

PROVISIONS FOR THE UNEMPLOYED

Labor Exchanges Everywhere—Insurance Fund for Idle Hands.

London, June 8.—The provision for the establishment of a labor exchange, contained in the budget prepared by the chancellor of the exchequer, Lloyd George, regarded by the conservative as the most socialistic provision of a socialist budget, is receiving the enthusiastic support of Winston Churchill. Not only does Churchill approve of the plan for national labor exchange, but he strongly urges the establishment of a system of insurance for the unemployed.

Churchill is president of the board of trade, a cabinet position similar to the secretary of commerce and labor in the United States cabinet. Supported by a liberal majority in the house of commons and with a liberal minister behind him, the plan of prime mover in this radical scheme of protection to the workmen of the nation stands an excellent chance of being accorded an official trial.

If this plan is adopted, the board of trade will be the possessor for the entire system. Below it will be 10 divisions, each with its own officers. The larger cities in each of the divisions will be supplied with first class exchanges, with second class exchanges in the smaller cities. Country villages will be protected by sub-offices. It is thought these exchanges, in addition to giving service in securing employment for those out of work, will be of assistance in the settlement of labor disputes.

The plan of insurance against unemployment is meeting with enthusiastic opposition from vested interests. The plan as outlined by Churchill provides for the payment by each laborer of a tax of 1 cent a day. Employers would pay 4 cents a day for each man in their employ. Another 4 cents would be paid by the national government.

It is estimated that the exchange during the next 10 years would cost \$1,000,000, while the insurance would be \$4,000,000 each from employers, employees and government.

In answer to severe conservative criticism of his budget, Chancellor Lloyd George said:

"This budget is a war budget against the cruelty and privation of our present social system."

PICNIC FIGHT WITH FATALITY ATTENDING

Martinez, Cal., June 8.—One man is dead, one fatally injured and another in a serious condition following a riot between a band of picnickers and the local police.

John Figueroa is dead. E. Ciponi will die and Constable C. R. Palmer has a fractured skull and is badly bruised.

The riot was the indirect result of a fight at the picnic of the Fairbairn Guards at Bay Park Sunday afternoon. Constable Palmer stopped the fight and one of the participants swore vengeance. Late Sunday night the picnickers saw the officer near the Martinez station and assaulted him. Other officers were attracted to the scene and a number of shots were exchanged.

Nine leaders of the riot are under arrest on charges of disturbing the peace and inciting a riot. No one has been charged with the death of Figueroa as yet.

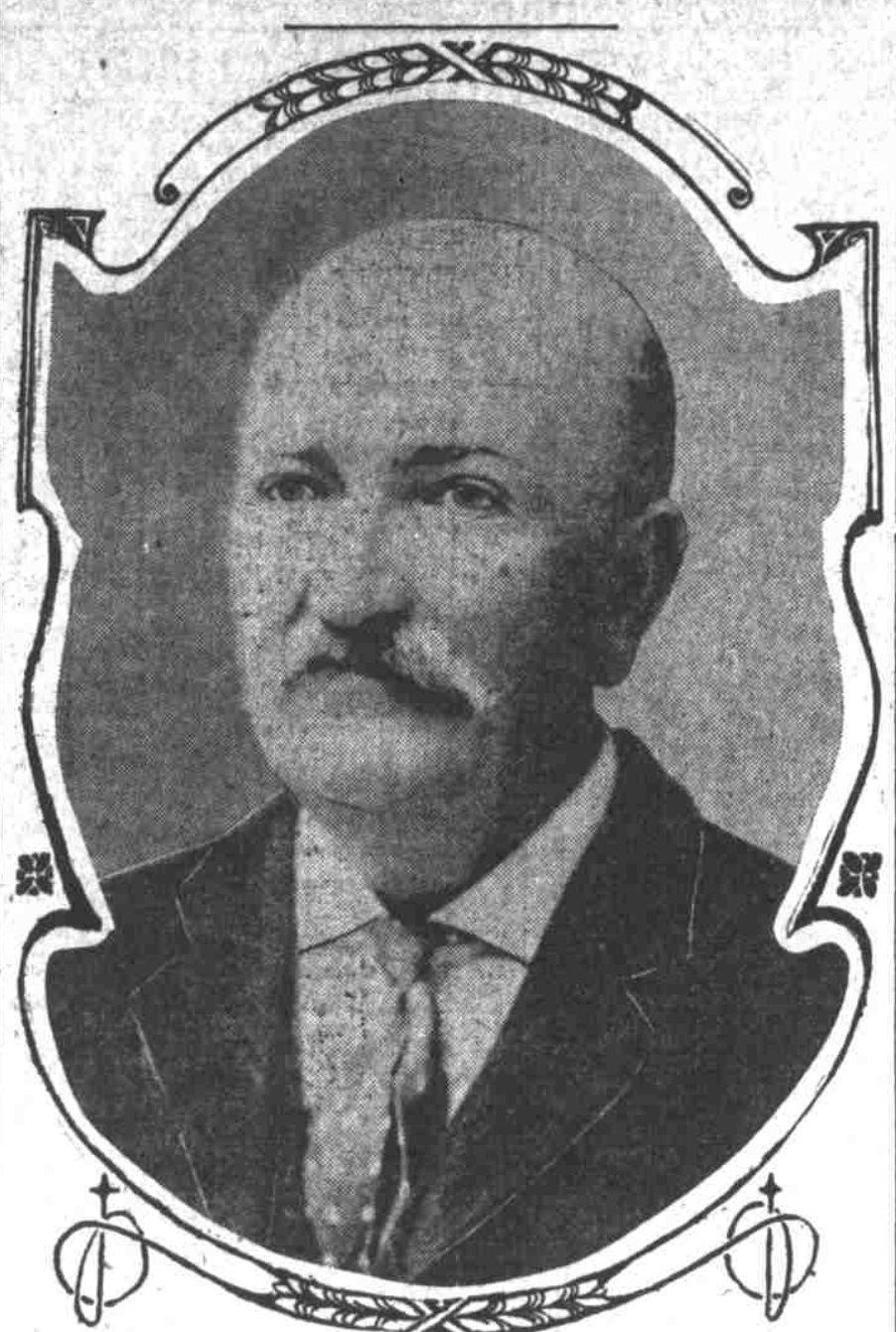

THIEF CATCHERS NAIL EACH OTHER

Interior of Carnegie Library
Scene of Funny Mixup—
Nobody Hurt Much.

San Mateo, Cal., June 8.—C. A. Kirkbride, Carnegie librarian of this city, and Policeman John J. Friel engaged last night in a struggle in the library building. Both were needed to watch for thieves who have been active for the past week and neither knew of the other's presence.

About midnight Friel, who was hidden in the basement, heard some one moving among the shelves overhead. Slipping quietly into the library room, he began a search for the intruder. Kirkbride, hearing a sleuth on his trail, believed him to be the burglar, and maneuvered for a better position. For 15 minutes the officer and the librarian stalked each other about the building, between rows of bookshelves and around tables.

Thinking to outwit the thief, Kirkbride slipped behind a huge American flag that was draped on the wall. Seeing the swaying folds of the banner, Friel crept up, gun in hand, and pushing the flag aside, pounced upon his victim.

The struggle that followed was furious but short. When Friel had securely pinned his prisoner to the floor, he turned on a light and mutual recognition followed. Neither man was hurt seriously.

MAN PAWNS WOODEN LIMB FOR BOOZE

Vancouver, B. C., June 8.—Because Richard Williams of Oakland, Cal., pawned his wooden leg for a flask of whiskey he has been ordered deported. Richard, who has every appearance of the itinerant cripple who works at the trade, reached Vancouver 10 days ago. He immediately got drunk. At first he walked without difficulty, even under the handicap of numerous drinks, and the police did not molest him. On Saturday, however, Richard was found minus the artificial limb, trying to travel with the aid of a cane. So he was bundled into the wagon and taken to jail.

Today he was unable to explain what had become of his wooden leg. He denied pawning it, but his memory was a blank on the subject. Two detectives have been sent out to round up the missing timber, and when they have restored it to its owner, Williams will be sent back to the United States.

GAS RECEIPTS GIVE CLUE TO SUICIDE

San Francisco, June 8.—Receipts from the local gas company led to the discovery of the suicide of E. Lindenberg, a retired wool merchant, who committed suicide in the flat that was occupied by Morris Haas at the time he shot Francis J. Heney. Lindenberg disappeared from his boarding house last Saturday night. No trace of him was found until late yesterday, when gas receipts for a flat at 1846 McAllister street were discovered among his effects. Investigation showed that he had rented the flat for the sole purpose of ending his life. He was despondent over illness.

Walla Walla Pioneers Meet.

Walla Walla, Wash., June 8.—Pioneers from all parts of the Walla Walla valley are meeting here today in the ninth annual gathering of the Walla Walla Pioneer association. The meetings are being held in Beney's grove, two miles east of the city. At 6 o'clock this morning the pioneers as the guests of the Walla Walla Traction company were taken to the place of meeting.

NO INFORMATION TO THE ENEMY

Imperial Press Conference Pledges Silence as to Movements in War.

London, June 8.—The imperial press conference went on record today against the practice of hampering the army and navy by disclosing their movements in time of war. Plans for development of the navy also met with the approval of the conference, all speeches advocated that policy being greeted with cheers.

The resolution today declared "it is the duty of the press to do everything possible to cooperate with the naval and military authorities in organizing the empire's defense and to take all precaution to avoid injury to public interest by publishing news of war time movements."
