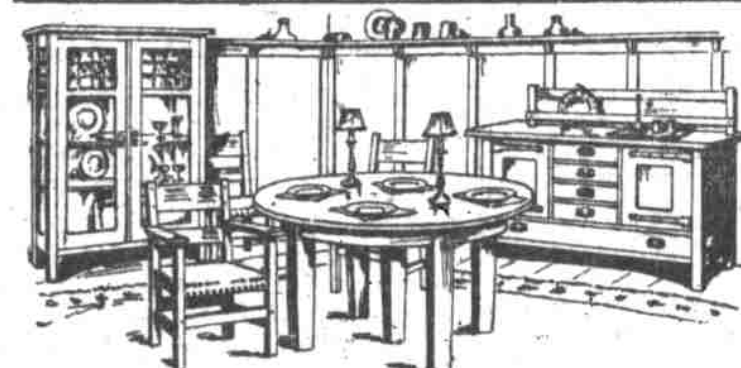

**TRUSTY ESCAPES
STATE PRISON**

H. E. Roberts, from Multnomah County, Crawls in Fields to Liberty.

(By Journal Leased Salem Wire.)
Salem, Or., June 14.—H. E. Roberts, trusty, escaped from the guards at the state penitentiary about 8:30 o'clock this morning and has so far eluded all efforts to capture him. Roberts was employed with 32 other convicts on a railroad grade in an open field between the penitentiary and asylum. He was serving three years for larceny having been committed from Multnomah

county, and had one and one half years to serve.

The gang from which Roberts escaped engaged in building a spur from the penitentiary to the asylum, a distance of about 1000 yards. A large number of convicts have been on the job for the past three or four weeks. Grain fields surround both institutions. It being several miles to wooded country.
On Hands and Knees Through Grain.
It is thought Roberts jumped over a low board fence into the next field and crawled on his hands and knees through the standing grain until he was out of reach. It was an hour or so before his absence was noticed, but officers have traced him north past the fair grounds. His capture is expected at any time for his chance of getting away entirely is poor.
Roberts is about 25 years of age, weight about 140 pounds, with dark hair and brown eyes, five feet and five inches in height. He wore the faded gray of the Oregon state prisoners.

**THREE OF FAMILY
INJURED BY HORSES**

Posner, Wash., June 14.—Through two runaways on Thursday afternoon, three members of the Piening family, wealthy Germans of the Horse Heaven district, were injured. The two accidents occurred within two hours.
Johann Piening, a wheat rancher, and his daughter-in-law, Mrs. Otto Piening, started from their home to visit neighbors. The team driven to the back became frightened, and after running a short distance, upset the back, and both Piening and Mrs. Piening were thrown out, receiving serious injuries. Rudolph and Otto Piening, sons of the injured man, were working some

distance from the home when notified of the accident. They sent Otto's son, Philip, to the home with one of the teams that had been in the field, while they went to the scene of the accident. A severe dust storm came up while the boy was making the trip, and he was thrown from the wagon, being severely injured.
Both Johann Piening and his grandson were brought to Posner and are now at the Riverside sanatorium. Owing to the advanced age of Johann Piening, it will be some time before he will recover.
