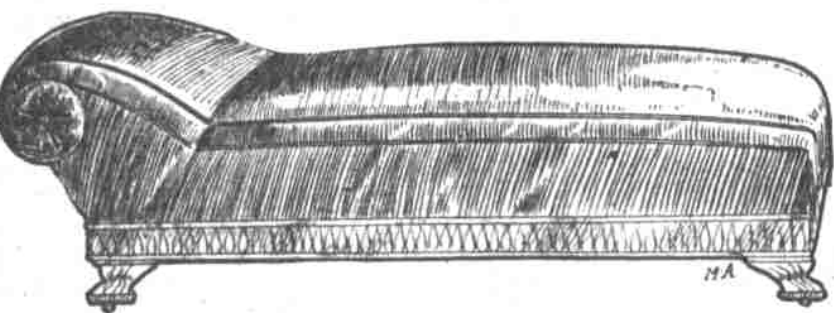

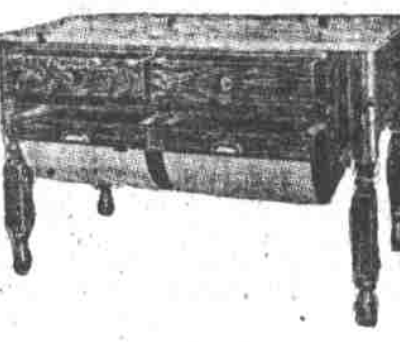

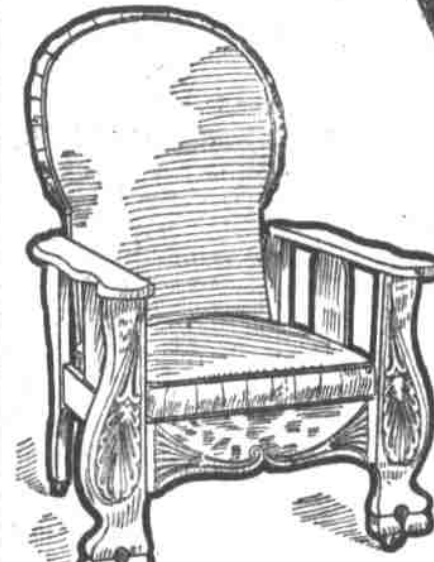

NINE BALLOONS IN TWO RACES

Six in Distance and Three in Endurance Rise at Indianapolis.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Indianapolis, June 5.—Nine giant balloons, the pride of the aerial fleet that has sailed the heavens above in many different parts of the United States, rose this afternoon from the motor speedway for two of the greatest races in the history of aeronautics. Like homing pigeons, they circled, seeking a current of air that would bear them farthest. Then they floated away to the southeast. Soon after the prevailing wind shifted to the northwest, and while several enthusiasts watched them with aching necks, the balloons changed their course and disappeared toward the southwest. The two races were the national distance contest for balloons of the Aero club of America, and the endurance test under the auspices of the Aero club of Indianapolis. Six entered the distance race and three the endurance contest. The latter were handicapped in accordance with their size and gas capacity. At 3:52 the Indianapolis, with Dr. Gathers Link and J. R. Irvin of Indianapolis in the car, rose at the signal waved by Governor Thomas R. Marshall. The others followed at intervals of a few minutes. Each balloon was held captive in front of the box where Governor and Mrs. Marshall sat. Charles G. Glidden, Ohio, one of the contestants in the en-

durance race that started from Indianapolis this afternoon, landed here at 6:30 p. m., after traveling 50 miles in a straight line from the starting point. Although the strong southwestern breeze that the aeronauts prayed for was missing, the weather in other respects was ideal. The northwest wind made it possible for all contestants to get away and into a clear sky before the speedway grounds were passed. The entrants and the times when they rose were as follows: The Endurance race—The "Ohio," Dr. H. W. Thompson of Salem, Ohio, and W. E. Mast of Canton, Ohio, 3:57. "The Chicago," the largest balloon in the world, C. A. Coey, Chicago, 4:01. In the long distance championship race: "The New York," A. Holland Forbes and Captain Harmon of New York, 5:13. "The Indiana," Carl Fisher and Captain G. D. Baumhauer of Indianapolis, 5:15. "The St. Louis III," Albert B. Lambert and H. E. Honeywell of St. Louis, 5:16. "The Cleveland," A. H. Morgan and J. H. Wade Jr. of Cleveland, 5:17. "The Hoosier," Captain Baldwin of New York and Charles Walsh of Mount Vernon, N. Y., 5:18. "The University City," John Berry and Paul McIlough of St. Louis, 5:19. Light and variable winds are predicted for tonight, and it is as impossible to know in what direction the various racers will travel for any length of time as to prophesy where they will meet. All the aeronauts are equipped for any emergency, even a landing in the great lakes or the ocean. They are provisioned for a week and they expect and hope to stay in the air for three or four days. AMERICANS AT ROME REJOICE

Jubilee of American College the Occasion for Week's Celebrating. Rome, June 5.—When the members of the Italian royal family looked out of the windows of the Quirinal palace today they could not fail to see the intermingled stars and stripes and the papal flags which decorated the group of buildings occupying the entire square between the Via dell' Umbria and the Piazza dell' Pilotta, bordering the Quirinal hill. The buildings were those of the North American college and the decorations were in honor of the golden jubilee of the famous institution which has educated many of the most brilliant members of the Roman Catholic hierarchy and priesthood in the United States. The religious exercises and festivities attending the jubilee celebration will begin tomorrow and will continue through the entire week. More than 100 members of the alumni association have come over to take part in the celebration. Included among the number are Mr. Falconio, the papal delegate at Washington; Archbishop Farley of Boston; Bishop Kelley of Savannah; Bishop McDonnell, of Brooklyn; Bishop Hoban, of Scranton; Bishop Burke, of St. Joseph, and Bishop Corrigan, of Baltimore. Program for a Week. A week's program of religious, business and social duties has been pre-

pared. The chief event of the program will be a private audience with Pope Pius X, at which the Rev. Dr. Francis H. Wall, president of the alumni association, will read a Latin address and present the Pope with a jubilee offering of Peter's Pence. A visit to the cemetery of St. Lawrence, where several of their members are buried, is planned by the alumni. Another feature will be the opening of the new baseball field at Villa Goncello, which has succeeded the Grattaferrata as the summer home of the students. At the initial game an immense American flag, the gift of Rodman Wanamaker of Philadelphia, will be raised. One of the principal matters to be considered by the gathering is the proposal to change the name of the North American college to the United States college. It is urged in behalf of the proposal that only residents of the United States attend the institution, the Canadians having a college of their own, and the Mexicans attending the College of the Propaganda Fide, who in 1853 had been Papal Pro-Huncio to the United States. In promoting the project Archbishop Bedini had the hearty cooperation of Archbishop Hughes of New York and other American prelates. For the home of the college an edifice was acquired on the Via dell' Umbria, the history of which dated back to 1603, and which had been used in 1854 by the French army of occupation. His college started its career in 1855 with 13 students on its roster. It soon outgrew its original home and from time to time additional buildings were acquired. The buildings and grounds now occupy an entire square bordering on the Quirinal hill. Dom Bernardo Smith, O. S. B., professor of dogmatic theology at the Propaganda, was the first pro-rector of the new institution. Pope Pius IX, in a practical manner, early showed his interest in the welfare of the institu-

tion, and each of his successors on the throne of St. Peter has shown his interest in the American college "del Nord" in every way possible. Thirty-five such schools in Rome. The American college is incorporated by the legislature of Maryland. The present trustees are Cardinal Gibbons of Baltimore, Archbishop Ryan of Philadelphia, Archbishop Farley of New York and Archbishop O'Connell of Boston. In 60 years the college has had six rectors. They were the Rev. Drs. William G. McKloskey, Francis S. Chastant, Louis E. Hostiot, Denis J. O'Connell and Thomas P. Kennedy, all of whom are living except the Rev. Dr. Hostiot. The American college is but one of many such institutions in the city of Rome. All of the leading nations of the world maintain here a similar college for their theological students. They attend the College of the Propaganda Fide for all lectures in theology which are delivered in Latin, and for those in the natural sciences, which are given in Italian. Often representatives of 25 different nations sit side by side in the classrooms. Only the languages and music are taught in the native colleges, which nevertheless occupy an important place in the educational system of the Roman Catholic church. (Special Dispatch to The Journal.) The innovation will separate the passenger from the freight traffic and unite Jacksonville more closely with Jackson county.

MADMAN LAYS NINE MEN LOW

John Murphy, at Boston, Kills Five and Seriously Stabs Nine. (United Press Leased Wire.) Boston, June 5.—Five men were killed and four men seriously wounded by John Murphy, 50 years of age, who ran amuck this afternoon at a Somerville packing plant, where he was employed. Murphy, a madman, was seen brandishing a big knife cornered Thomas C. Crowe, whom he murdered. Two Italians and two negroes were the other victims fatally stabbed. The nine victims were removed to a hospital but five of them died soon after their arrival. Murphy is under arrest pending an examination into his sanity. GOVERNOR GIVES CONVICT A CHANCE Madison, Wis., June 5.—Governor Davidson has pardoned Knolan H. Whiteside, who robbed Banker L. M. Hanks' house in Madison six years ago and publicly confessed the crime after professing conversion at a rescue mission meeting in Minneapolis a year ago. He was sentenced to imprisonment for three years. Hanks will place Whiteside in charge of a farm, which he purchased in the northern part of the state for the purpose, and help the convict to live an honest life.
