**CONTEST TO SET
ASIDE HOAG WILL**

Brother of Oregon and California Capitalist Wants More Than \$15,000.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
San Francisco, June 17.—A contest to set aside the will of the late William M. Hoag, disposing of an estate of \$200,000, has been started in the local courts by James A. Hoag, a brother of William M. Hoag, a prominent capitalist in Oregon and California for many years, being one of the promoters of the Oregon Pacific railroad, now the Corvallis & Eastern, and having large property interests at Albany, Corvallis, Yaguna and other places in the Pacific northwest. James A. Hoag in his contest alleges that undue influence was brought to bear on his brother at the time the will was made, citing that he was cut off with \$15,000, while persons outside the family were given a much larger amount. William M. Hoag's will also provided that the \$15,000 left to his brother should be invested by the executors of the estate and only the income turned over to James. He directed that should James attempt to dispose of this property, held in trust for the legatee's sons after their father's death, the income should be taken away from him and turned over to the two sons. These sons were also left \$2000 each.

**TEA RUSHED IN
AHEAD OF DUTY**

Importers Estimate They Have Until July 1 to Make Their Hay.

San Francisco, June 17.—Anxious importers are planning to rush enormous consignments of tea from the Orient before July 1, the date when the new tariff bill will probably go into effect. With the exception of the Spanish-American war period, there never has been a tax on tea and the larger importers are much concerned as to the probable effect of such an excise, on the retail trade.

**250 MEN ARE IDLE;
RIGHT OF WAY SUIT**

Medford, Or., June 17.—Two hundred and fifty men are out of employment temporarily, owing to the fact that the city was forced to go into court in order to obtain a right of way across the land of M. F. Hanley on Little Butte creek for the gravity water system, which the city is installing at a cost of \$250,000. **JAPS SEND MAN
TO INVESTIGATE**

Those at San Francisco Doubt Justice of the Hawaiian Strike.

San Francisco, June 17.—Believing that Japanese strikers on the Hawaiian sugar plantations do not deserve the assistance of their countrymen residing on this coast, a committee of prominent Asiatic merchants today sent K. Kiyose, editorial writer on the Japanese American, to Honolulu to make a report on the merits of the strike. Although the men who were instrumental in sending Kiyose to Honolulu are members of the Japanese Association of America, the secretary of that organization announced today that the writer would not act as its representative. The association fears that if it were to stand behind Kiyose's investigation it would be investing his mission with too great importance, and might lead to complications. Prominent Japanese today expressed themselves as confident that an investigation would prove that they had followed the proper course in not offering to help the strikers.
