Confirmation and High Mass.—Archbishop Christie will confirm 60 children and 12 adults tomorrow morning during the service at the Dominican church, 312 Third and Clackamas street. The feast of the most pure heart of the Virgin Mary will be observed. The Dominican Fathers will celebrate solemn high mass 9 a. m. O'Brien, O. P. will act as deacon and Father Schmitt as sub deacon. Archbishop Christie will be assisted by Father Thompson and Rev. A. De Lormier of the cathedral of the Immaculate Conception. Rev. J. R. Newell, prior of the Dominican cathedral of San Francisco will assist at high mass. The male choir will give St. Bernard's mass in B minor and as one number Miss Marie LeMay will play Wagner's "Irene". The confirmation services will be held immediately after the conclusion of mass.

Installation of Pastor.—Rev. Thomas Holmes Walker will be installed as pastor of the Calvary Presbyterian church, Eleventh and Columbia streets, tomorrow afternoon at 3:30 o'clock. Rev. Walker has been recently called to assume charge of the Calvary church. He comes from the Hermon Presbyterian church of Philadelphia. He has been called to Chicago. At the installation services Rev. W. W. Hayes will say the invocation. Rev. William Hiram Fowler will preach the installation sermon and Rev. J. A. P. McGraw will make the address to the congregation. Rev. J. R. Wilson will deliver the address to the pastor. Rev. E. M. Sharp will offer prayer and benediction. Rev. J. R. Wilson will be the special music.

Judge Grants Non-Suit.—As there were no witnesses to the explosion that killed Alex. Angelos, who was in charge of a powder house during the building of the Pacific Railway & Navigation company line in Washington county, Judge Cleveland of the circuit court yesterday granted a non-suit in the suit for \$7500 damages brought against the railway by M. Apach, administrator of the estate of Angelos, being instantly killed.

No Trace of Missing Man.—No trace has been found of Antonio J. Robinson of Shanghai, China, who mysteriously disappeared from the Sargent hotel nearly a week ago and who has not been seen since. N. L. Rogers, of 624 Beck building, a friend of the missing man, fears that he has been murdered. Others who knew Robinson incline toward the belief that he committed suicide. He had been dependent for several days prior to his disappearance because of failure to secure employment.

Sues for Loss of Thumb.—Suit for \$500 damages for the loss of the thumb of his left hand, which was severed by the hand of a saw, has been filed against the University Lumber & Shingle company by J. A. McEllan. McEllan says that on October 10, 1908, while working at a shingle machine, his hand was caught in the saw. He had previously notified his employers of the defective condition of the machine, he states, and they had directed him to keep at work until it was repaired.

Eddy Will Serve 90 Days.—A. G. Eddy pleaded guilty to the charge of simple larceny in the circuit court yesterday, and he thereby escaped trial on the charge of stealing a car from the Oregon Electric company, on which he was formerly employed as a conductor. Judge Graham sentenced him to 90 days in jail and placed him on parole.

Long Term for Teamster.—Imposing a sentence of 60 days in jail on H. J. Ikin, a teamster of 1083 E. Main, who was charged with the theft of a horse, Justice Olson caustically arraigned all those guilty of mistreating dumb brutes. Ikin was charged with the theft of a horse and a carriage from the circuit court gave him the limit. There were several witnesses to prove that Ikin mistreated the animal.

Breaks Leg in Fall.—While out walking on Portland Heights last night, Richard Woodcock, 314 E. Main, fell and broke his leg. Constable Wagner, who lives near the scene of the accident, called a fire engine ambulance and had the injured man taken to St. Vincent's hospital. Mr. Woodcock is a retired traveling salesman.

Central Council Will Appoint Committees to Prepare Program.

Portland labor unions will celebrate Labor Day with an elaborate program, according to preliminary plans made at a meeting of the Central Labor council last night.

It was decided by the council that the unions of the city working with the central body would join in a big celebration which would include a parade and other celebration features.

Authority was given at the meeting for the appointment of a general committee to take charge of the plans for the celebration. This committee will be announced at the next meeting of the Central Labor council. Following the announcement the committee will begin work on the preparation of the celebration. It being intended to make the coming holiday the occasion for the biggest labor celebration in the history of the city.

Northwest Sabbath Association Passes Resolution in Protest.

Whereas, The board of managers of the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition have in disregard of all urgent requests to the contrary, determined to run a wide open exposition from 1 o'clock p. m. to midnight on every Lord's day; therefore we, the official representatives of the Northwest Sabbath association, auxiliary to the American Sabbath union, do hereby enter our solemn protest against the opening and for the following reasons:

First—The American republic is emphatically a Christian nation. It is declared to be a Christian nation by the highest judiciary of the land. The Sabbath has been divinely declared to be "ruler among the nations," "king of kings and lord of lords." He also declared himself to be the exception to the Sabbath. Through his chosen people as a representative nation, using their civil ruler to enforce the observance of the Sabbath day to keep it holy, i. e., a day of rest and devotion to God and his work. This is a part of the moral law which was never repealed.

Second—The Lord of the Sabbath has supreme authority by rising from the dead the third day after his crucifixion, and by his resurrection he has made the day for rest from labor and for worship, thus recognizing it as the Christian Sabbath, and regard to the Sabbath day as a violation of the moral law, and as direct rebellion against the authority of God.

Third—We object to the opening of said exposition on the Lord's day because of the detrimental impression that best class of emigrants from the north and east, the Christian citizen, the debarment of whom is detrimental to the interests of the nation.

Fourth—We protest against said opening as an assault upon the Sabbath day, which is the sacred day of the entire nation and the world at large; and earnestly hope that they, one and all, will firmly refuse to patronize said exposition until its managers close its gates during the hours of the Lord's day.

Fifth—We object to the opening of said exposition on the Lord's day because of the detrimental impression that best class of emigrants from the north and east, the Christian citizen, the debarment of whom is detrimental to the interests of the nation.

Sixth—Above all, we protest against said opening, and all shows of spectacular and theatrical character on the Lord's day as antagonistic to his declared law, who died to redeem mankind, and the development of our spiritual nature preparatory to life eternal; and who will not suffer with impunity any violation of his law, but will vindicate his righteousness even to the destruction of the nation that rebels against his law.
