OREGON DOCTORS AT NATIONAL CAPITAL

(Washington Bureau of The Journal.) Washington, June 3.—Dr. Montgomery, who with Dr. Andrew C. Smith, will attend the meeting of the American Medical association at Atlantic City, N. J., reached Washington today. Dr. Smith is attending conferences led by Surgeon General Wyman of the public health service, at which efforts are being made to evolve methods of cooperation between national and state health boards in stamping out disease. Dr. Smith reported no bubonic plague or infected rats were to be found in Portland, though such had been found at San Francisco and Seattle. It is from these rats that fleas go to convey the plague germs. Drs. Smith and Montgomery are among the guests this afternoon of Surgeon General Wyman on the government yacht, at which efforts are being made to stamp out disease. Through Bourne's introduction, E. T. Moore, superintendent of the Oregon state asylum for the blind, and E. N. Gilbert of Portland called on the president today. Moore is touring the country in the interest of the institution over which he has charge.

REQUISITION ISSUED FOR ALLEGED SLAYER

(By Journal Salem Wire.) Salem, Or., June 3.—A requisition upon the governor of California was issued today by Governor Benson for the return to this state of Charles Edmund, a negro, charged with murder in the first degree.

It is alleged that he became involved in an argument with his landlord, Ludwig C. Ruhl, proprietor of a rooming house at Seventh and Flinders streets, Portland, and during the course of the argument Ruhl received blows upon the head from a weapon in the hands of the negro that caused his death.

The incident occurred December 30, in 1907, and Ruhl died a few days later. Edmund is in custody in California.

VANDERBILT FIRES BILTMORE FORESTER

Ashville, N. C., June 3.—It is announced that George W. Vanderbilt has discharged Dr. C. A. Shenck, head of the forestry department of his Biltmore estate. This action is said to be the result of a quarrel that followed Vanderbilt's repudiation of Shenck's authority to make a 10 year lease of hunting and fishing privileges in Pisgah forest to H. F. Adicks of this city. Adicks transferred the lease to James A. Buckner, a member of the Biltmore Rod and Gun club.

LA FOLLETTE DEFIES CLAIMS OF PARTY

(Washington Bureau of The Journal.) Washington, June 3.—La Follette's demand in his remarkable speech begun yesterday for downward revision of the tariff has created a profound impression. The leaders of the finance committee of the senate manifest concern over the bombshell which the Wisconsin man threw into their camp.

The people of this nation demand a measure of foreign competition to take the place of the domestic competition which has been done away with by combinations and conspiracies. They demand this as one means of relief from the burden of the cost of living which oppresses every family in this land and presents to each the real problem of existence.

The declaration, coupled with his impressive reading of Taft's anti-election statement that the Dingley rates as a rule were too high, is believed by many here as throwing into confusion and thus completing the demoralization of party lines. This utter demoralization is said to be more and more generally and the readjustment of parties is speculated over increasingly.

Point is given to the foregoing by a report circulated that La Follette purposes traveling a Chautauqua circuit this summer, reading the congressional records of senators on the tariff and the tariff bill, as he did when he read the record of the votes on railroad rate regulation on a tour in which he visited Oregon and all other coast states.

MARSHFIELD BOAT IS RESCUED OFF YAQUINA

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Newport, Or., June 3.—The gasoline launch Eagle, from Marshfield, bound for Seattle, became disabled while off Yaquina bar and signaled for help. Captain Wellander and three of the lifesaving crew went to her assistance.

In shipping seawater got into the gasoline tank and the engines refused to run. The tank was cleaned and she came into port.

There was no damage to the boat.
