Talk on Temperance.—After a prayer service conducted by the president, Mrs. Neal Inman, Mrs. L. H. Addison gave an interesting talk on temperance and labor. She told of the interest Miss Willard took in this work and of a letter which she wrote to Mrs. Addison on the subject. She emphasized the industrial department and child labor effects, also the Consumers league which was organized here. She told of her efforts for the compulsory school law. She spoke of the sweatshop evil and the need of buying goods labeled by the Consumers league, which indicates that the goods are made under sanitary conditions. She said we should have a Saturday half holiday as is done in eastern cities, and it can be brought about if women buy their goods early in the day. She told of the need of girls having a family helpers club, where they can have society under safe conditions. The Christians shopping crusade is quite successful, and right papers, publishing articles against late Christmas shopping and being generally adopted. She advocated appointing a social secretary who should visit working girls and find out their needs. She spoke of the problem of the messenger boy and to get hold of their mothers. The working girl is another who should be helped. The need of distributing literature was emphasized. Next week will be a social meeting in charge of Mrs. C. C. Pouney.

Local Union of Christian Endeavors.—Friday evening in connection with the district convention and state rally of Christian Endeavors, the local union, at the First Congregational church. The address of the evening will be given by Henry Maronitis on the topic "Three Ideals of Life." G. Evert Baker will preside, and an especially interesting meeting is anticipated. The banner will be awarded the society having the largest percentage of members present. All young people are invited to attend.

Caught Playing Dice.—William Tupper was arrested for playing dice at the stage entrance of the Orpheum theatre last evening by Officer Roberts. When the officer entered the place he found four young men engaged in a crap game. Three left in a hurry, but Tupper was arrested and fined \$5 by Judge Van Zante this morning. He pleaded ignorance of the laws and said the game was a petty affair being carried on for amusement. Two ivory cubes and 50 cents in money was displayed as evidence.

Fire Destroys Repair Car.—One of the Portland Railway, Light & Power company's repair cars was burned in a fire arising from gasoline at 7:15 last evening. The car was engaged in fixing a broken trolley wire at Union avenue between Cook and Ivy streets when some gasoline being used in heating was ignited and set fire to the top of the car. The upper part of the car was damaged but the fire was destroyed before the body of it was destroyed.

Deputy Building Inspectors.—The council passed an ordinance yesterday afternoon, authorizing the appointment of two deputy building inspectors and naming some of the qualifications for these employees. Hereafter the civil service commission has been allowed to make its own requirements for city employees but the kind of men seen in many instances satisfied Mayor Lane or any other department head.

Sabin Requested to Run.—R. L. Sabin has been formally requested by over 100 prominent citizens to make the race for school director to succeed H. Wittenberg, who declines to become a candidate to succeed himself. A number of signed petitions have been presented to Mr. Sabin asking him to make the race, and it is understood that he has consented to take the matter under consideration. The annual school election will be held Monday, June 21.

Sells Three Flats.—R. L. Pittlakeau has sold the three two-story flats at the northwest corner of West Park and Mill streets to Henry White. Mr. Pittlakeau recently moved these buildings from the corner of Park and Taylor streets to make way for building a \$60,000 five-story brick apartment house, work on which is already under way. Mr. White paid \$21,000 for the group of buildings, which return a net income of about 8 per cent on the investment.

Hole Burned in Wall.—A small fire, which resulted in a hole about four feet square being burned in the wall, broke out in a peculiar manner at the residence of Mrs. D. Stuart, 885 Franklin street last evening. Mrs. Franklin had been heating a poultice and it caught fire. Thinking she had put the fire out, she threw the burnt rags on the back porch, only to have a fire break out a few minutes later.

Interesting Relief Map.—A relief map of Washington and portions of Oregon and Idaho, showing the relation of the North Bank road to the other lines in these states, is the attractive feature of a new folder issued by the larger department of the Spokane, Portland & Seattle railway. The map is printed in colors and is designed to show the advantages of the North Bank's easy grade to the sea.

Police Looking for Locksmith.—Herman Dubois, commonly called "Kruzer," is reported to have been missing for some time from his home at 308 Couch street. James Nathan, who also lives at that place, has asked the police to assist him in locating Dubois, whom he describes as being 40 years of age, short, stout and heavily bearded. He was a locksmith by trade. He has left a quantity of goods at Nathan's place and Nathan states he fears to keep these any longer as the nature of the goods is such that it has deteriorated with time and he now fears complaint by the board of health.

Gully of Playing Poker.—Judge Cleveland decided that Louis Cohen had been guilty of playing a game of poker, just as the municipal court thought he had, and therefore ordered the judgment of the lower court, which means that Cohen will have to add \$50 to the funds of the city. Cohen was arrested some time ago in Blaisie's saloon, where he had been playing poker for bar checks, and the good order for drinks or 12 1/2 cents in cash. He was committed to the municipal court and fined \$50, appealing the case to the circuit court.

Drops Dead on Street.—C. E. Borden, an employee of the Oregonian, died suddenly on the street at Williams avenue and Cherry street at 8:15 last evening. Mr. Borden, who lived at 112 South Depot street in St. Johns, was on his way home on a St. Johns car, at the time of his death. He was 55 years of age. He was married. When it was discovered that he was dying, a doctor was stopped and the man taken into the Finn pharmacy at Williams avenue and Cherry street, where he died a few minutes later. Heart failure is given as the cause of death.

Bids for Frame of Courthouse.—Bids for the steel work for the frame of the new courthouse will be asked for within a day or two at the Portland city and county commissioners, and the architect for the new structure will meet and decide upon the publication of the notice calling for the bids. As soon as the contracts have been let for the material the work of constructing the courthouse will be commenced and hurried to completion. A contract for painting the bridges across the river will also be let within a few days.

Horicultural Society Meeting.—The annual session of the State Horticultural society will convene at the Portland hotel this evening at 8 o'clock. The election of a new set of trustees and the adoption or rejection of a new plan of incorporation will be the principal business to come before the society. In order to enable the society to hold certain affairs which have been offered it has been decided to incorporate. The plan will come up tonight.

Dependent Youth Missing.—Percy Dibble, 21 years of age who is thought to be weak-minded and is known to have been decidedly dependent recently, is reported missing by his father, A. Dibble, from his home at 1213 Michigan avenue. He has been missing since Tuesday. He is described as being 5 feet 9 inches tall, with brown hair, medium colored complexion and is well built. When last seen he was wearing a black soft hat, blue trousers and a suit and pepper coat.

Leg Broken in Fall.—E. Hannum, of 550 Ryan street suffered a broken leg at East Twentieth and Taylor streets last evening through the overturning of a grocery wagon which he was driving. He was crossing the gulch when he struck a big rock and was hurled into the air, throwing him to the ground and the wagon striking on top of him. The left leg was broken just above the ankle. He was removed to his home in a Red Cross ambulance.

Will Sell Park Bonds.—The city council yesterday afternoon authorized the remaining \$500,000 of the \$1,000,000 park bond issue to be sold immediately. Of these bonds \$200,000 worth will be disposed of as soon as possible in order that the park board may have money to carry out projects that demand attention. The rest will remain unsold until this first appropriation is used.

WILL NEED LAND FOR EAST SPAN

New Obstacle to Construction of Madison Bridge Comes to Light.

Another delay in letting the contract for the Madison street bridge is confronting the bridge committee of the executive board. The appropriation of \$450,000 was for actual construction of the bridge, and does not permit of a diversion of the fund for the purpose of acquiring rights in the way.

D. C. O'Reilly and H. M. Burpee informed the committee at a special meeting yesterday that the approach of the new span for the bridge will cross a corner of block 11 on the east side of the river, and that it will take a 25 foot strip of their property, for which they ask a right of way at the rate of \$25,000 a quarter block.

Engineer E. H. Howard has prepared preliminary plans for the new bridge, and these plans did not make any allowance for land needed for the bridge approaches. O'Reilly and Burpee say that the city never did acquire a deed to the land occupied by the present approach on the east side, but that title to this has been obtained by adverse possession of it for a long period of years. It is now proposed to widen the approach from 40 to 45 feet. The cost of this has been estimated at \$100,000. But where is the money?

It has been suggested that the approach can be built temporarily of steel wide and later another appropriation secured to widen it and to buy a right of way. If this plan were adopted, it is the only solution yet offered. The plans made by the engineer will have to be remedied, and this will take more time, making it impossible to submit specifications for bidders until after the June election.

Owners of the ground in block 11 proposed that the city keep it, and in return give them property on the water front which at their own estimate is worth \$100,000. Mayor Lane is not at all inclined to fall in with the suggestion.

SCHOOL ELECTION TO BE HELD ON JUNE 21

Directors of school district No. 1 met yesterday afternoon in adjourned session and directed School Clerk R. H. Thomas to appoint officials for the annual school election June 21. Chairman Herman Wittenberg retires from the board this year and his place is to be filled.
