

THIRTEEN HUNDRED FOR FOOTING OF CITY

Miss Prichard, Director of People's Institute, Suggests That Two New Sites Be Chosen—Favors Albina and North Portland.

At the meeting of the city park board this afternoon Miss Prichard, director of the People's Institute, will tell the board of the plans made by the institute for a system of public playgrounds to be established in various places about the city.

Several hundred dollars is now being expended for new equipment in the north parkway, which is at present the only playground worthy of the name in Portland.

The park board has already agreed to accept the gift as soon as it can be surveyed and approved by the city attorney.

Another land ribbon a mile in length will be secured from the O. & N. company under satisfactory terms can be reached with the owners and with these two pieces as a nucleus the Great Western parkway, planned by Architect J. C. Olmsted, will be secured.

The view to be obtained from Eagle Point is not excelled by any parkway or boulevard in the world, says Superintendent Mische. The view, he says, cannot be given to Mr. Moffett for the public spirit he has shown in materially increasing the park board in his generous donation.

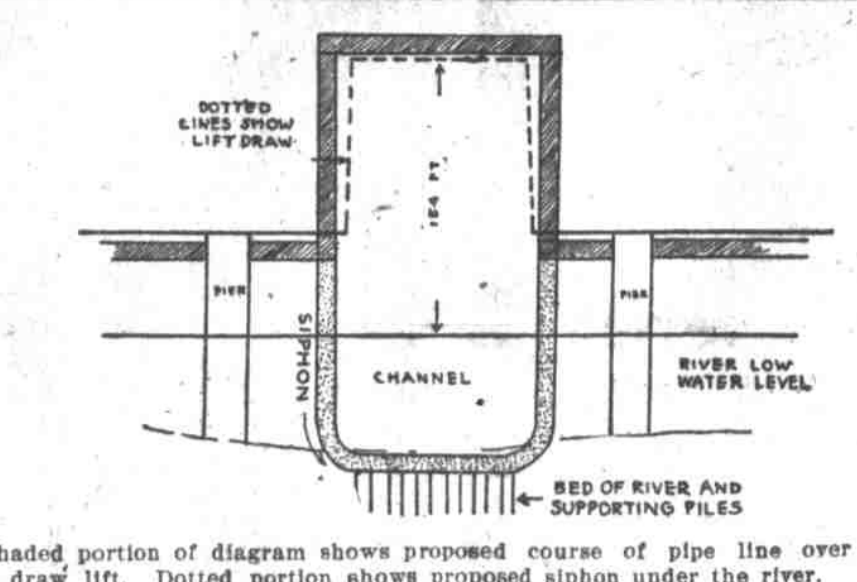

MORE WAYS THAN ONE, BUT ONE IS THE BEST



Shaded portion of diagram shows proposed course of pipe line over draw lift. Dotted portion shows proposed siphon under the river.

The sketch shows two methods by which a pipeline conveying water from the east side to the west side can be brought across the river on the new Madison street bridge. Were it not for the lift draw, the project would be simple. The big pipe would be carried over on extra trusses prepared for the purpose and would rest on these just underneath the floor structure.

According to the plans of Chief Engineer D. D. Clarke of the water department, the pipe can be brought across the draw, either by going underneath the river or over the top of the lift.

If it were to be submerged the tube would assume what is termed a siphon shape. The vertical sides of the siphon would extend down into the river bed below the channel depth and would be connected by means of a flexible joint pipe laid across piles driven into the river bed so as to furnish a firm foundation on which the pipe might lay.

Or the pipe might be carried up the sides of the lift and across on its top. In this case the main would be raised to a height of 154 feet above low water level. Both plans, in the opinion of the engineer, are feasible, he thinks, and is advisable. He says the submerged pipeline, despite its liability to injury, is the best and cheapest way to carry water across the river.

La Follette Says No Hope That Bill Will Fulfill Promises of G. O. P.

Washington, June 16.—Senator La Follette of Wisconsin today gave out a statement severely scolding the tariff bill now before the senate.

He declared that as revised by the senate the bill would be an increase over the Dingley rates. There was no indication, he declared, that the bill as amended would be enacted, would be in accordance with the instructions of the republican platform or satisfactory to the majority of the people.

FREE PRODUCTS OF PHILIPPINES

Senate Adopts Limitation on Amount Imported, But None as to Time.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Washington, June 16.—Defeating various amendments aimed against the free importation of tobacco and sugar from the Philippines, the senate today adopted committee amendments which will permit the free importation of 800,000 pounds of sugar, 1,000,000 pounds of tobacco and 70,000,000 cigars annually from the islands.

The Fletcher amendment, which provided that the present Philippine tariff be retained and that the free importation of sugar and tobacco be prevented, was defeated, 26 to 42.

Dick's amendment, limiting the free importation of sugar from the Philippines to two years, was also lost, 35 to 43.

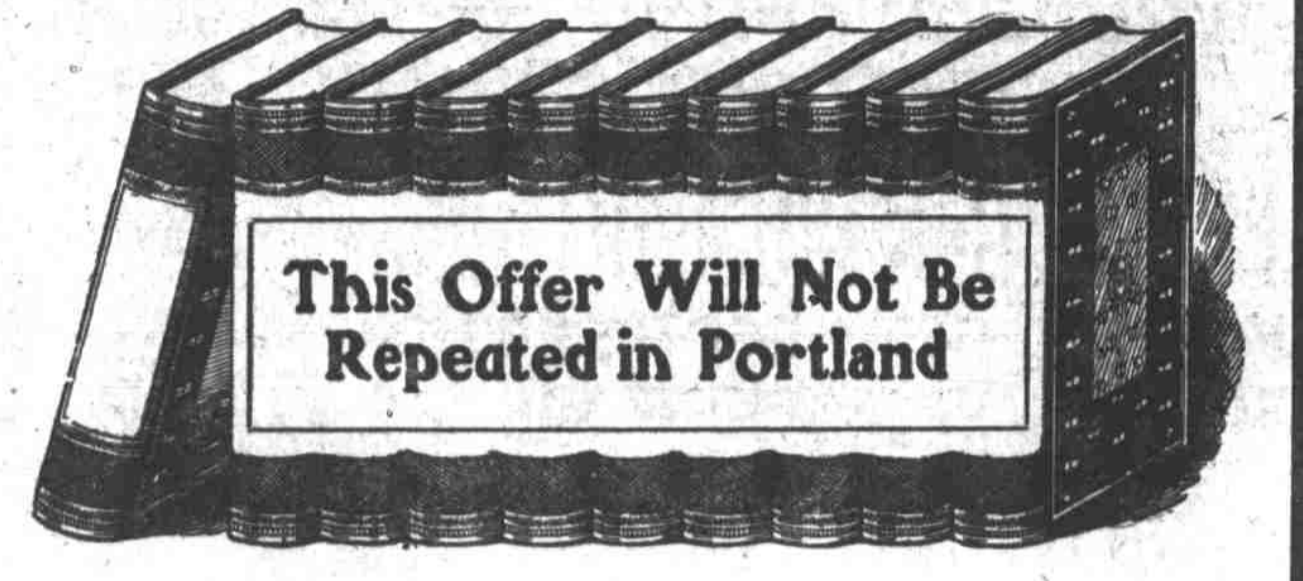
