Extended Street Railway—Franchise for construction of a street railway extension on the Barnes road from the end of the Washington street line was granted by the county court yesterday to the Portland Street Railway company. The new line will run 1500 feet along the Barnes road and then turn on private property, winding up on the hillside back of the city park. The company will receive no revenue from the franchise. Work must begin within six months and the line completed within 18 months. If not completed within that time the county may forfeit the franchise or finish the work of construction and charge the expense to the company.

Identified as a Crook—Identified by a number of police detectives as a daring eastern crook, John Williams, one of the trio of alleged pickpockets arrested Tuesday night, when confronted with rogues' gallery pictures of himself admitted his identity last night. Williams, Burdett and Fisher, the companion of the trio, were all released in \$200 bail each yesterday. The authorities were unable to do anything but give the men their freedom, as they were held on no specific charges and were able to furnish bail. The men are declared to be well known to the police in many cities over the country as desperate crooks.

Gets Small Returns—Judgment for \$389 in favor of Joseph Badura, an east side butcher, against Dr. P. L. McKenna, was awarded by a jury in Judge Cleveland's department of the circuit court yesterday. Badura alleged that he was induced to pay \$3000 for worthless mining stock, and that he was afterward given three notes for \$5000 each to pay him. One of these notes was from McKenna, but the latter would not pay.

Detective Coleman in Seattle—Responding to an appeal, sent out by the Seattle police department, Detective Coleman of the Portland city detective bureau, has gone to the exposition and the men who have feared that the reign of crime in Seattle would endanger the success of the exposition and the call for help from neighboring cities.

Judges Off to See Parade—The circuit court suspended work this afternoon in honor of the Rose Festival. Presiding Judge Bronaugh announced that all cases unfinished at noon would go over until tomorrow. County Clerk Fields and other county officials have also arranged to give their employees a half holiday either today or later in the week.

GIVES ALL HIS ATTENTION TO MASOCCRY

Daniel Richardson, Sovereign Grand Commander of Supreme Council, Says Even Preservation of Nations Depends on Order.

Oregon bodies of Scottish Rite Masonry in the southern jurisdiction began their annual reunion in the Scottish Rite cathedral, Sixteenth and Morrison streets, this morning. This year it is the unusual honor of the order to have as leader the distinguished James Daniel Richardson, sovereign grand commander of the supreme council and possibly the leading Mason in the world today. Mr. Richardson comes from Washington, D. C., where his permanent headquarters are in the cathedral of the supreme council in which the biennial meetings of the organization are held. In addition the meeting is to become notable because of the large class of candidates initiated through the mysteries of the higher degrees of Masonry. There were 50 candidates present this morning to take the fourth, fifth and sixth degrees. The work will be continued in administration of succeeding degrees until the thirty-second degree will be given to a class of 75. Mr. Richardson is today sovereign grand commander of the order because he believes Masonry more important and more essential to the welfare of the nation than politics. This he said this morning while telling of so much of his work as the public may know and having at the moment distinctly in mind an experience of 20 years in the congress of the United States as a representative from Tennessee.

Masonry Develops Righteousness. "Masonry develops civic and moral righteousness. It caters to the highest ethical ideals; it demands of men that they be manly and forceful in their relation to the world," said Mr. Richardson in the course of his conversation with a Journal man. He continued: "My people from Tennessee sent me to congress during 1908. I am not party having any other candidate than myself." In this connection Mr. Richardson modestly mentioned that his name had also been prominently before the house for speaker and that he could have won the honor had he more actively interested in securing it. Instead he turned to the subject nearest his heart, Masonry.

My view of the work done among the Masons convinced me that the full time and attention of one man was necessary in order for the best and most permanent development of the order. I compared my opportunities for service in this relation with what I was able to do in this people and I found that the most peculiar mission lay here. So for the past few years I have been giving the best I have in the way of time, strength and thought to the work and development of the order. Time only ripened the conviction that the service is worth while.

Make Progress in Mexico. "Why, a short time ago I had the honor of attending the meeting of the supreme council, A. and A. S. Rite, for the republic of Mexico, which was held in the historic old city of Mexico. President Diaz is sovereign grand commander for Mexico as I am in this country. The office is for life. I found the Rite splendidly prosperous. New cathedrals were being built; in wealth and in influence development was going on. And this is what President Diaz said to me: 'The greatest factor in obtaining good government for Mexico is the Masons. The men who stand highest and nearest to me in the administration of government are the Masons. The men in whom I put my trust most implicitly are Masons. The men upon whom I most rely are Masons. They are the best and most loyal citizens.'"

Mr. Richardson, when he began talking was sitting quietly in his room at the Hotel Portland. But as he went on his utterance became more rapid and enthusiastic, his bearing more commanding until when he finished he was pacing up and down the room, firing sentences as at an imaginary enemy, and completely forgetful of his small audience. In answer to a question Mr. Richardson explained that in Mexico at the present time the party in power, headed by President Diaz, had been unusually to guard against undermining plots and hostility among men who on the surface are the most loyal. Among all these crises in the life of the nation President Diaz has been able to rely implicitly on the good faith of any man known as a Mason. His explanation was necessary in order to add proper significance to the statements Mr. Richardson quoted of President Diaz.

Has Vast Jurisdiction. Mr. Richardson's jurisdiction includes 31 states, all the territories, Alaska, Philippine Islands, China and Japan. He visits as many of the bodies as he can. His present journey has already kept him 50 days away from Washington and he will spend 35 days more visiting bodies in Idaho, Wyoming and Montana. All the states south of the Ohio and west of the Mississippi are under his jurisdiction. He is accompanied by Erasmus Garr, a member of the Supreme Council, from Miles City, Mont.

On any proposed subject but politics Mr. Richardson would speak. "Not because I am not keenly interested in any more," he said, waving a deprecating hand, "but because when I took up my present duties I put politics away from me. Among Masons there are many men of many persuasions, politically. Hence, in our work, nothing savoring of politics may enter. But I am, nevertheless, watching the progress of national events and the solving of the great problems of the day with as much personal concern and interest as though I some time expected to get back into the arena again."

GETS \$1 VERDICT AND WILL APPEAL CASE

L. A. Bertillon won a \$1 verdict in the circuit court in the suit brought against him by Oscar W. Mueller, a bricklayer, for damages to a brick building. The jury that heard the testimony yesterday having returned a sealed verdict in his favor last night. Mueller and Bertillon had a brick fight encounter one night in January on Hoyt street. Bertillon says he stumbled against Mueller's sister who accidentally and knocked her down. Mueller and the sister claimed that he struck her without provocation. As a result of the mixup Mueller sued for over \$700 damages, and Bertillon came back with a cross complaint asking for \$1500. Mueller has given notice of appeal.

STREETCARS COLLIDE; MOTORMAN INJURED

Ignorance of the operation of streetcars was given today as the cause of the rear end collision at midnight last night between car No. 237 of the Union avenue line and No. 211 of the Woodlawn line, near Union avenue and Morrison streets, in which G. S. Shattuck, motorman, who is blamed for the crash, was bruised and rendered unconscious. Shattuck is at the Good Samaritan hospital. Physicians declare that he will be able to be out in a few days.

Street railway officials blame only Shattuck for the crash. In charge of the rear car, No. 237, which was closely following No. 211. When the lead car stopped at 43rd street to take on a passenger, Shattuck, according to witnesses, grew confused and lost control of his car, which crashed into the other. Shattuck was unconscious for some time. Shattuck had been working as a motorman but a short time.
