

WORKMEN REEL
REVEREND RELIC
"Lewis and Clark" Tree at
St. Helens Removed; Site
For Sawmill.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
St. Helens, Or., June 16.—The "Lewis and Clark" tree, the venerable old oak tree which sheltered for a time the Lewis and Clarke expedition 106 years ago, is being cut into wood. It was felled yesterday afternoon by workmen employed in preparing the foundation for the tramways of the McCormick sawmill, while practically the entire population of St. Helens watched with interest and even veneration.

After the awful calamity of the fire had settled down on the people, a new generation seemed to attach to the friendly old tree. Time and again it was suggested that the burned wreck be removed, but immediately a remonstrance went forth from the people, and it was impossible for the street department to destroy the old landmark. "No man can cut that tree without a fight," was a standing remark about the town.

Mill Work Progresses.

St. Helens, Or., June 16.—The task of placing the boilers and immense driving wheels in the McCormick sawmill is about completed and a force of men is driving piling along the water front for the tramways, which will be used to pile and load the product of the saws. tional banks (otherwise taxed), savings banks and building and loan associations, an excise measured by 2 per cent on the net income of such corporations. This is an excise tax upon the income of doing business as an artificial entity and is a freedom from general partnership liability enjoyed by those who invest in stock. I am informed that a 2 per cent tax of this character would result in payment into the treasury of not less than \$25,000,000.
