

WILL BE STRICT HANDLING LIQUOR

Hotel Men to Manage Grill
Rooms in Perfect
Manner

Resolutions endorsing a policy of law-abiding decency in the handling of liquor in hotel grills and dining rooms will be adopted at the next meeting of the Oregon State Hotel association.

"Rather than take advantage of the apparent liberty granted us by the recent city election, local hotels will be more strict than ever in the sale of liquor," declared a prominent member of the association yesterday.

"We desire to raise the business to the highest possible plane of respectability, above the possibility of reproach or criticism. Above all, we want to prove that the assertions made during the campaign are true; that we do respect ourselves and our business and that we have no intention of violating any legal or moral principle in carrying on our affairs."

Although the Rose Festival of 1909 has enjoyed nearly a week in history, local hotels are still crowded with guests. At almost all of the Portland hostilities it is impossible to get a room on first application, and many people wait throughout the day for the chance of getting a place to sleep at night, then only to be disappointed.

Hotels here will be crowded during the remainder of the summer," said Manager Howers of the Portland yesterday. "For that matter, this hotel has been running full ever since the summer season began. Our problem is to care for our guests as well as those who will be attending the various conventions which meet in Portland during the summer."

Hotel men are agreed that the business locally was never so good before in Portland's history. All hotel managers are considering plans to increase room before the beginning of another season. For the purpose of relieving the congestion as soon as possible work is being rushed on the annexes to the Imperial and Oregon hotels, and it is possible that their formal opening will be made much sooner than was expected when the work of construction began.

Judge H. J. Bean of Umatilla county, who is a guest at the Imperial, tells an interesting story of land development near his home. Irrigation has been done and is doing marvels, he said yesterday. The government project there is nearing completion, and private companies are constructing large ditches that will add value to thousands of acres of land. Last year, said Judge Bean, crops of fruit from irrigated land netted from \$500 to \$1500 an acre, and prospects for even greater returns this year are good.

Today, June 17, 1909, there will take place a central eclipse of the sun, visible at Washington as a partial eclipse, the sun setting eclipsed. The central eclipse will begin as an annular eclipse and will change in a few seconds to a total, will remain so until within a fraction of a minute of its end, when it will change back to an annular eclipse.

At 31 minutes past 12, the moon and sun will be in conjunction, that is, the moon and sun will be in the same position in the sky apparently, the moon seeming to cover the sun, but this will not happen when the city of Portland will be where it will see the light.

According to approximate computations made by the United States branch hydrographic office, customs house, the eclipse will be about one-fifth of a total eclipse at Portland. It will begin about 4 p. m., local time, and will end about 5:20 p. m. From the nature of the work, 20 to 30 minutes must be allowed at this time of day, from the data given by the nautical almanac.

It may be interesting to note that the moon's shadow strikes the earth at a rate of a minute of arc in Portland time. It meets the earth first at a point in 123 degrees 34 minutes east longitude, just outside of Portland, and in latitude 25 degrees 48 minutes north. The shadow sweeps across the earth and leaves it at 35.8 minutes after 3 p. m. Portland time, and in 93 degrees, 48.2 minutes west longitude, east of here, and in latitude 38 degrees 38.8 minutes north.

The central eclipse at noon will be far out to the westward, and only those living within one degree of the north pole, if there are any, will see it. It will be in latitude north 88 degrees 22.1 minutes, and longitude 172 degrees 29.1 minutes west. The moon eclipse will be in terms of Portland at 31.2 minutes after 3 p. m.

DEMONSTRATION TRAIN ON N. P.

State College of Washington
Will Have Charge
of Work.

Taking up the farming demonstration train work which has proved so successful in Oregon and eastern Washington, the Northern Pacific will operate a farming demonstration train under the direction of the State college of Washington, June 21 to 26, between Vancouver and Puyallup, Wash.

The train will carry a milking machine and full equipment for a modern dairy farm, as well as apparatus for demonstrating spraying, pruning, grafting and cultivating fruit trees. At each stop there will be lectures and demonstrations by members of the faculty of the State college at Pullman, Wash.

Further delay in the repair of the east iron water main, the breaking of which caused the residents of Portland to resort to Willamette river water for several days, was necessitated yesterday afternoon when the water board rejected all bids for a steel sleeve needed for the repair.

The rejection of the bids was necessary because for various reasons each was found to be irregular. Re-advertising of bids was ordered. Three days will be given in which local dealers in iron and steel may submit tenders.

Owing to the mistake of Agent H. I. Miller of the Pittsburgh Meter company, in representing a sample meter to the water board he lost a \$30,000 contract yesterday afternoon when the board rescinded its former action in awarding the contract and ordered bids to be re-advertised for until July 12.

On that date proposals to furnish 5000 meters will be opened by the water board of the Simon administration. Had it not been for the blunder of the meter agent the first installment of the water meters would have arrived in the city by this time and would be installed.

It may be that the next administration will not want to put in additional meters. In that case the efforts of Mayor Lane and the present water board will have gone for naught.

SUNNYSIDE SCHOOL**
The Sunnyside school won the Elks pennant for the best showing in the school children's parade on the east side Friday night. The feature of their drill was the uniform rank of Zouaves that led the procession. An efficient drum corps of five boys was in advance, followed by the other boys in the unique costumes furnished by the Sunnyside Push club, and there were followed by the girls in white frocks.

The neighborhood feels great pride in the children's achievement and the Sunnyside Push club has arranged for a formal presentation and acceptance of the banner at 8 o'clock tomorrow evening at the school so that pupils and parents may have the opportunity to see it before next fall when the matter will not be so fresh in their minds. Adjournment of school today makes this necessary. A delegation from the Elks will make the formal presentation and addresses and Mr. Curtis, principal of the school, will accept the banner.

**CHINESE IN MIXUP
OVER YOUNG WOMAN**

Wong Non Gah, grand master to the Shey Gah Yee Tong and government association of missions at San Francisco and elsewhere, is fearing an attempt upon his life by highlanders, as the outcome of a case involving Dr. Chuk Fong, a Chinese physician of Boise, Idaho, and Lee Bot, his wife. According to Wong Non Gah, Dr. Chuk Fong, upon the death of a former wife, sent the picture of a young man to Lee Bot, who resided in San Francisco, asking her to become his wife. Lee Bot was 20 years old, while the physician was almost 70.

Upon her arrival in Boise, according to Wong Non Gah, the girl was keenly disappointed in finding that she had been deceived, but was forced to accept Fong's proposition.

It was because he treated her brutally that Lee Bot left her husband, says Wong Non Gah. He believes that it is out of his efforts to establish a lodge in Boise, and of which woman are allowed to become members, that his life and that of the young Chinese woman are jeopardized.

About five weeks ago threatening letters were received by Mrs. Fong, Quong Sing, Chung Wen Suey and Wong Non Gah, at Boise. All of these letters contained the same message, threats upon the life of the Chinese agent and Mrs. Chuk Fong.

Wong Non Gah received several more letters, and eleven days ago one came containing a .44 caliber bullet. This letter was evidently sent from California.

The matter has been placed in the hands of Boise attorneys, but no definite clue to the identity of the writers of the letters has yet been found.

Railroad Man Thinks 5000
Will Visit Portland
Next Month.

"I believe there will be 5000 Elks in Portland by the middle or latter part of July," said Assistant General Passenger Agent H. M. Lewis of the "Soo" line yesterday. Mr. Lewis arrived in Portland from St. Paul yesterday morning on his first trip out here since the establishment of the new Soo-Spokane-Portland service, and was enthusiastic about the prospects for large business over the Soo out of Portland this summer.

"Most of these Elks will come to Portland before returning east," said Mr. Lewis, "and they will be excellent advertisers of the resources of the city and state. We have one special train of 250 coming, which is to be known as the Cotton States Special, and which will start from Meridian, Miss., on June 20.
