Boy Drowned in River—Edward Tremblay, the 9-year-old son of H. Tremblay, a laborer living at 193 Locust street, was drowned yesterday afternoon while playing at the edge of the Willamette river at the foot of Jefferson street. The little fellow was watching a crowd of other boys swimming, and was himself paddling in the water, when he stepped on a log, which rolled and threw him into the water. Before aid reached him he had gone beneath the surface, and was removed two hours later. A brother a few years older than the drowned boy recovered the body at a point near where it had gone down by diving for it. The body was removed to the morgue, where it is held, pending funeral arrangements.

BOOST BRIDGE IN EVERY QUARTER

Backers of Broadway Structure Keep It Before Public Steadily.

Should the Broadway bridge plan which is to come up for approval before the people of the city at Monday's election by any chance fail to pass it can hardly be said to have failed through lack of knowledge on the part of voters. Many a measure has failed in this manner, but the men behind the Broadway bridge do not propose to have their measure defeated in any such manner. Consequently the need of a new bridge has been advertised broadcast all over the city. Every day the bridge is being held all over the east side of the river, and it is hoped to carry the east side for the bridge by a big majority. Every voter north of Burnside is expected to vote for the \$2,000,000 bond issue while a Friday evening meeting was held in the hall of the Multnomah push club, which was especially well attended. A large number of people turned out, all of them appearing to be enthusiastic over the prospects of securing a new bridge.

CRIPPLE HOTELS AND KILL TRAVEL

Los Angeles Hotel Manager Says McKenna Amendment Is Unsuitable.

E. H. Hess, manager of the Broadway and Occidental hotels, Los Angeles, is in the city for a few days reviewing acquaintances and admiring the wonderful development of the city and surrounding country. Incidentally, Mr. Hess, who is a hotel manager of years of experience, takes much interest in the liquor regulating questions that are to come up for public vote at the municipal election here.

Having looked into the McKenna amendment, he says he is frank enough to state that he is not in favor of it. He does not care to conduct a hotel here. In regard to the laws governing the sale of liquors in hotels in Los Angeles, Mr. Hess said:

"We have to have two licenses there. We have the bar license, which permits hotels to serve liquors in public rooms and private rooms, where no meals are served. I believe this license if adopted only for cafes and restaurants. We have to be closed at 1 o'clock (midnight), both bar and restaurants. Sundays we can only use bottled goods, no mixed drinks. All other days in the week in the diningrooms and grillrooms of hotels, we have to have a license for either mixed or otherwise, in single drinks of one glass or in bottles as desired by the guests. It being necessary that such hotel has merely a restaurant license."

"I have familiarized myself with the McKenna amendment and I am frank to say that I would not care to conduct a hotel in Portland under such restrictions. I believe this measure if adopted will make lodging houses out of your principal hotels, as I do not believe it will be possible for any first class hotel to conduct a diningroom under the provisions of the McKenna act."

"During the long period of my hotel management, the hardest work I have had to do has been to make our diningrooms break even, to say nothing about making a profit, and at the best I could do, I have often had to pour good money into the meat trough to make good. I have been engaged in the hotel business in the city of Los Angeles for over 12 years past. I have seen Los Angeles grow from a mere hamlet to a thriving city of 320,000 people. In my opinion the greatest fact in the development and growth of Los Angeles has been its excellent hotels and the wide publicity the hotels have given the genial climate of Los Angeles and brought to it the tourist. The hotels have been a factor in developing the entire state of California. If you cripple your hotels you will interfere with every branch of business in your city."
