PAGEANT LIKE DREAM OF FAIRIES

Electrical Parade of Last Night Said to Have Excelled Brilliant Creations of New Orleans' Famous Mardi Gras

In all of Portland's history no such gorgeous pageant ever was presented to Portland people and their friends and guests as that of Rex Oregonus last night. There have been parades and other pageants since the time the forefathers pitched their tents along the banks of the river here. There have been barbecues in the early days, and there have been numerous occasions of rejoicing, but nothing like that of last night. Thursday night, with its pageant of the Spirit of the Golden West, is supposed by the Rex Oregonus management to be the grand climax of a week of climaxes, but if the Spirit of the Golden West surpasses the exhibition of Rex Oregonus it will have to have some spirit.

Rex Oregonus Awaits Darkness. Scheduled to make his appearance at 8:30 o'clock last night, Rex Oregonus and his train delayed their march until later when the darkness had settled down over the city, which was just as it came the electricity and the 10,000 incandescent lights an opportunity to bring out the full beauty of the splendid cars as they passed through the close packed crowds.

On the opening night more than 10,000 people saw the parade of the home coming day contingent, but last night half as many more people massed the streets along the line of march to see the arrival of the king. Heading the parade was a platoon of police, but before many

blocks of the route had been gone over in the downtown district recruits from the guard of honor were called upon to open a way through the army of merry-makers jammed into Morrison and Washington and the other streets from building line to building line. In spite of the crush, however, there was no disorder and no trouble. Every one was in a good mood, and in good temper, and a little thing like a crushed hat or a trampled corn did no effect in erasing the festive smile. Tooting horns and waving pennants, blazing fireworks and plentiful cheers were the order of the evening.

Brilliantly Baffles Description. It is useless to attempt to tell of the splendor of the Rex Oregonus pageant in detail. Those who did not see it have been told about it long before this time, and are sorry they did not have the throng and take a look for themselves. No passing chronicle of the day, besides, could do the spectacle justice. Printers' ink has no color and words are opaque things to mirror back the lights and shades, the tints and changes of the picture, was wonderful, gorgeous, splendid, unique, and a few other things—something to be seen and not read about.

From the time the automobile, festooned and garlanded with electric lights led the way and mowed the beauteous of the night, until the great white polar bear, king of the Arctic, came guarding the rear, there was not a dull minute. A mild ripple of applause marked the progress of the leading automobile. This grew in volume as the leading car of the parade proper passed along with its load of Rex Oregonus officials imprisoned by the comets, suns, and moons of the decorations. Rex Oregonus still more favorable notice when his car made its appearance and from that on one grand burst of welcome swelled along the line of the entire parade. The most noticeable thing about the crowd was its lavish overflow of superlative adjectives and time its apparent paucity of vocabulary.

The king himself, The Fates, Father Time, the Queen of Stars, the Queen of Flowers, the Queen of Fragrance, the Lily of the East, Lila Rook, the queen of the Nile, the King of Monarchs, Prince of the Sea, the King of the Quads, the King of the Kings of the Arctic, all were pronounced wonderful, and they were.

Tomorrow will mark the climax of the week with two big parades, the horse and vehicle parade in the afternoon at 2 o'clock and the grand pageant of the Spirit of the Golden West at night. Friday will be east side day and Saturday will witness the departure of Rex Oregonus and the close of the festival.

OLD LADIES' HOME REMEMBERED IN WILL

Five thousand dollars is willed to the Old Ladies' home for a memorial fund by the will of Mrs. Anna Van Rensselaer, which was filed in the county court yesterday, and \$2500 is given to endow a bed in the Good Samaritan hospital.

Five nieces and nephews of the deceased, Anna R. Kaddery, Edward J. Vedder, George V. R. Vedder, James C. Vedder and John B. Vedder are bequeathed \$5000 each. Catherine V. C. Van Rensselaer is given \$4000 and \$2000 is given to Lucy O. Schuyler. Three nieces of the husband, Henrietta E. Gardner, Mary M. Schuyler and Frances V. R. Sampson, are given \$1000 each and two cousins, Louisa Van Schaick and Sarah A. Kiston, receive \$2000 each. The will directs the sale of the property and payment of the bequests as soon as possible. If any money is left, it is to be divided equally between the nieces and nephews of the deceased. Alexander Kaddery has been named to act as executor of the will and W. C. Alvord, J. J. Kaddery and William Macbeth appointed as appraisers.

HITS MASHER IN FACE WITH STEAK

East Side Woman Sacrifices Dinner When Followed by Strange Man.

Followed by a strange man, Mrs. R. E. Jones, handsome and courageous, of 386 East Eleventh street, first plastered a package of hamburger steak over his face and then shied a brick at him. The stranger ran.

45 APPLICANTS TO OREGON BAR

Two Women in Class Taking Examinations Before Oregon Supreme Court.

(By Journal Leased Salem Wire.)
Salem, Or., June 9.—The largest class of applicants that have ever appeared to be admitted to the Oregon bar took the examinations yesterday before the supreme court at Salem. There are 45 applicants, two of whom are women, Gladys Buckman of Portland and Manah Langley of Forest Grove. It was announced by Chief Justice Moore at the beginning of the examination that the standard of examinations had been raised this year. The applicants will be required to answer all the questions presented, \$1 in number, and will be allowed two days in which to do the work. Heretofore the examination has covered but one day, and the applicants were required only to answer questions they could within that time.

Chief Justice Moore also announced that the class would be graded on logic, orthography and grammar more closely than in previous years.

STRANGLING GAS FILLS A LINER

Ammonia Fumes From Ice Plant Overcome the China's Passengers.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
San Francisco, June 9.—Passengers aboard the Pacific Mail steamship China that arrived in port today narrowly escaped a horrible death yesterday when a valve in the vessel's ice plant burst, flooding the first class cabins with suffocating ammonia fumes.

A dozen women and children were overcome by the gas and were rescued with great difficulty by fellow passengers and members of the crew. Several passengers were confined to their staterooms as a result of the accident.
