FIND STOCK IN DEPLORABLE CONDITION

Government Officials Announce Having Made Personal Investigation of How Railroads Handle Animals in Cars.

Evidence produced by the government during the past two days in the prosecution of the Southern Pacific for violations of the 28 hour law have disclosed startling methods used in the transportation and care of stock shipments.

"We have covered," said Assistant United States District Attorney J. R. Wyatt today, "the length of the company's lines in Oregon. We have found that in a great many instances the stock was kept on the road beyond the limit fixed by law, without food or water or rest. The pens have been kept in deplorable condition. Mud, sometimes of dangerous depth, constituted a floor for the enclosures. Food thrown in the pens sank down out of sight in the filth, or was so befouled that horses could not eat it. Evident evasions of the law have been apparent. We can find no evidence that any effort was made to better these deplorable conditions until the government prosecutions were commenced." Mr. Wyatt continued, "Now all along the line pens are being built along humanitarian lines. Care is being taken that stock shall not be kept on the road beyond a fixed limit without food or rest. The government's prosecution of the railroads in endeavoring to secure an enforcement of these laws which were constructed to protect shippers will and is leading to a revolution in transportation methods. The cases tried in court may ring on and on, because of appeals,

but the main object of correcting existing evils is being attained and we feel very much satisfied."

Government prosecution of the Southern Pacific in a case closed and given to the jury today at noon, charged the railroad company with having allowed the stock pens at Ashland to remain in a condition unfit for use, because of the mud and filth, with which the ground was covered. Yet, said witnesses, stock of various kinds were kept continually in these pens while enroute into or out of Oregon. Attorneys J. E. Fenton and Ben C. Dey represented the railroad. Assistant District Attorneys Evans and Wyatt fought the case for the government.

WORK FOR FREE BED IN HOSPITAL

A plan is under consideration by the allied British societies to establish a bed in one of the hospitals for British residents who need hospital attendance. This plan was adopted by the general committee at the last celebration of British Empire day with the suggestion that the matter be left in the hands of the various residents of the British societies with power to act.

There are at present two endowed beds, known as the Golden Jubilee and the Diamond Jubilee Victoria beds, and the consummation of the present plan will make a third British bed. A bed for British sailors is also supported at the Good Samaritan hospital, under the charge of James Laidlaw, British consul. There is some thought of arranging for entertainments to aid in the purpose and the balance fund of the annual celebrations of Empire day will be devoted to this.
