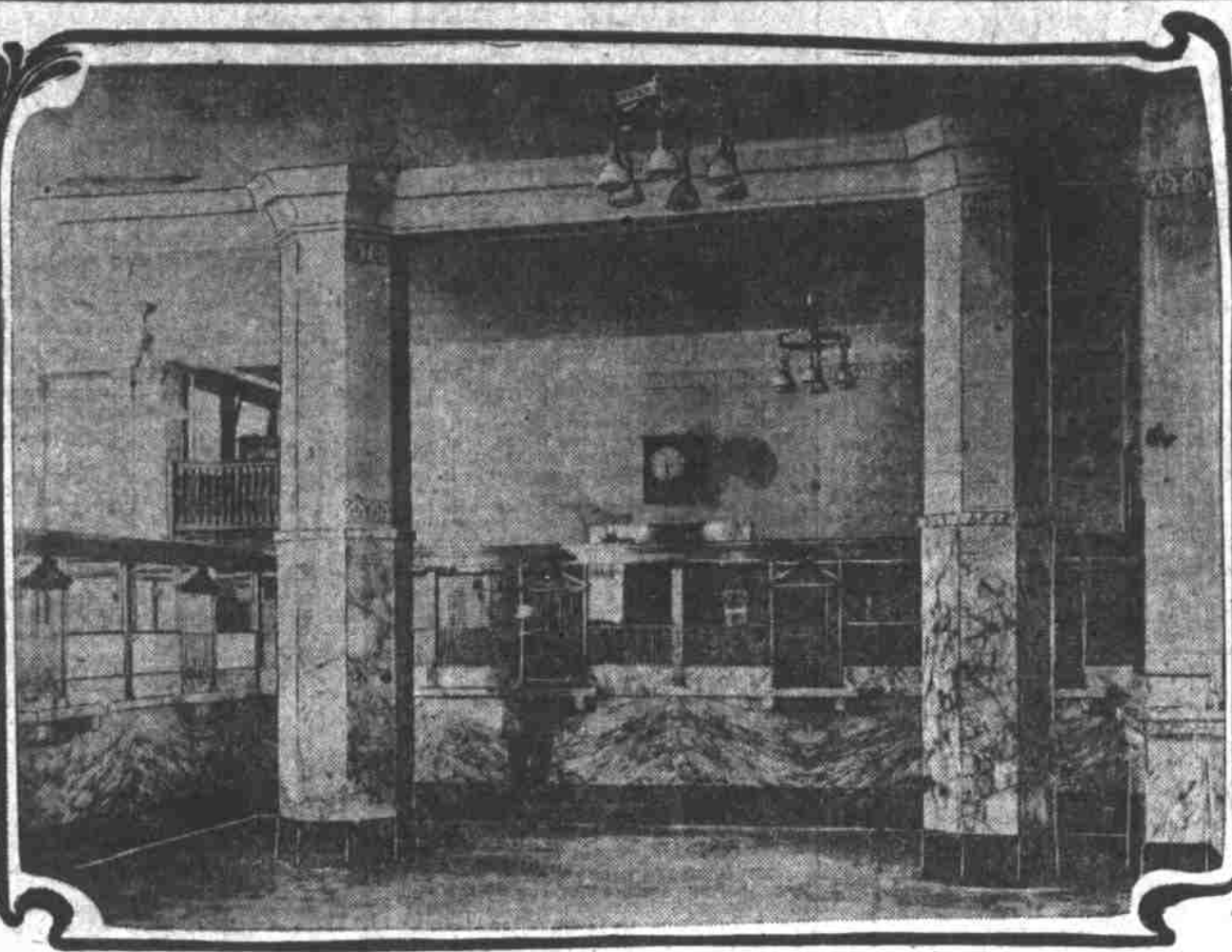

Solidity and Simplicity Foundation for Design of Interior of Lumbermen's National Bank



Interior View of the Lumbermen's National Bank's New Quarters at Fifth and Stark.

The new quarters of the Lumbermen's National bank in the Lumbermen's building at Fifth and Stark streets, presents an unusually handsome and attractive appearance. Architect Morris H. Whitehouse, who designed the building and furnishings for the bank, adopted as the keynote of the scheme solidity.

The white interior of the bank was designed on simple lines, with harmony in general color effect an especial feature. The fixtures are a beautiful and effective combination of skyros marble, plate glass and bronze, with a base of Vermont marble-veneered antique. After the skyros marble had been cut into slabs it was carefully gone over and the veins and coloring perfectly matched. This feature of the scheme is especially noticeable in the lower part of the fixtures, and in the three massive columns in the main lobby where the broad slabs are matched perfectly both as to veins and color. Another striking effect in the marble work is the fact that it is uniformly darkest at the bottom, gradually blending off to lighter tones at the top.

Rooms Well Lighted. Simplicity of design is the predominant feature in the bronze work, this being emphasized at the wickets, where the grill work is placed near the counter ledges with obscure glass behind it. The upper part of the wickets is plate glass encased in bronze frames. The effect of this is to afford light to the employees and at the same time give the counting room a more spacious appearance.

All of the woodwork of the furnishings is done in genuine Mexican mahogany, the plain matched panels without molding being used. Granite tiles of a deep cream shade, harmonizing with the general color scheme, were especially manufactured for the floor of the lobby. The floor of the counting room is laid with a compressed cork tiling, which is practically noiseless. The directors' room is done in mahogany panels, the complete absence of molding or ornamentation giving this apartment an unusually massive appearance.

The entire fixtures and furnishings were manufactured by the Remington-Sherman company of New York. The steel in these vaults weighs 320 tons, the main door alone weighing eight tons, while the steel vestibule entrance to the vault and the three doors weigh 17 tons. This is the heaviest vault door in Portland, and is the most perfect piece of machinery of its kind made in the world.

Another interesting feature of the bank's equipment is the telephone arrangement, which gives each department of the counting room instant communication with every other department without the necessity of calling the local exchange.

Fifty Oregon creamery men have been invited by State Dairy and Food Commissioner Bailey to come to Portland next Saturday for the purpose of meeting the new inspectors appointed by Mr. Bailey for creamery work throughout the state. They are to meet at the Commercial club Saturday evening at 8 o'clock.

Every big creamery man in the state has been invited and 25 or 30 of them are expected to meet here. The general plan of cooperation between a creamery man and the inspector is to be outlined and arrangements mapped out for the coming year. The inspectors, Paul V. Maria, W. E. Caterlin and M. S. Shrock, are to have the inspection of the entire process of butter making from the time the cow is milked to the selling of the butter in retail stores. Much of the work is to be done in the cleaning of vessels and cans in which cream is kept, to shipping, and also to cleanliness of dairies throughout the state.
