

WATER BOARD CITY RECEIPTS HAVE DECREASED

Pittsburg Concern Compels City to Readvertise for New Bids on 5000 Water Meters—Water Board Will Hold Special Meeting Tomorrow.

Mayor Lane will call a special meeting of the city water board tomorrow afternoon to rescind a contract for 5000 water meters awarded by the board to the Pittsburg Meter company three weeks ago. H. J. Miller, agent for the meter company, represented that the water meters of the type he wished to sell, were guaranteed not to make more than 250 oscillations, and when the officials of the company learned of the conditions under which the meters were ordered they refused to sign the contract with the city, as they were only able to guarantee a minimum of 250 oscillations for the key-stone "type E" meter, the one ordered by the water board.

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was a great question as to whether such a system would ever pay for the money invested. He wired money to the relief corporation when the city was in a bad way and he—this man who has done so much for San Francisco—he is the man who stands before you accused of a crime which has not been proved.

"The prosecution made much weight of Calhoun's failure to put Ford upon the stand. If the prosecution wanted Ford on the stand why didn't they put him on? They might have dismissed the 14 indictments pending against him and given him a chance to testify without fear or promise of reward."

Scores "Spy and Traitor." King then stated that he would brush aside all of the "trash" and "rubbish" which had been brought into the case by the prosecution. He referred to the indirect evidence of the many side issues of the trial which were made in court by Henry and Burns. He scored Detective John Helms as a spy and a traitor, and averred that the search warrant order by which Calhoun's offices were raided merely covered a determined effort to get at Calhoun's private papers.

"Why," he said, "they seized 2000 papers down there and when they brought them into court they could only identify 800. Think of it! Twelve hundred papers were seized that they could not identify. There was nothing criminal in the United Railroads or Calhoun getting reports on jurors. They had a right to do it. They had a right to get copies of Burns' reports. But this man Burns sent Helms to Abbott to be a traitor and spy as he is discovered. Nobody respects a spy. Burns' work here in these graft cases has been the most outrageous spy system in the history of the country."

Calls It a Business War.

King dropped Burns for a moment and turned to Spreckels, who sat near Henry. "This man Spreckels," he said, "the man who wanted to start a street car system of his own, started the graft prosecution. He employed one of the most astute detectives in the country, William J. Burns. He injected his own man into the district attorney's office and then we have a private attorney in the role of an assistant district attorney and a private detective assigned to work on a certain class of cases."

"The crowd today at the courtroom was as large as that yesterday. Fully one fourth of those who gained admittance were women. Calhoun was surrounded with an array of friends, attorneys and detectives. Seated next to him were William M. Abbott and Frey L. Ford, while grouped around the table were the two Moores, Attorney John J. Barrett, Luther Brown, Earl Rogers, Lewis R. Rydington, Herman Heinsoe, a bedeviled named Maynard and a score of agents, detectives and sympathizers."

Harry T. Creswell, former Ruef-Schmitz police commissioner, entered the courtroom shortly after court convened and took a chair beside Calhoun, shaking the trolley magnate's hand warmly. He was followed shortly by ex-Judge Farrell, who defended Michael Corey, who was convicted of bookmaking. The police detail was a large one, there being in addition to the mounted men outside and the uniformed men inside possibly a score of plain clothes men in the courtroom to prevent any demonstration.

Nothing Doing at Dinner. King repeatedly questioned the jurors as to whether they thought there was anything wrong in Calhoun, Thorne, Mullely and Ford meeting with Abe Ruef. He scoffed at the idea that Calhoun or his associates would have met with Ruef, gone to the mint or have done other things brought into the case as significant by the prosecution. He said they every move was publicly made. He expressed the opinion of Ruef and Schmitz to Calhoun's house to dinner by stating that a celebrated Danish gentleman was there who desired to meet Ruef and Schmitz. "Do you suppose that if Calhoun had contemplated doing anything wrong that he would have publicly invited Ruef and Schmitz to his house to dinner?" he questioned.

Provide for the Children. "The health, comfort and lives of the children depend on them," said the landscape gardener. "Sooner or later every city will have to make provision for the children. Keeping up the playgrounds of \$25,000 or more a year is a good investment but as yet the people have not been educated up to appreciate the value of such a use of the public money. In other words they haven't learned yet to look that far ahead and consider the future strength, physical and mental, of the race."

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she appeared very excited while at Castle Gould. He said her automobile had broken down, and he could not get out to see whether her excitement and flush were the result of accident or drinking. "I did not get any nearer to her than I could help," responded the witness with a sneer.

This angered the court, who snapped: "These alterations with servants must be stopped." The court then ruled that Gould's attorney must show that Mrs. Gould was intoxicated, or nothing relating to the subject would be permitted to enter the records. Malloy next testified that in the middle of July, 1908, he saw Mrs. Gould under the influence of liquor at some sort, and that the following day she had champagne at luncheon. He said that she was noticeably flushed and that she did not act as she usually did. His attention was attracted to her particularly, he said, by the excited manner in which she rushed upstairs.

Saw Her Drunk Twice. The Englishman testified that on other occasions he had seen Mrs. Gould intoxicated, naming November 6, as one time he believed she was under the influence of liquor, and saying he was certain she was reeling from drink on November 8.

On cross-examination the witness admitted he might be wrong as to some of the dates, but stuck to the story he had told. Attorney Shearn also brought out the fact that after leaving Castle Gould, Malloy had been re-employed about the time of the separation of the pair. He said he hoped Gould would win the case, and in answer to a question as to his attitude toward Mrs. Gould, said he felt sorry for her.

Howard Gould won considerable victory over his wife yesterday, when the court held that the only charge he must answer was desertion, and that if he could prove that her mode of life made necessary the terms upon which he offered to return to her, Mrs. Gould would lose her case.

The ruling was made on Attorney Nicol's motion for dismissal of the entire complaint. The court held that Gould should not be compelled to answer the charges that he was cruel, a libertine or an improper person to live with. He said these charges had not been proved to the satisfaction of the court. Mrs. Gould completed her testimony this afternoon when she swore that she could not locate the roadhouse where she dined with Farnum. Attorney Shearn introduced a copy of the contract held by Manager Malloy of Castle Gould, which provided that he should have "complete control of all servants."

John A. Cameron, formerly an employee as Gould castle, testified that Malloy had ordered him not to allow Mrs. Gould to use the horses and carriages. Former Police Inspector McLaughlin testified regarding his investigation of Mrs. Gould's history. George Gould was called as a witness and testified that he had heard that Katherine was married before she became the wife of Howard. He also testified that his father's estate had never been divided but that Howard's income was between \$700,000 and \$800,000 annually.

CITY RECEIPTS HAVE DECREASED

Less Money for the Incoming Administration; Delinquent Taxes.

For the past ten days City Auditor Barbur's office has been the busiest place in town. His corps of clerks and deputies worked night and day to prepare for the election and the activity was not as yet subsided. Accounts are being overhauled preliminary to furnishing reports and estimates for the incoming administration.

One of the noticeable developments that has resulted from a comparison of this year's receipts and expenditures with those of last year is that the amount of delinquent taxes this month is greater by 2 per cent than it was last year.

This deficit will make a difference in the estimates of expenses for the next six months as the estimates for the year were based upon a total delinquency of 4 per cent in the tax collections. If present indications are a criterion the city will be short 2 per cent on its expected income and expenses will have to be governed accordingly.

Two Fishermen Missing.

Boston, June 15.—Two members of the crew of the fishing schooner Nettie Franklin were lost in a small boat off Highland Light, and it is feared that they perished at sea. When the Franklin arrived in Boston yesterday, Silva reported that eight members of his crew were lost off the light in a dense fog. Subsequently it was learned that six of them had been rescued by another schooner. The other two have not been heard from.

Pendletonians Go Fishing.

Pendleton, Or., June 15.—The Umatilla river and its tributaries seem to have suddenly developed into as good trout streams as are to be found in the northwest and as a result a representative of the finny tribe are being taken by the thousands. It is estimated that a hundred Pendletonians were out Sunday and while all did not catch the limit, trout is occupying a prominent place on the bill of fare in hundreds of local homes.

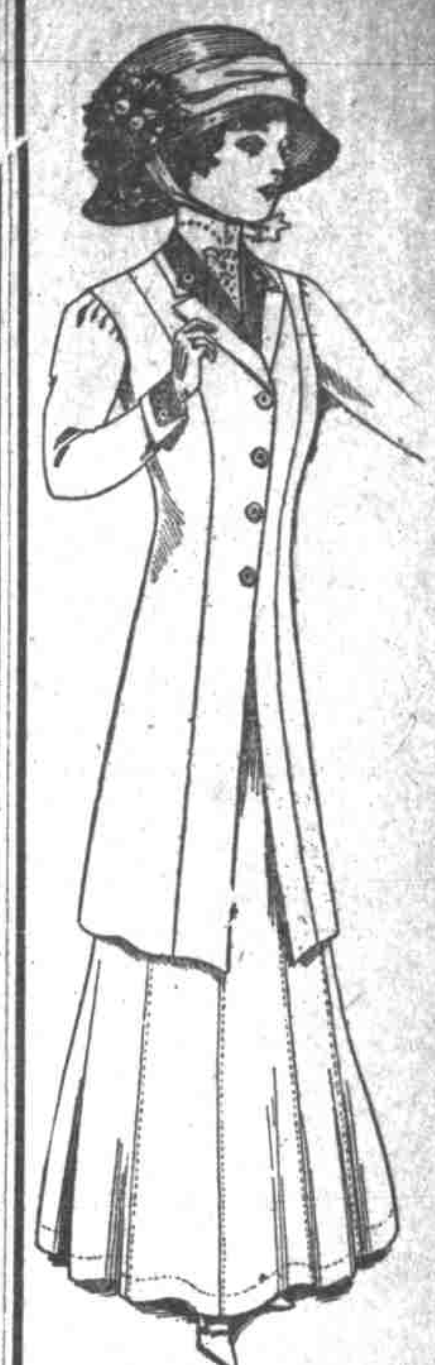
