

MRS. GOULD'S FLOATS MAY GO TO A-Y-P. FAIR

CELEBRITY IS HAZY

(United Press Leased Wire.)
New York, June 14.—Katherine Gould resumed the witness stand today in her suit for separate maintenance against her husband, Howard Gould, and was subjected to another terrible grilling by Attorney Nicolli, who is conducting the cross-examination for the defense.

Mrs. Gould related the details of an automobile trip to Castle Gould with Dustin Farnum, September 19. An accident occurred on the trip and they returned to their apartments in different machines.

On her trip to Lynchburg, Mrs. Gould said, a maid accompanied her.

A dispute arose between the opposing counsel took place when Nicolli questioned the witness about her trip to Atlantic City when Farnum, Miss Robinson and Miss Salla were in the party.

Nicolli then introduced a plan of the seventh floor of the Atlantic City hotel and endeavored to get Mrs. Gould to locate her room. She said she was unable to recall which room she was located in but the court instructed her to assume that the chart was a plan of her apartment.

Mrs. Gould followed the court's instructions, but parried Nicolli's question regarding the relative locations of her apartment and that occupied by Farnum. She said she was unable to recall the details of the arrangement and she did not recall the location of Farnum's room.

She said she recalled that there were two single beds in her room.

Farnum and Finauces.
Nicolli then introduced two letters written by the witness to her husband after he had abandoned her. They were signed, "Affectionately, Katherine." In one letter Mrs. Gould thanked her husband for paying a bill and another related to an overdrawn bank account and asked for money. This last letter was written in January, 1907, and after Gould deposited \$5000 to her credit, three different times.

The witness identified pictures of Farnum, but denied writing inscriptions which appeared on them.

With the introduction of the photographs the cross-examination closed and the prosecution took up the redirect examination of the witness.

Referring to the notes she sent to the manager of Castle Gould, the witness explained that the terms "Dear Mr. Malory" were simply politeness.

"Reasonable" Dressing.
Explaining her idea of "reasonable" prices for clothing, Mrs. Gould gave the following table:

Morning gown, \$150.
Afternoon gown, \$250.
Tea gown, \$350 to \$500.
Dinner gown, \$350 to \$500.
Street dress, \$250.
Hats, \$40 to \$50.

She said she hired an automobile at \$500 a month while staying at the Belmont, where her apartment cost \$300 a week, and declared it cost \$900 a month for servants, to keep up a private house in New York.

On rebuttal she declared that gowns were of the latest fashion and worn once at Palm Beach or at the St. Regis, where she changed her clothes three times a day.

The witness was given until the afternoon recess to study a map of the Vanderbilt cup race course in 1906, which Nicolli introduced in order to get the location of the road she and Farnum took when their automobile broke down.

President Chilberg Negotiates With Rose Festival Management.

Officials of the Rose Festival association and the Seattle A-Y-P. exposition are now trying to arrange details for sending a number of the floats recently used in the festival parades here to Seattle for display at the Oregon day at the fair. President Chilberg and other officials were in Portland some time ago and made partial arrangements for the transporting of the floats to the fair city and this week the final negotiations will probably be closed.

The Northern Pacific Railroad company has promised to transport the floats to Seattle free of charge and with this inducement in front of them the officials have their biggest hindrance out of the way. Many of the outside towns plan sending their floats to Seattle, and in fact have already asked that they be returned in order that they may be sent to Seattle and also for use in their respective Fourth of July celebrations. Most of the floats of the great "Spirit of the Golden West" parade will be sent, however.

On every side today nothing but praise is being heaped on the manager George L. Hutchins in organizing and directing the festival. Much of the work of lining up the parades, working out the details of the floats and the original ideas fell upon Mr. Hutchins.

WAS BEATEN AND ROBBED IN ROOM

Joseph Leddy of Oregon City Accuses Two Acquaintances.

Joseph Leddy, who came here yesterday from Oregon City, appeared at police headquarters with a tale of being beaten and robbed yesterday in the Albana rooming house, Sixth and Burnside streets, and as a result George Rande and E. J. Farrell have been arrested on a charge of assault and larceny from the person. Their cases were set for hearing in the municipal court for tomorrow.

Leddy says that yesterday morning while walking on Burnside street with Rande he met Farrell. Rande borrowed \$1 from him with which to buy beer. He says that Rande secured six bottles of beer and then he and Rande went to the room in the Albana house, where he fell asleep after drinking. He was awakened, he states, by a hand on his shoulder and found the two men mauling him. They then took \$25 from him, all the money he had, and he states threatened him with a white handled razor by holding it to his throat. Rande is accused of holding the razor to his throat with threat to kill him if he did not give up the money. Rande then cut him on the throat and shows cuts in evidence, as well as a badly battered face, cut lips and swollen jaws.

Leddy states that he only managed to make his escape by telling the men he could get \$10 from the landlady, and that on this pretext he was able to get into the street. When arrested Rande had a white handled razor in his possession.

LIGHT FINGERED TRIO DISCHARGED

No Crime Can Be Proved Against Suspects on Way to the Seattle Fair.

Ed Burdette, Charles Fisher and John Williams, the trio who were picked up last Tuesday by Detectives Tichenor and Howell on suspicion of being pickpockets and who were arrested on a charge of vagrancy, were discharged in police court this morning by Judge Van Zante. The men had already left town on \$200 bail each and were represented in court by Attorney John Stevenson.

Judge Van Zante held with Attorney Stevenson that the men could not be considered guilty of being pickpockets on their own statement and that they were discharged unless it could be shown that they had committed some crime in this part of the country. As this could not be shown, the men were discharged and visitors at the Rose Festival and as such have a lawful right to be here the charge was dismissed and the men discharged.

UNFAIRNESS CHARGED BY RIVAL BIDDERS

The Badger Meter company of St. Paul, unsuccessful bidder for a \$20,000 meter contract recently awarded by the city executive board to the Pittsburgh Meter company, has filed charges that the latter firm took an unfair advantage of rivals by submitting bids on two types of hydrants and substituting the Keylock B model when the other failed to find favor with the executive board. The charges were filed at the meeting of the executive board at the late afternoon special session today.

TWO ACCUSED OF COUNTERFEITING

Carl P. Mohon and Morris Ralston Arrested at Seattle.

Seattle, June 14.—The police and government secret service men have arrested here two men whom they suspect of being counterfeiters. The prisoners are Carl P. Mohon and Morris Ralston. The authorities believe they have the men responsible for flooding Seattle, Tacoma and other northern cities with spurious silver halves and dollars since last March.

Mohon, who claims to be a telegrapher unemployed was arrested by Patrolman Ziebarth at the baseball game yesterday afternoon just after he had given a boy two counterfeit halves which he had purchased tickets to the game for himself and the woman accompanying him. The woman escaped and is still at large.

From papers found on Mohon at police headquarters his room and that of Ralston were located at Here Thomas E. Foster, operative in charge of the Puget sound secret service district, found and arrested Ralston, also Cora St. Clair, with whom Ralston was living. The woman, the secret service men think, is not implicated in the case.

The interior of the building is decorated with French and American flags and the occasion is expected to be a brilliant one.

PRESIDENT OF BRAZIL REPORTED TO HAVE DIED

Washington, June 14.—Alfonso Penna, president of Brazil, died at 7:30 o'clock this morning, according to dispatches received here from the American minister at Rio de Janeiro.

Dispatches from the Brazilian capital last night stated that Penna was dangerously ill. Up to that time no intimation had been received that he was not enjoying his usual health.

At the time of his election to the presidency, Penna was vice president of the republic and president of the Brazilian senate. Previously he served as president of his state and governor of the Bank of the Republic.

He was elected to the highest office in 1906, and would have remained in office until 1910. During his administration he accomplished much for the general good of the republic. The consummation of the recently signed arbitration treaty and the negotiation of a \$40,000,000 loan for naval purposes were largely the results of his diplomacy and ability.

MINISTERS ELECT ARMS PRESIDENT

Presbyterian General Assembly Proceedings Discussed at Association Meeting.

At the last meeting before the summer adjournment the Presbyterian Ministerial association this morning elected officers for the coming year as follows: President, Rev. George W. Arms Jr.; secretary-treasurer, Rev. Harry P. Leeds. Mr. Arms appointed as program committee Rev. Mr. Leeds, Rev. D. A. Mackenzie and Rev. Harry Pratt.

Speeches of the general assembly were heard from delegates and from others who were in attendance at Denver. Holt said that it had been spoken of among those in attendance as the best assembly in this respect that had been held for 20 years.

In relation to the question of reduced representation which has come up in connection with the general assembly, Rev. Charles Hays said that he had been considering a plan to bring the deliberations of the body into more compact form. He saw no reason why the assembly should not form a whole big body of 1000 or 1200 men to which all reports should be made and have the whole body divided into sections consisting of moderators and composed of representative men from all parts of the country whose decision in a deliberation should be final on the various questions as to home or foreign missions or other business which must be transacted.

Another criticism which was made and which was concurred in by all who had been present was that of too much applause, especially on matters of serious import. Dr. Hays speaking from the standpoint of a member of the judicial commission said that it is impossible to make any decision which will not hurt somebody and that he thought the reason why the assembly should not be so large was that it was too large.

On account of the interesting matters brought up it was voted to extend the time. Rev. W. S. Holt, field secretary for home missions was present and reviewed the recent session of the board, bringing out particularly the fine spirit shown by Rev. Alexander Mackenzie, D. of California, who retired from the candidacy for moderator and who seconded Dr. Hill's nomination for that position.

Rev. William Hiram Poulkes, Rev. D. A. Thompson and Rev. J. R. Landsborough also gave impressions of the assembly. Several visiting members were present, notably Rev. Dr. Kiehl of Minnesota, Rev. Paul McClintock of Hainan, China, and Rev. John H. Lamb of Manila, P. I.

FIRE BURNS ROOF BEFORE DISCOVERED

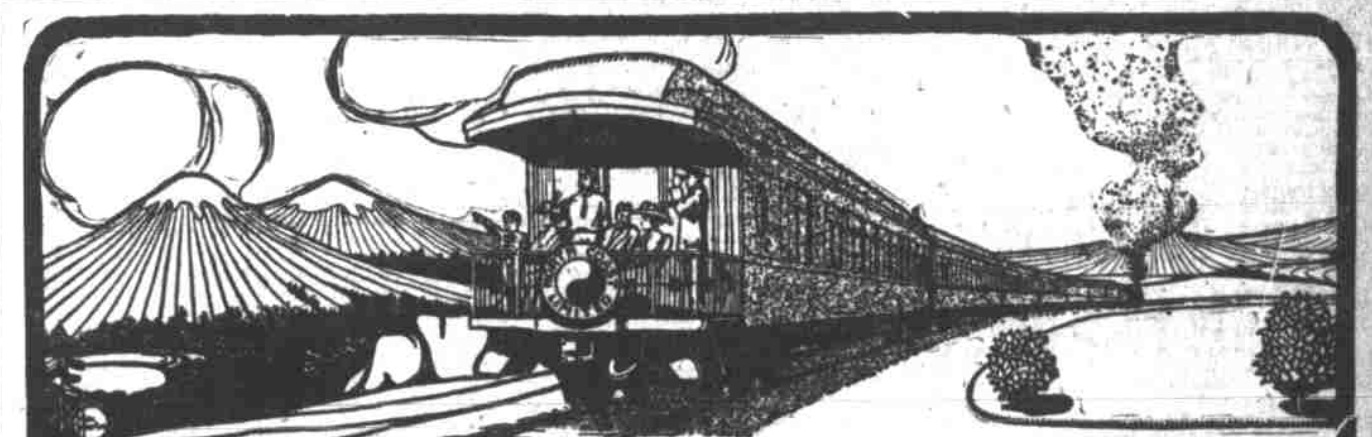

any crime more dangerous to the state or to our young men? The crime which the defendant has committed would, if persistently committed, destroy our state and our institutions.

"The case resolves itself into two questions; one, 'Was there a bribe offered to Nicholas?' the other, 'Did the defendant legally responsible for

the offering of that bribe?"
"That there was a bribe offered Nicholas does not admit of any doubt. The law does not require that the offering of a bribe shall follow any prescribed course of technical observance. It says that the charge of offering a bribe hinges upon the question of the intention of the person who makes the offer."

O'Gara then read from the testimony of Nicholas and James L. Galassini, who they told of the offers of bribes for their votes in the trolley franchise matter. He reviewed the proceedings at the time of the passages of the trolley ordinance in Mowry hall and laid particular stress on the fact that there was no discussion of the ordinance nor

debate nor reference to committees as is the usual procedure in such cases. He said that the bribes which they were alleged to have received were authorized by Patrick Calhoun and paid with the United Railroad's money. He said: "If you are satisfied that the \$200,000 received by Calhoun at the United States mint was used to pay the supervisors for their votes, then you will have no difficulty in deciding that Patrick Calhoun is guilty of the crime charged. The law does not require us to show that Patrick Calhoun went personally to Nicholas and said: 'Here, Nicholas, if you vote yes on the overhead trolley matter I'll give you \$4,000.' The man who gets through another is himself guilty."
