(United Press Leased Wire.) Menlo Park, Cal., May 25.—Miss Eliza Weeden of this city wants a husband, and frankly has set about finding one that will measure up to the standard she has set. Masculine beauty, age, pedigree, however, are not numbered as requirements. One condition only must be met by the candidate. He must show a bona fide bank roll that will peel down to \$250,000.

TACOMAN BLOWS OUT BRAINS AT WENATCHEE

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Wenatchee, Wash., May 25.—The corpse of a man supposed to be J. M. Cunningham of Tacoma was found in the Great Northern depot at this city this morning. A revolver lay at his feet and there was a bullet hole in the left temple. At the coroner's inquest papers were found which virtually complete the identification. Cunningham was a carpenter. He had been here about two weeks. It was learned that he had been brooding over his inability to secure his food chest, which he had been waiting for to start work on a flume for the Val Halla Orchard company.

ARKANSAS MOB LYNCHES NEGRO

He Choked a White Girl Who Surprised Him Robbing House.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Pine Bluff, Ark., May 25.—Leavitt Davis, a negro, 25 years old, was lynched today by a mob of 300 white men. The negro confessed that he choked Amy Holmes, a 15-year-old white girl, who discovered him robbing her parents' home last Friday. He said he feared she would make an outcry and have him arrested. When news of the negro's confession got about town, a mob was quickly formed which took the negro from the authorities and quickly lynched him. Sheriff Philpott and his deputies tried to prevent the mob from hanging the negro but their pleading was in vain. The prisoner was taken from the jail and hanged to a telegraph pole in the business section of the town. There was no shooting and the mob did its work so quietly that the rest of the population knew nothing of the affair until they saw the body hanging from the pole this morning. No arrests have been made.

ROOSEVELTS TRAIL BUFFALOES; NO GAME

(United Press Leased Wire.) Nairobi, British East Africa, May 25.—Colonel Roosevelt and his party left Monday on a buffalo hunt. They trailed a herd of seven buffalo but rode for hours without getting a trace of the game. They had fine sport, however, shooting smaller game. Both the colonel and Kermit are in excellent health, having fully recovered from the slight indisposition they suffered when they first came to this country. Stories of illness which have attacked them are absolutely without foundation. Colonel Roosevelt will return to Nairobi tomorrow to visit Governor Jackson. He will remain here as a guest of the governor until June 2, when he will start southward in search of further hunting adventures.

FANATICAL INDIAN TORTURES WOMAN

San Bernardino, Cal., May 25.—Declaring her assailant insane from reading the tribal lore of his race and the researches of Stanford professors into the history of the ancient Indians, Gladys Wilkerson has grudgingly admitted that she submitted to torture at the hands of her paramour, Frank Lugo, an adopted Indian. Although suffering excruciating pain

from stab wounds, knife cuts and burns, she declared she allowed Lugo to weave a spell about her and that during the spell she suffered nothing from the barbarities practiced. When found she was moaning with pain. She had been bound in a corner of Lugo's room and a fire was started at her feet by the fanatical Indian. On her body were strange hieroglyphic resembling the figures found carved on cliffs and in caves of the desert. The authorities are seeking the Indian, who has fled. He is known to be armed and it is thought he will resist capture.

COMMANDER SCOTTISH RITE TOURS COAST

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, May 25.—Members of the Scottish Rite organizations of this city will tender a reception Saturday evening to James Daniel Richardson of Washington, D. C., sovereign grand commander of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite of Free Masonry. He arrived here from Fresno late yesterday. Richardson is touring the west in the interests of the lodge, and before returning to Washington, will visit Portland and the Scottish Rite bodies of Washington, Idaho and Montana.

MUSICIAN PARKER DIES AT SEA

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, May 25.—Maynard Parker, a Los Angeles musician, died of heart disease aboard the steamship Admiral Sampson off San Francisco. His remains were brought to the city morgue here today. Parker was on his way to Seattle to attend the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition.
