

### SILVER SERVICE FOR MISSISSIPPI

#### State's Present to Battleship Uncommonly Elegant—Library Goes With It.

Scranton, Miss., June 1.—Wind resulting in a choppy sea, caused a reversal of the plans for the ceremonies today attendant upon the presentation by the state of a silver service to the battleship Mississippi. The ceremonies commenced at 10:30 o'clock this morning. Governor Edmund F. Noel of Mississippi delivered the presentation address. Captain Fremont responding, upon behalf of the ship and the crew.

The silver service is one of the most magnificent ever presented. It weighs approximately 2400 ounces, and costs \$7200. The money was raised by popular subscription, permitted by special act of the Mississippi legislature.

### Real Thunderstorms in Blixen Valley

Anderson Valley, Or., May 27.—I left Diamond at 8 o'clock this morning and arrived here at 3 this afternoon. There was a very heavy thunder storm over the entire southern part of the county last night. It seemed to gather under Stein's mountain, at the head of Blixen river, and it swept down upon us at diamond about 8 o'clock. Howsena, how it did rain! It came down for an hour in a solid sheet, amid the flashes of lightning and roars of thunder. The little hotel where I was staying rocked and trembled like a ship on the ocean, and the water poured from the roof like a miniature Niagara.

Another Storm Nips Up.  
This morning it was clear, calm and bright, and I left Diamond thinking that a fair day and fine drive was before me. But as I gained the divide after leaving the Diamond valley I saw the clouds again banking up the Blixen. Soon they blackened and thickened and the lightning flashed through them. "Thunder!" I cried. That is the full name of the river, and it takes its name from the electrical storms of that valley, and this particular storm seemed to be sweeping down on me and before I felt sure it was going to hit me it closed down, and my horse I could not see. It rained and rain, and the coldest hail and the wettest rain I ever felt. I was now driving almost due west and had four miles to go before I could find shelter. The storm was beating against me from the south and I could hardly keep the team in the road. I had no shelter, no protection, for I am using a buckboard without a top. I got into my overcoat as quickly as I could and covered myself with an old set of harness. I was packing as a favor to a ranchman, but I assure you a set of harness is but a poor covering.

Felt Like an Iceberg.  
The water trickled down my spine, filled my shoes, and I was sitting in a puddle of hail and ice water. Great had gates to open, and at every gate I had to hitch my team before I opened the gate in the road. I had no shelter, no protection, and I think of again mounting to the seat and sitting down afresh in the rain. I was less than 40 years old—surely six or seven.

### NEWPORT TO VOTE ON NEW CHARTER

Newport, Or., June 1.—The move for a water system has come to a temporary halt. The council called to their assistance the services of Attorney Ed Bryson of Corvallis to draft an ordinance providing for submitting the question of bonding the city for water supply to the voters. Mr. Bryson after examining the Newport charter found that it did not confer sufficient power on the council and voters. Under it there was no authority to issue bonds. He gave no authority to condemn property for public use. The charter is believed to be so defective that any ordinance enacted under it is liable to be set aside by the courts. Mr. Bryson recommended that an amended charter be drawn up covering the defects of the old one and submitted to the voters for ratification. The council instructed him to draft such a charter.

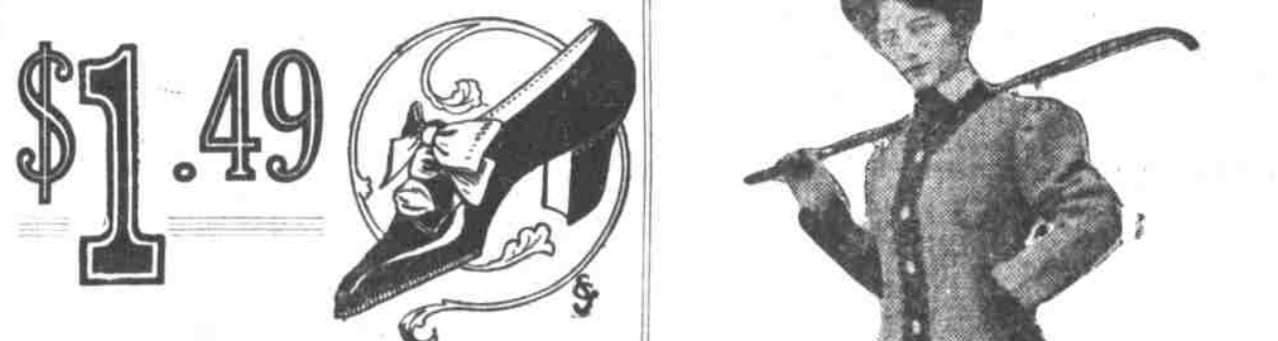

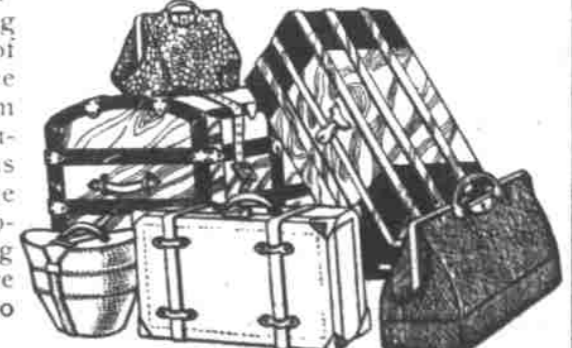
