

DEATH TRAIL OF CRAZED BUTCHER

John Murphy, Expert Pig Decapitator, Races Down a Six-Story Abattoir, Stabbing—Kills Five Persons, Three Others Will Die.

- Murphy's Victims.**

Boston, June 5.—Five workmen were killed and three men were seriously stabbed by John Murphy, who ran amuck in the plant of the North Packing & Provision company at Somerville today.

Murphy, the stabber, lives at No. 23 Joy street, Somerville. He is a married man with three children. He has worked for the company four years and has always been regarded by Superintendent W. P. Liston as a sober, steady and industrious man. He is short, stocky and powerfully built.

From his occupation of cutting heads off swine he had acquired a fierce dexterity with the nine-inch razor knife. One cut and the head was severed.

At 2 o'clock this afternoon Murphy went insane. He was working on an elevated platform on the seventh floor of the factory with 125 other workmen. At that moment Dr. Daniel S. Hayes of Waltham, the government meat inspector at the factory, came on his usual rounds. The "big-header's" brain snapped. He took his usual mechanical plunges at the row of swine carcasses as he started down from his platform, and without warning plunged his knife into Dr. Hayes' groin. The doctor staggered.

Second Wound Mortal.

The blow attracted no attention on account of the roar of pig-moving machinery. As a matter of fact the sight of a man flourishing a knife was about the last thing to be taken notice of.

Dr. Hayes had not received a death wound, so Murphy aimed another blow at him, catching him over the head. The nine-inch blade bit cruelly deep and Dr. Hayes sank to the floor with a wound that is said to be fatal.

Other workmen turned and ran toward the maniac. With great agility he darted toward the doorway leading to the six flights of stairs to the street.

Gory Trail to the Basement.

Through the terrified employees on the sixth floor, then down to the fifth, the fourth, the third, the second and then to the ground floor, he maniac ran, his shrieks spreading terror, and whenever a man stood before him the knife flashed and the victim fell. In all six men fell to the knife before the basement was reached, where, surrounded by the now separate workmen, the madman turned to bay.

Hounded by furious crowds and still shrieking wildly, Murphy dared them to come on. His challenge was accepted by one unknown Italian, who dashed in with a roller and felled the man to the floor with a sweeping blow. But no sooner was Murphy down than he sprang up again, and striking right and left, broke through the ring that surrounded him and fled to another part of the basement.

Behind him, groaning on the floor, lay Jenkins, his head almost cut off, and the thrust of the huge knife, and Chevas, whose right arm was almost severed, and who, besides, was bleeding from the side. Within a few minutes, however, the man was still. And then the crowd drew in again.

Disarmed by One Brave Man.

But they dared not come close. Bloody and furious, the madman stood firm, the huge weapon with which he cut the heads from hogs with a single blow, clutched in his hand. A crowd gathered, but before the police, who were summoned, arrived, some unknown hero took heart and as the bluecoats appeared, he jumped in and felled Murphy again, this time knocking the deadly knife from his hands. Before the ma-

niac could regain possession of his weapon the police were upon him and it was only after a desperate battle during which he was clubbed almost into unconsciousness that Murphy was subdued.

Just what or under what circumstances all of Murphy's victims were struck down no one is able to tell. During the few minutes of the fight the whole factory was in confusion and when the killer, wild eyed and covered with blood from the bodies of his victims, was dragged out of the basement, there was a terrific wailing and wailing. Many of the families living nearby had relatives employed in the big plant and their shouts and cries, the clanging ambulance bells and the ringing of gongs as the patrol wagons dashed up, aroused the entire neighborhood.

Every Wound Fatal.

When the dead and dying were carried out there was a jam of women and children who tried to discern the forms of their loved ones but all were so covered with blood that they were almost unrecognizable.

From the first moment it was seen that there was no chance for any to live. Murphy's huge knife had in every case dealt a fatal blow. Some of the bodies of the dead were almost cleft in two and the bodies were deeply cut in vital parts.

Without the loss of time, however, the dead and dying were rushed to a hospital, while Murphy, still howling, was taken to a cell.

It is said Murphy has for some time held a grudge against the management of the place and this is thought to be the basis of the maniacal outbreak which resulted in the bloodiest crime by one man in the history of New England.

to come to the convention instructed to elect Mr. Padberg president, but having given up that thought considered the vice presidency due to the state.

Who hopes Missouri might have had of securing a national officer were blasted when Mr. Padberg rose to decline the nomination. He thanked the Missouri delegation but favored the equitable distribution of honors. He said he had formerly been a president and even now was a director. He declined to allow his name to go before the convention.

Lux Unanimously Elected.

Minnesota's soil as fertile in the production of national officers was the principal point in the short address by J. C. Grimes of Cincinnati, Ohio, who seconded the nomination of Mr. Lux. Mr. Coons of Washington again restored order after a dozen or more had attempted to second Mr. Lux's nomination, by introducing a motion that the election be considered unanimous. The delegates vociferously agreed and the motion adopted following the declaration of the election of the St. Paul grocer.

Reference upon the few remarks which Mr. Lux made in response to demands of the delegates, came the election of secretary. C. H. Ashley nominated John A. Green, who for the past two years has acted in that capacity and who for two years prior to that time was president of the association. The wildest cheering of the convention which followed the nomination of Mr. Green evinced the popularity of the secretary. Yells and cheers continued for several minutes.

R. Newberry of Los Angeles, Cal., seconded the nomination, said: "It is in the proper time and proper place for California to give the most valuable servant of the association his due. He has given everything to uphold the association. And we love him because we believe him true." Thunderous applause followed.

Mr. Coon to the Fore.

J. J. Higgins of Seattle, Wash., followed by a score of other delegates, the nomination, with the result that Mr. Coon was again prompted to rise and urge the necessity of the recommendation that the convention adopt a resolution declaring the election unanimous. His advice was followed. Then came more cheers and whistling. Called upon for a speech, Mr. Green said:

"Many times I have questioned the advisability of my staying longer with the National association as secretary, but when I go from state to state and meet men who represent the retail grocers of the country, and see what earnestness and faithfulness they manifest in the work I gather inspiration and encouragement which compels me to go on.

"I can not promise more than that which I have, and would do anything to advance the interests of the retail grocers, and to them I desire to state that harmony, unanimity and oneness of purpose among them can move anything or make any condition which they may see fit to obtain.

"I believe that you will give myself and the remainder of the officers that support which is so necessary to achieve results. We can secure the legislation or anything we may desire.

"With heart overflowing with gratitude I thank you over and over again for the cheering and whistling for several minutes.

All For Schwab.

Frank Conally of San Francisco, Cal., placed in nomination the name of Henry W. Schwab of Milwaukee, Wis., for national treasurer. The name of the Wisconsin grocer forced more applause. Mr. Padberg, in a short speech seconded the nomination. The multitude of seconds compelled Mr. Coon to make the usual motion that the election be declared unanimous.

St. John of Colorado nominated A. H. Barth of Arcada, Colo., for the office of director to succeed Mr. Padberg, whose term of office had been brought to an end. Mr. Barth was elected without opposition. He made a brief address of thanks.

Dr. E. Lukenbill of St. Louis brought up the question of paying the present salary and introduced a resolution

instructing the board of directors to pay the executive \$500 a year. On the question there was a division of sentiment and after some debate it was decided to allow the matter of executive pay to the executive board. President Sullivan announced that he would be glad to accept remuneration. Then several delegates rose to urge that all require each member to pay promptly the per capita tax required by the association.

Convention in Turmoil.

Pandemonium reigned on the convention floor when President Sullivan put the matter of the selection of a convention city for 1901 before the delegates. Mr. Newberry was on his feet before the executive board had finished speaking and asked that the selection and time of the convention be left in the hands of the executive board. Greeting his suggestion came a swelling murmur of disapproval from all over the hall.

Every one stood at the same time, demanding recognition. All tried to talk at once, and caustic speech flew back and forth. Mr. Newberry sat down, rose and sat down again, completely nonplussed by the excitement which his simple suggestion had brought on.

J. F. Paudling of Los Angeles, Cal., declared by declaring that the convention had failed to thank properly the retiring officers, and a rising vote was given for Mr. Kramer and Mr. Padberg. Three cheers were given for both, at different times.

Past President Kramer interjected a few remarks. He told the delegates that the fact that had not been paid to officers of the organization was a disgrace. He said he was not talking for himself, but for those who had served in the past and needed the small sums which the association had set aside for their pay, but never turned over. He arraigned members of the association severely for not paying the per capita tax.

Believes in Contest.

J. J. Ryan, St. Paul, started the next convention city battle. He made a motion that the selection of the city be left to the hands of the national officers. Yells of disapproval reproved him.

Mr. Newberry felt that there should be more of a contest for the convention between the different states. "We do not merely want an invitation," he said, "but desire to visit some city next year when we know of the importance of a national convention of retail grocers will be thoroughly appreciated." He thought it better to place the matter with the executive board until a contest should develop.

C. M. Lees, Salt Lake City, Utah, said he was "most strenuously opposed to such action," and Mr. McAttee, representing Springfield, was given an opportunity to defend the nomination of some city. He formally invited the delegates to convene at Springfield on behalf of the business men of that city. "I have already received \$25,000 from the retail grocers. Three thousand dollars has already been raised to entertain the delegates. One unfortunate remark he made was that Springfield was in "the center of the corn belt."

"You say it is in the center of the corn belt," repeated Mr. Coon. "If you can assure us that we will find an abundance of the juice of the corn I will vote for Springfield."

Invitation From Utah.

C. M. Lees of Utah then delivered an invitation on behalf of the retail grocers and citizens of Utah that the convention be held in Salt Lake City. He mentioned the logical point, and had gotten well into his talk when J. H. Hellwig, of Hayward, Cal., interrupted the invitation on behalf of the citizens, town committee, volunteer fire department and village band of his town.

For his part, exclaimed Mr. Newberry, he was willing that the convention be held in Salt Lake City, because he understood that "one is allowed an affinity there." J. F. Paudling of Los Angeles declared himself in favor of the Utah capital because he knew Mr. Newberry needed an affinity.

Mentioning Springfield, F. J. Dayton of Akron, Ohio, believed its invitation the only one of the three mentioned. He mentioned the importance of the national convention. Mr. Lukenbill of Missouri believed with Mr. Dayton, President Sullivan called a fiery debate which threatened to commence, by declaring that he didn't consider it proper for any of the delegates to mention the genuineness of the invitations of either Salt Lake City or Hayward.

Springfield Is Chosen.

The vote, which finally came, resulted as follows: Springfield, 18; Salt Lake City, Utah, 28; and Hayward, Wis., 18. Most of the votes for Hayward were complimentary and were given by the delegates of the Illinois city was later declared unanimous and Mr. McAttee thanked the delegates. Later Mr. Coon was appointed chairman of the committee on the maintenance of selling prices, and a resolution urging all delegates to inaugurate a protective selling plan in all parts of the country was unanimously adopted. Advocating that all grocers urge the passage in congress of a national law of weights and measures, several delegates delivered short talks. A motion for the submission of such a resolution to the different senators and congressmen was unanimously adopted.

Are buying essential under present conditions? was the question of H. Wisamann of Sacramento, Cal., who defended such organizations as a necessary evil.

"The jobber has forced us to establish these exchanges," asserted Mr. Wisamann. "We were compelled to take some action to fight the larger stores, which could purchase goods in larger lots and much cheaper than we smaller grocers from the jobbers."

The speaker declared the formation of such organizations over the country would allow the merchant to buy right and therefore sell right. Too exchanges were the means of producing legitimate business. He said Representatives of the retail retailers announced during the afternoon session that because of the necessity of the retail grocers in Seattle before Wednesday, when an entertainment had been planned, delegates and visitors a good time Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday.

Asparagus Club Formed.

After the convention had adjourned sine die, a meeting of about 100 unique organizations in the world was held in the convention hall. Its name is the Asparagus club. It has a membership of about 40 and was formed by the delegates enroute to Portland over the Canadian Pacific to attend the convention. Aims and objects set forth in a neat folder printed in Portland, are only that every member obligate himself to send every other member a card or letter before June 1, 1910. The officers of the club, formally elected, are: J. H. Hellwig, president; L. A. Padberg, chorister; T. P. Sullivan, chaplain; A. S. Werremer, secretary, and L. L. Schmal, sergeant at arms.
