

GRANGE OFFICIALS SALARIES RAISED

By-Laws Are Amended at
Ellensburg Convention
and Officers Elected.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Ellensburg, Wash., June 3.—Today's session of the Washington State grange will be taken up with legislative work, and Governor Hay will deliver an address in the afternoon. The Ellensburg grange will give a banquet at noon today. One of the speakers is C. C. Colt, representing the Union Meat company. He will speak to the toast, "Raising Hogs." The session will probably close tomorrow with a ride about the Kittitas valley.

The by-laws were amended yesterday increasing the salary of the master of the state grange from \$200 to \$500 per year, and the salary of the secretary from \$200 to \$500 per year.

Following the installation an excellent program was rendered, consisting of songs and addresses. Prominent among the speakers of the evening were Professor Thatcher of the State Agricultural college at Pullman, Assistant Superintendent of Public Instruction Noller and Mr. Doty, president of the Anti-Slavery league.

A.-Y.-P. OFFICIALS ARE MUCH ELATED

Liberal Attendance of First
Days Encourages Manage-
ment—Today's Events.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Seattle, Wash., June 3.—Officials of the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition are highly elated with the large attendance that has marked the opening days of the fair. On the first day nearly 90,000 persons paid to enter the grounds and it is thought many more would have attended had it not been for a heavy rain early in the evening. Despite cold and disagreeable weather yesterday, the attendance was 17,192. Spending of the attendance President Childberg today said:

"The most liberal estimate of the attendance on the opening today in case of fair weather was 75,000. Naturally it is most pleasing that the result yesterday and yesterday was better than we had hoped. I have no doubt now that our original estimate for the entire season of from three to three and a half millions will be achieved."

Today's program at the exposition is an extensive and interesting one. The entertainment began at 9:30 o'clock with a baseball game in the stadium between teams representing the mountain and coast artillery following this came numerous band concerts, a flight by the Strohbel airship over the city and grounds, a parade of troops, a military tournament in the stadium, exhibitions by the United States life saving crew and many other attractions.

The weather today beautiful and the attendance is heavy.

Secretary Wilson Honored.
Montreal, June 3.—Authorities of McGill university, at a special convocation held today at the new Macdonald college, conferred the honorary degree of doctor of laws on James Wilson, secretary of the United States department of agriculture. Others upon whom similar honors were conferred included Clifford Pinchot, head of the forest service, and Dr. James Earl Russell, head of the teachers' college of Columbia university. The degrees were conferred by Principal Peterson in the presence of the governors and faculty of the university and a large number of guests.

JOHN BURROUGHS NOT TO BE FOUND

Naturalist Expected on Ala-
meda From Hawaii but
Cannot Be Located.

San Francisco, June 3.—The whereabouts of John Burroughs is causing his friends in the bay cities much anxiety. The eminent naturalist was scheduled to arrive here from Honolulu on the steamer Alameda Tuesday. When the vessel docked Burroughs was not among the passengers, and the mails brought no explanation nor announcement of a change of his plans. Two months ago Burroughs paid Luther Burbank a visit at his Santa Rosa ranch before sailing for a brief junket in Hawaii. Letters to President Benjamin L. Wheeler of the University of California, Artist William Keith and Charles Keeler of Berkeley brought news that he would return on the Alameda.

Dr. Wheeler on a fishing trip at Belmont, cut short his sport and returned to welcome the traveler. Keith and Keeler also were on the dock, and Mrs. H. H. Hart, wife of the Oakland millionaire was there with her touring car to carry Burroughs away to her home.

Inquiries rushed to Honolulu have brought no response. Burbank, in Santa Rosa, addressed an anxious letter to Keith. No explanation of the disappearance is ventured by his friends.

Grants Pass Concern Resumes.
Grants Pass, Or., June 2.—The big box factory and finishing mills of the Grants Pass box company, which have been idle for several months, will resume work next week, with a complete crew. The factory has been purchased by the Gazette Box company of California. E. A. Hersey, manager for the company has arrived here and taken charge of the mills, and will begin operations as soon as the plant can be overhauled and made ready for work. The mills and factory of the Gazette Box company, which were located in California, were recently destroyed by fire, and the company will henceforth concentrate its business at this point.

MEMORIAL DAY IN THE SOUTH

Two Monuments to Confed-
erate Dead—Jefferson
Davis Honored.

Gainesville, Ga., June 3.—A handsome Confederate monument was unveiled here today with impressive ceremonies. The oration of the day was delivered by Honorable Hopper Alexander of Atlanta.

Greenville, Miss., June 3.—A monument erected to the memory of the Confederate dead of Washington county was unveiled today in the courthouse yard. The ceremonies were of an interesting character and were conducted under the auspices of the Daughters of the Confederacy. John L. Hebron, Le Roy Terry and Dr. B. F. Ward were the chief speakers.

Hopkinsville, Ky., June 3.—A big celebration of the birthday anniversary of Jefferson Davis was held today at Fairview, in Todd county, where the president of the Confederate states of America was born June 3, 1808. The celebration took the form of a monster barbecue, with memorial addresses by a number of prominent veterans.

New Orleans, La., June 3.—The anniversary of the birth of Jefferson Davis was observed throughout Louisiana today as "Confederate Memorial Day." Banks and public offices were closed, and in all of the cities and towns throughout the state the soldiers' graves were decorated and memorial exercises held under the auspices of the veterans' organizations.

Sculptor Ball 90 Years Old.
Montclair, N. J., June 3.—Thomas Ball, the famous sculptor, received many congratulations today on the occasion of his 90th birthday. Mr. Ball is quite vigorous for one of his years and has been actively engaged in his art until the past year or two.

The famous sculptor is a native of Charlestown, Mass., and received his education in Boston. He began his career as a painter, but in 1851 he decided to abandon painting for sculpture. For many years he lived in Florence, Italy. Since his return to America 10 or 12

years ago he has resided in Montclair. Probably the best known of Mr. Ball's works are his equestrian statue of General Washington, in the Public Garden of Boston, and the statue of Daniel Webster in Central Park, New York.

W. C. Calder Married.
San Francisco, June 3.—The marriage of two well-known Portland people was quietly performed this afternoon at Trinity Episcopal church by Rev. Ernest Bradley, rector of Trinity. The principals were: Mrs. F. Alice Mason of Portland, the widow of Albert B. Mason, of the firm of Sealey, Mason & Co., and W. C. Calder, whose residence the past few months has been Baker City, where he has been widely interested in timber lands. The Oregon couple came to San Francisco and the marriage, at their request, was a very quiet affair.
