$20,520,000 including \$4,233,000 of World's Columbian exposition bonds authorized by special act of the state legislature.

THE HARVEST OF DEATH

Percentage Higher Than for 1907 and Lower Than Several Nations.
From the Philadelphia Inquirer.
It is a matter of regret that the federal statistics as to mortality for the year 1907 show an increased percentage of deaths over the previous year. Only about one half of the population is covered by the statistics made public, and it is known that they are not complete. They are made up from the data secured in the various states, where the accuracy of reports varies widely. The statistics must therefore be accepted with some reserve, but they are instructive.

Taking the whole of the country on the basis of the half which reports, it appears that in 1907 the number of

deaths was almost a million and a half. It was probably greater than that, although it is figured out as 14.6 per 1000 for the whole country, which is exactly that of Pennsylvania. South Dakota gives only 9.8, which must be an error. The death rate as given is lower than in France, Prussia, Italy and Spain, but higher than in Great Britain, all of Scandinavia and the Netherlands. The mortality among males is much larger than among females, doubtless due largely to the greater number of violent deaths among the former. There were more than 50,000 violent deaths, of which 43,000 are given as accidental, 1,600 on the railways and 324 by automobiles, while the homicides totaled 2709 and the suicides 6745. The last figure is amazing.
