Slipping easily down the ways, the first of the two new artillery tenders to be launched at the yards of the Willamette Iron & Steel works, splashed into the water promptly at 10:06 o'clock today. The other tender followed her sister ship at 10:30 o'clock.

As the first ship started to move, Miss Grace Baxter, the sponsor, stepped forward and broke the bottle of champagne over the bow of the tender at the same time saying: "I christen thee Captain James Fornace."

While the ship gathered momentum, the assembled spectators broke into cheers, and as she struck the water the whistles of the passing steamers greeted her advent into her proper element.

After the launching, friends of Miss Baxter stepped forward and congratulated her.

The towboat Weon, of the Hooford Transportation company's boat, was in service again this morning, after having been recalled. One of the seams opened the other night and allowed considerable water in the hold.

The Harriman liner Rose City, Captain Mason, sailed this morning for San Francisco, with 250 passengers and a full cargo of freight.

START CAMPAIGN WITH PAMPHLETS

A committee of hotel men attended the meeting yesterday and asked that they be allowed to present their claims for recognition concerning measures that affected them. This permission was granted and these measures will be heard and considered by the special committee.

NEW LANDS FOR THE HOMESEEEKER

Cheyenne, Wyo., May 22.—A new land of promise for the land hungry and the homeseekers was made available today by the opening of a large area of fine farming land in one of the most beautiful valleys in the west. The lands are embraced in the Shoshone irrigation project, which eventually will reclaim 60,000 acres of the Yellowstone National park in northern Wyoming. Since the first unit of this project, consisting of 15,000 acres, was opened a year ago, hundreds of settlers have located in the valley, and several flourishing towns have sprung up. The government has established the town of Powell in the center of the irrigable area, and the lots in this town were put up for sale at public auction today. This was done to give the homeseekers an opportunity to visit the project, file on his homestead and attend the town lot sale without loss of time.

The town of Powell is a promising future. It is situated on the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy railroad, midway between the towns of Garland and Railroad. It is a beautiful town, with a state bank, churches and schools, a hotel and several stores and lumber yards.

DAVID HAWLEY GETS GRILLING

Judge Van Zante Thinks He
Should Have Helped
Woman.

David J. Hawley, about 60 years of age, was the recipient of a severe grilling from Judge Van Zante in municipal court this morning for having had arrested on a charge of assault, Mrs. Ann Cawthorne, aged 80.

"You are absolutely devoid of any trace of human feeling," stated Judge Van Zante. "The old lady had every right to hit you and you are entitled to no consideration from this court. I want to hear no more from you. The case is dismissed right here."

Hawley had gone to the city attorney and sworn to a complaint charging that Mrs. Ann Cawthorne had assaulted him with a club and beaten him over the head. He did not tell the age of his assailant and so was given the complaint. The trouble appears to have arisen over a lot of wood which had been thrown on the lot adjoining the Cawthorne and Hawley homes on the east side. The aged woman, who is

none too well supplied with worldly goods, had been told by the owner to help herself and in doing so Hawley remonstrated.

On the witness stand this morning Mrs. Cawthorne stated that Hawley had told her to leave the wood alone and that when she refused, had grabbed her by the arm and attempted to force her from the woodpile. "Then I hit him," said Mrs. Cawthorne, "and now speaking directly to Hawley—"If I'd known where your brains were I would have hit at them."

Deputy City Attorney Sullivan also grilled Hawley for having neglected to tell her of the woman when he obtained the complaint. In summing up, Judge Van Zante told him if he had had one speck of humanity he would have himself carried the wood in for Mrs. Cawthorne.

Coos Grand Jury Indicts.
