

FOLLOW THIS GUIDE VOTING ON LAWS

The Journal's Recommendations to Voters as to Each of the 35 Measures to Be Voted on Next Monday.

For the benefit of voters in handling the big ballot at the city election next Monday The Journal herewith presents its recommendations on each measure to be voted on. In the list given below the ballot title of each of the 35 measures is given just as it will appear on the ballot, marked with a cross indicating the decision reached as to its merits by The Journal after careful consideration.

The Journal recommends the adoption of the new charter framed by the committee of 15 citizens and the first of the two alternative amendments proposed by the "committee of 15" regarding the payment of the cost of water mains. It is highly important that the voter remember that a vote for the new charter should be followed by a vote against all of the 19 amendments proposed by the "committee of seven," which are intended as a revision of the existing charter on milder lines.

This is not saying that all the amendments of the "committee of seven" are not meritorious. Many of them are considered alone. But the only safe rule for the friend of the new charter is to vote against all of the amendments proposed by the "committee of seven" and to vote for the new charter. The amendments proposed are fully covered and in some cases improved upon in the new charter.

To adopt the new charter and also the amendments proposed by the "committee of seven" would lead to duplication, contradiction and confusion. Don't do it.

Remember to mark the X after the number and before the word "no," as the case may be, on each proposition. Voters will find the list below a valuable guide in the voting booth. Clip it out and take it to the polls with you. The mark after the number in each case expresses The Journal's choice.

Through an error Saturday The Journal's recommendation on the electrical wiring ordinance proposed by the electrical workers' union for the better protection of the line men was made to read "no." It should have been affirmative. The Journal advises the voters to approve this measure by marking a cross after No. 154 on the ballot.

The following three amendments are proposed by the committee of fifteen and constitute the new charter plan:

The New Charter.
An act to amend and generally revise the city charter submitted by a committee of fifteen citizens, and to provide for the election of a mayor and council of six members, distributing all executive business among six departments, each headed by a commissioner, abolishing political parties in municipal elections, fixing the salaries of all elective officers, amending the provisions of the charter relating to local improvements and assessments, and to the grant and regulation of franchises and other provisions.

Water Mains.

Surety Bonds for City Funds.

Poultry ruled somewhat weaker during the six days and prices were shaded somewhat in order to unload with more dispatch.
No change was noted in the butter market during the week, although a decline was expected by everyone. The higher prices in the north enabled sellers here to maintain values. Some are again predicting a decline for the coming week.
Cheese market lost a cent during the week after which the market steadied considerably, with northern buyers again indulging. Supplies are increased, however, beyond demand.

PEARY FEARS HIM.
THE ESQUIMAU SAYS
New York, June 5.—Mene Wallace, Esquimau, who was brought to this country by the expedition of Commander Peary, and who returned to New York after an ineffectual endeavor to

reach his people in Greenland, has told for the first time what he believes to be the real reason why the Arctic explorer refused to take him home on his recent return to the north pole.

"Peary suspected I would tell my people just how he and members of the Arctic club have treated me, and knew that if I did he would never reach the pole," he said.
Six weeks ago Mene disappeared from Manhattan college and was next heard from in Quebec. He reached the Canadian city by stealing rides on freight trains, walking and begging farmers to help him along. The longing for his old home and his people was so strong that when his shoes pinched him he took them off and trod the frozen barefoot. He slept in barns or by the wayside and spent three days in an abandoned boat. On the Canadian

border he was mistaken for a Chinaman and was held up by a big after a delay and was released and finally reached Montreal. From there he went to Quebec. It was here that he came to the port of starvation and wrote Chester Besscroft of the Hotel Astor that he was about to end it all by drowning himself. Vesta Tilley, the actress, sent Mr. Besscroft for his protégé and installed him at the Astor.
