

PRESBYTERIANS DESIRE UNION

Olive Branch Waved Southward—Representation May Be Reduced.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Denver, May 29.—The next general assembly of the Presbyterian church in the United States will be held at Atlanta City, N. J. This was decided by the present assembly this morning by unanimous vote. The assembly was held at the First Presbyterian church, and the only contesting cities were Pittsburgh and Saratoga, but these were dropped before the vote was taken. In fact, it was the general understanding yesterday that Atlanta City would be the choice of the assembly. Another important matter was the passage of a resolution strongly endorsing the efforts of the nations of the earth to secure the permanent peace of the whole world. The resolution went through with a roar of genuine unanimity, as did the collateral resolution designating the Sunday just preceding Christmas for peace sermons to be preached by all the Presbyterians in the United States.

Wishes for Church Union.
Rev. J. D. Rankin read a few words of cordial greeting from the assembly in session in Atlanta, Ga., and expressed the hope that ere long the United Presbyterians would be absorbed by the Presbyterian church. To this the moderator replied in kind, and joined in the wish for a combination of the two churches. The sentiment was warmly applauded by the assembly.

Most emphatically does the Presbyterian assembly favor the reduction of the number of representatives to the annual gathering, but at the same time it placed itself on record as desiring of representing the communicants, or laymen, numbering 1,300,000, in the conferences of the body. By a vote of 267 to 219, it declared that the presbyteries should have presented to them for consideration the proposed reduction of the number of representatives to be based upon the number of ministers and communicants, and asks that during the following year the executive committee, headed by Dr. S. B. Nichols, ask for views upon this question, and as to whether they wish representation to be reduced.

The Good Live Long.
Although members, some of them declared that to adopt this method of representation would be to revolutionize the church, others declared it was revolutionary in the sense that the Boston tea party was revolutionary. The committee will report to the next assembly the will of the presbyteries on this question, and at that assembly the members will record their views in the matter when it will go to the presbyteries for final decision. The committee on resolutions presented its report today, which showed, as the Rev. F. R. Barrard of Oklahoma put it, that the good don't die young, but live to a ripe old age. The assembly closed this evening. In preparation therefor an unusually early afternoon session was held. Matters of recommendation of various institutions were voted on just before adjournment.

REV. DR. CLARK PREACHES TODAY

Will Deliver Two Sermons and Address a Mass Meeting.

Incident to the state Christian Endeavor rally, which has been in session at the First Congregational church for the past two days, will be the three services conducted today by Rev. Dr. Francis E. Clark, president of the United Society of Christian Endeavor. At the First Congregational church Dr. Clark will preach at 11 o'clock this morning and at 3 o'clock this afternoon. Dr. Clark will address a mass meeting at the First Presbyterian church, and tonight he will preach at the First Presbyterian church. A largely attended reception for Dr. Clark was held last night in the vestry room of the First Congregational church. The address of welcome was made by Dr. Luther R. Dyott, pastor of the church. Mayor Lane was also to have spoken words of greeting to the distinguished visitor, but was unable to be present. Dr. Clark responded to the welcoming remarks, his words being largely of a reassuring character. He spoke of the fact that upon a former visit to Oregon, as well as on this occasion, he was presented with a handsome umbrella, which he declared a most appropriate gift to come from Oregonians. At yesterday afternoon's session of the Endeavorers' rally Dr. Clark delivered an address on "Leadership," in which he appealed to members of the society to take the front rank in affairs of life. "To become leaders in the fight," he spoke of the International Convention of Endeavorers, which will meet in St. Paul, July 7-12, and urged the Oregon state society to send a large delegation.

Comparatively a few years ago the handling of 26 pianos, which under the methods of shipping at that time made exactly two carloads, would have been an undertaking worthy of comment, even if it had been a matter of an entire month's operations. Now the handling of so many pianos, even in a day, is a matter of little more than passing comment.
