

GRANDEST OF SPECTACLES TONIGHT

Allegorical Pageant Made Up of Rose Decorated Floats to Parade Through the Principal Streets of the City.

The Spirit of the Golden West, climax and symbol of the Rose Festival, is due in Portland tonight. During the fore part of the week the celebration has been gathering momentum for the pageant of tonight which will mark the crest of the week's festivities and the effort to please and interest the guests of the city.

The floats for this spectacle are all ready, and will be in line for their appearance tonight. Great care and labor have been expended in their construction, and much thought has been given by General Manager George L. Hutchins to the working out of the general scheme of the pageant.

The Spirit of the Golden West spectacle is intended to teach a lesson of the growth and development of the great northwest from the time when the pioneers made their first settlements here until the present day, showing the great strides of growth, the great possibilities, wealth and opportunity held out to those who come here to make homes and build fortunes.

Floats Masqued With Roses. Tonight, too, the roses will make their great entrance into the scheme of the week's festival. In former parades and exhibitions roses have been used for decorative purposes, but tonight will be the floral show of the week. All the floats will be massed of roses, and on every hand the distinctive flower of the city will be the basis for the decorative effects.

In this spectacle also will appear all of the visiting delegations from many parts of the country. Out of town floats, from Hawaii, from Seattle, from many places will take their places, accompanied by their delegations and lend their support and aid in making the panorama a great success of many wonders. COLLEGE CHARGES ARE EXPLAINED

Investigating Body Finds No Corrupt Practices at Pullman.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)

Pullman, Wash., June 10.—The charges which have been made against the State College have proved, upon investigation by the legislative investigating committee, to be without foundation. The charge that the college had collected interest on federal funds has been explained to the satisfaction of the committee. It being shown that the interest had in fact been placed to the credit of the college instead of any individual.

The charge that Regent Barnard, who is agent for the American Book company, was used his influence as a regent to induce the college to use his books, is shown to be without foundation. The actual proportion of books published by that company in use at the college being but 4 per cent.

Regents Can Build.

The question of whether or not the board of regents has the right to construct buildings on the campus without supervision by the state board of control was discussed and the college authorities maintained that the law of 1907 giving the board of control supervision of the construction of buildings under the appropriation act of 1907, did not repeal the law of 1891, which gave the power to the regents, but applied only to the building specified in the act of 1907. This is one of the principal complaints lodged against the regents.

Baroness Urju at Vassar.

Poughkeepsie, N. Y., June 10.—Baroness Urju, wife of the Japanese vice admiral, declared yesterday as she left Vassar college, from which she graduated in 1880, that she had enjoyed everything American, including girls and ideals. "You have advanced 30 years in America since I left," said the baroness, "yet in our country we have advanced many, many more years." Before departing for West Point the baroness presented the college with a silver bowl, a gift from the emperor of Japan.

POPE SLOW TO NAME CARDINALS

Papal Secretary Impatient but Unable to Move Pontiff to Act.

Rome, June 10.—Cardinal Merry del Val, papal secretary of state, will urge at next autumn's consistory the creation of an American and French cardinal, according to a general belief in Vatican circles. His desire to confer the red hat upon archbishops of the nationalities is thought to be based upon political reasons, and it is no secret that he favored such appointment before the recent adjournment of the consistory.

There are now several vacancies in the college, but plans of pressure, said to have been brought to bear for the appointment of certain American, French and German archbishops, may have engendered a disposition in favor of waiting for affairs to adjust themselves before definite action is taken.

The failure of the consistory to create new cardinals before its recent adjournment is said to have been discussed by Cardinal Merry del Val and the pope.

The pope, who treats his secretary of state with a paternal kindness, replied: "At times the plans of God's will on earth, as well as God's own plans, can not be scrutinized."

The cardinal, still unsatisfied, reminded the pope of the recent deaths in the sacred college and of the existing 16 vacancies.

"What can we do, your eminence? We can not but let them die," the pope replied.

It is said that the efforts of the pope to place the Vatican finances on a firmer footing may be one of the reasons for his permitting the many vacancies to exist. The supreme pontiff, it is thought, is anxious to hold in check the disbursements that the large allowances made to cardinals would necessitate.

TAX COMMISSION SEEKS NEW PLAN

(By Journal—Leased Salem Wire.)

Salem, Or., June 10.—One of the most serious and complicated problems with which the state tax commission is wrestling, at this early stage of its organization, is the formulation of an equitable and practicable system of assessment of real property according to its true cash value, location, environment, etc. In order that such a comprehensive system may be formulated upon which to base next year's assessment, a letter is being sent out to every assessor in the state asking for a detailed report upon local conditions relating to real property valuations and for cooperation in arriving at a solution to the perplexing problem.

Many Difficulties to Be Met.

This fact developed at a meeting of the tax commission held in the executive chambers yesterday afternoon and for cooperation in arriving at a solution to the perplexing problem. During a general discussion of the plans and duties of the commission, elaborated upon the difficulties which confront the commission in formulating a proportionate system upon which to base real property valuations for the purpose of taxation. Assessors Want Plan.

Assessors in nearly every county of the state are asking the commission for advice concerning a comprehensive method of assessment under the provisions of the new law, and display a marked disposition to comply strictly with the provisions of the law requiring the assessment of property at its full cash value. They are put under a strong oath in this respect under the new tax code and will be held strictly responsible for any act of violation on their part by the commission. For this year at least the assessors have been notified that the duty of assessing corporate properties will devolve solely upon them and will be responsible accordingly. They display a disposition to cooperate with and assist the commission in every way they can, and the commission is forwarding copies of the tax laws as fast as they are being delivered by the state printer.

Commissioner Tours State.

Commissioner Eaton has but recently returned from a tour of all of the counties east of the Cascade mountains, except Lake and Klamath, during which he interviewed all of the assessors and other officials connected with the assessment and collection of tax and he reports that the problem of arriving at an equitable system of assessment of real property is more serious in that section of the state than in the western part because of the vast territory of undeveloped lands which, in their present state, are of practically little cash value to the owners except for grazing purposes, compared with real property west of the mountains.
