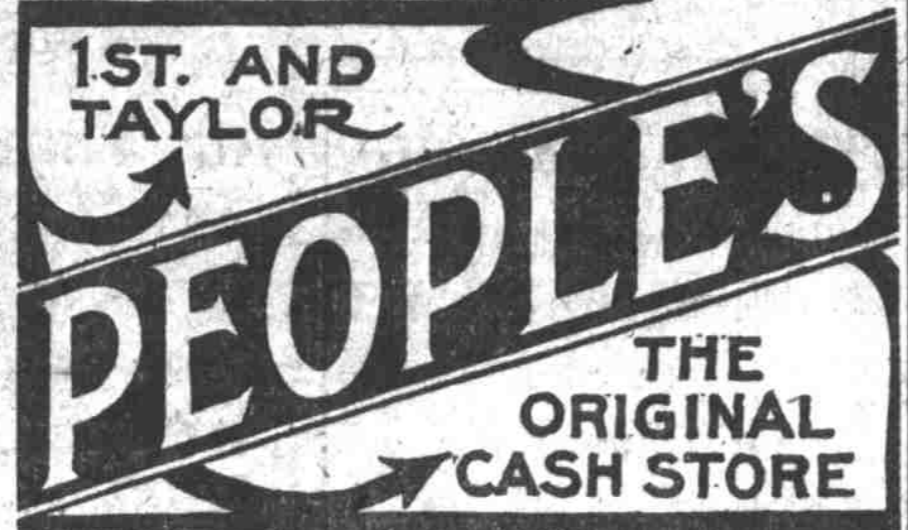

YOUNG TURKS AS WHITEWASHERS

Just the Same as Abdul, Where Armenians Are Concerned.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Constantinople, May 21.—Whitewashing the Mohammedans, the commission sent to Asia Minor to investigate the recent massacres there, in which more than 20,000 Christians were murdered, will make a report placing the actual blame for the bloody deeds upon the Armenian population, according to messages received here. The report will be based upon the commission's alleged belief that it has discovered an Armenian secret society which is plotting to overthrow the Turkish rule.

TACOMA MAN KILLED BY BARROOM ROBBER

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Tacoma, May 21.—After shooting down Carl Glock who was chatting with friends in the barroom of the Potomac hotel and ordering the wounded man propped up in a corner of the room with his hands held above his head, a bandit last night held several men with a revolver in his hand overhauled the saloon cash register and searched his victims' pockets. His entire loot amounted to little more than \$7 and a gold watch, snatched off the person of Frank Leonard. The desperado, who is described as being a young man and very tall, sat in the saloon during the entire early part of the evening, apparently moody. At exactly 10 o'clock he stepped to the rear room and was not noticed again until the shot rang out and Glock dropped to the floor. The man lined up the other six inmates of the saloon, ordering one of them to prop the wounded man in a corner. When this was done he scooped out the contents of the cash drawer, hurriedly searched his victims and disappeared through a rear door. Glock was taken immediately to a hospital and the police were notified. He had a flesh wound in his side and will recover in a few weeks. It is believed the desperado timed his deed, and that as soon as he had completed the work he boarded the 10:15 interurban for Seattle, which passed the saloon a few minutes after the holdup.

NATCHEZ TO WELCOME THE MISSISSIPPI

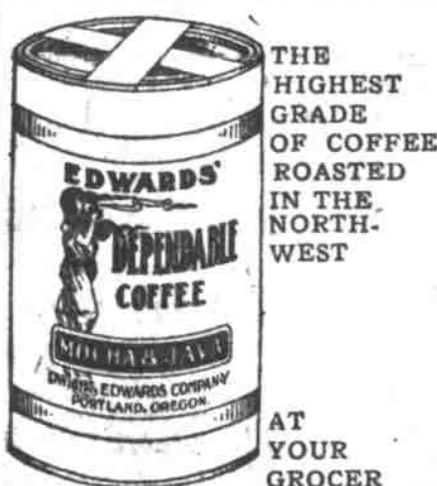

Conference on City Planning

Washington, May 21.—A national conference on city planning and improvement began in this city today and will continue over tomorrow. Delegates from many cities are in attendance. The papers and discussions are to treat of city planning in the widest sense, including all methods which must be adopted to insure the development of a city along economic, aesthetic and hygienic lines. Much attention is to be devoted to the consideration of the best method of restricting intensive building, so as to prevent overcrowding or congestion of population.
