

REGORD CLASS LEAVES O. A. C.

One Hundred and Twenty-Two Young People Receive Diplomas.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, June 17.—The largest class ever graduated from an agricultural college west of the Rockies received their diplomas Wednesday at O. A. C. The class of 1909 numbers 122 young men and women representing every county in the state, and every state in the northwest. Twenty-nine graduated in electrical engineering; 18 received preparation for a business career in the school of commerce; 15 young ladies received the B. S. degree in domestic science; 17 graduated in agriculture; 10 in civil engineering; 7 in mechanical engineering; 4 in pharmacy; and 4 in mining engineering. 12 men received graduate degrees in advanced technical courses. The 122 graduated this year is a material increase over last year, when but 84 received diplomas.

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SELLING FUTURES IS INDISPENSIBLE

Forceful Report on Stock Exchange Abuses Made by New York Committee.

New York, June 17.—Charging that a large portion of the abuse which have fastened themselves to the stock market grow out of newspaper advertisements of fraudulent schemes, that buying securities and commodities on margins is equivalent to buying property on the part payment plan, that the mercantile and metal exchange have a tendency to do things through inside committees, constitute a few of the many important features of the report of the committee appointed by Governor Hughes to investigate speculation in stocks and commodities and the organization of the business.

The committee also finds that a large part of the stock transactions are for gambling purposes, but it is difficult to determine the legitimate and the illegitimate. That the regulation of the curb market is imperative, and the exchange is largely responsible for abuses which have grown up. The committee finds that the selling of futures in agricultural products is indispensable, and that the selling of shorts is beneficial, as it has a strong tendency to steady the market.

Increase Margins on Futures.
Not only does the committee find abuses which should be corrected, but it suggests means of correction and recommends that the minimum margin on stock purchases be increased from 10 to 20 per cent by order of the exchange, that a law be enacted making the crime larceny for a broker to sell for his own profit the securities or commodities of a customer, that clerks and employees be prohibited from dealing in any of the wares of the exchange. A law allowing an injured customer to recover three times the loss sustained by fake sale or purchase is strongly recommended, as is also a rigid law governing the publishing of advertisements misleading or deceptive in character. To prevent abuses in receiverships, the committee recommends that a time limit be fixed by law, in which the affairs of a concern must be closed up. And, last, the committee strongly recommends that the margin on commodities be increased from the present rate of 10 per cent, to 20 per cent.

Officials Sharply Censured.
While newspapers are scored for not closely scrutinizing the advertisements offered by stock concerns, the men who allow their names to be used as officials without knowing the condition of stock corporations, are severely criticised. "Another serious evil," says the committee, "is the custom of giving standing and prominence to promotions by serving as directors without full knowledge of the affairs of the companies."

Relative to corners the committee says: "The stock exchange must properly adopt a rule providing that the governors shall have power to decide when a corner exists and to fix a settlement on or before the day on which innocent persons from the injury or ruin which may result therefrom. The mere existence of a rule would tend strongly to prevent corners."

**AMUNDSEN'S SHIP
NOW SAN FRANCISCO'S
FEW CANDIDATES:

**HEAD-ON COLLISION
OF SAND TRAINS**

Port Stevens, Or., June 17.—Engine No. 1, in charge of Engineer Butler, while hauling a crew of men out of the old Point Adams lighthouse track collided with engine No. 4, in charge of Engineer Landreth, coming in with a train of sand. Both engines belong to the United States engineer corps.

In the crash the draw heads were torn from the cars and both pilots were killed. Several of the crew were thrown between the cars by the shock, and narrowly escaped serious injury. Mr. Whittemore, the foreman, jumped from the cab of engine No. 5 and landed in a sand pit, resulting in a badly sprained back, which may confine him to his room for some time.

The accident occurred at a point about a mile from the main jetty tracks where the lighthouse track crosses a short turn, running through a deep cut. It was impossible for either engineer to see the other until they were within a few feet of each other. That this accident did not result more seriously is a matter of considerable remark.

**SALOONS IGNORE
NEW LIQUOR LAW**

Walla Walla, Wash., June 17.—Not a single saloon in Walla Walla closed its doors Tuesday during the city primary election. Consequently not one but that is liable for breaking the direct primary law. The proprietors of the various drink shops of the city plead ignorance of the law and no attempt on their part to disregard the same, and for this reason they will probably not be prosecuted.

However, the temperance forces of the city are up in arms over the proposition and under the old saying that "ignorance of the law excuses no man," claim that the saloons should be prosecuted in the manner that any other lawbreaker would be whether or not he knew the provisions of the statutes.

Heretofore it has not been necessary to close saloons on the occasion of primary elections, but section 23 of the direct primary law was amended at the last session of the legislature so as to include primaries with general elections. Prosecuting Attorney Smith today said that he would not prosecute, unless on complaint, and there has been none made up to this time.

German Singers Give Picnic.

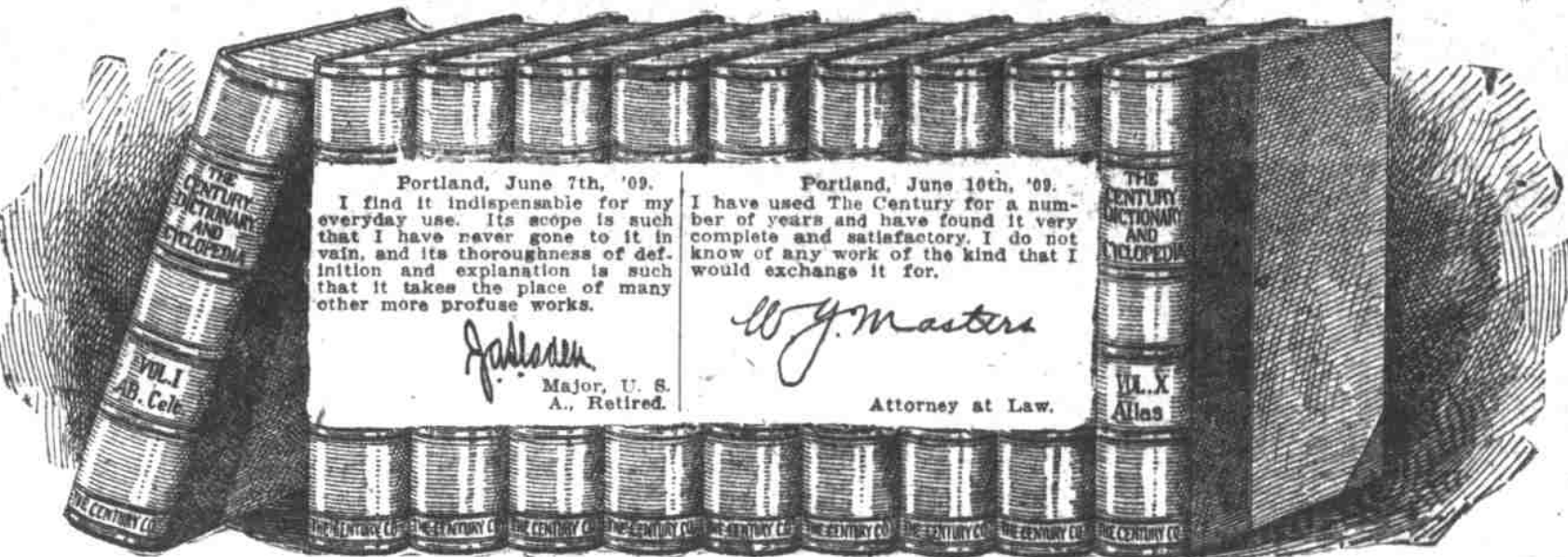
