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is being built helps to substantiate the growing belief that Harriman is the one who is supplying Robert Strahorn with his money.

With the advantage given him by owning this line through the state of Washington and with the hands of his two rivals, the Hill lines and the Chicago, Milwaukee & Puget Sound held by the Harriman group, he has led them into a position to command the transportation situation in the Pacific northwest.

If it were not symbolic of a condition that has retarded the development of Oregon for many years, the publication of the Harriman press yesterday of the "benefits" to Portland to result from the keeping out of the Chicago, Milwaukee & Puget Sound by the agreement with Harriman would be funny to those who appreciate the industrial conditions that confront Portland shippers. Among the good things enumerated and that are going to happen are the promotion of Portland to the chief railroad center of the Pacific coast, the making of the western terminus of the Milwaukee and the extension of Portland's jobbing territory to an enormous and highly gratifying extent.

Rivals Are Shut Out.
From the Harriman standpoint, it is true, Portland now becomes the best railroad center on the coast, because it is carefully shut off from any disturbing attention on the part of any of Harriman's rivals. The peace pact between Hill and Harriman, and the possibility of any move into this state on the part of Hill, Hill himself announcing at the memorable Arlington club dinner during his last visit here that he would never enter this state with another line. This benefit, viewed from the Harriman point of view, is clear enough, but the public is a little at a loss to understand how Portland is made the chief Pacific coast terminus of the Milwaukee when Harriman's trade agreement effectively prevents the possibility of that system even building into Portland or running trains nearer than 150 miles of this city.

There is a mystifying element to the possibilities of trade extension, too. Portland jobbers and manufacturers are now engaged in a life struggle with the railroads and with Spokane for even the territory of eastern Washington and Oregon and western Idaho. The independent open river steamer enables Portland jobbers to get into that territory as it is. The Spokane rate case decision narrows still further the "zone" into which Portland jobbers can ship their goods. How these jobbers and manufacturers can greatly benefit by being able to ship over a line into Montana and northeastern Idaho when they can scarcely ship goods over half the distance now is clear only to the Harriman press.

The limited trains on the Shasta route on the Southern Pacific are supposed to run through Portland to Seattle from San Francisco, merely stopping in Portland long enough to let passengers on and off before continuing on its way to the new northern terminus of the Harriman line. There may be some delay in carrying out this program, because the formal contract between the Northern Pacific and Union Pacific has not yet been signed, but it merely awaits this technical act to commence the operation of through Seattle-San Francisco passenger trains.

LOCAL COUNCIL LEAD CLASS

Knights of Columbus Prepare for Initiation of Members.

Portland council, No. 678, of the Knights of Columbus, will lead a class of 60 initiates out upon the Haitian shores of knighthood Sunday, June 27. A degree team from Seattle will confer the first three degrees of the order upon the novices in the afternoon.

In the morning at 9 o'clock the local council, the candidates for initiation and visiting knights will attend mass in a body. Archbishop Christie will preach the initiation sermon. Following the initiation ceremonies, which will be conducted in the hall at Park and Yamhill streets, a feast will be spread in the banquet room of the hall. At this a number of the leading members of the order have consented to make addresses. Portland is already the home of a greater number of Knights of Columbus than any other city in the northwest can boast. It is the aim of the board of trustees to increase the enrollment of the local council at frequent intervals until the registration is larger than any city west of the Mississippi from arrangements for the approaching initiation are being made by J. view of his amendment. Senator Penrose in charge of the oil schedule, will ask for a duty on crude oil of 25 per cent, but on the refined there is to be no tariff.

The committee took up the lumber schedule but came to no conclusion. Steel rails were also passed on but what decision was arrived at cannot be learned.

Senator Aldrich was in the hope of receiving from Attorney General Wickens the revised bill on the corporation income tax, but he was disappointed. Yesterday the senator from Rhode Island promised the senate that he would present his substitute today. As the bill originally came from the House to the finance committee it was wholly unsatisfactory. Its present phrasing was offensive, too. It is said, and its legal ends were loosely drawn.

Aldrich Weakens.
Now, Aldrich, as he suggested to his committee this afternoon is willing to abandon the 2 per cent plan and is prepared to fix the income on corporation net receipts at something like 3 per cent. At 2 per cent the revenues would amount to about \$60,000,000, he thinks.

But with the tariff bill going through as he plans and hopes, he will need less than \$40,000,000 outside customs receipts to meet the necessary expenses of the government. Late today Aldrich submitted many small schedules lowering duties on articles heretofore passed upon. These refer to steel bars, steel tubes and the like. In answer to a question from Senator Penrose he admitted that he was amending certain items with the end in view of lowering the duties so that the regular revenue for a revision downward might be met.

When the new chairman of the senate presented himself to offer a benediction on the senate this morning at 10 o'clock the chamber was absolutely empty. After 10 minutes he succeeded in inducing Stone and Burton to come inside and hear him.

To the disappointment of crowded galleries many senators, and the Democratic side, the Bailey-Cummings income tax amendment, set by agreement yesterday for consideration today, was deferred for future consideration. The consent was somewhat mutual. Bailey said if the same progress were made by the Democrats on the tariff bill as had been made in the week just passed Senator Aldrich would be alone in opposing a tax assessing corporations and individuals alike.

The Free List.
The agreement is that as soon as the free list is disposed of in the senate all the amendments to the tariff bill relating toward an income tax shall come up and remain on the calendar undisturbed until disposed of.

Just when the free list is to be got out of the way is problematical. Some say August 1, others September 1, still others July 1. Aldrich himself is in despair about getting away from here until midsummer.

With the income tax feature temporarily out of the way the hide schedule was taken up this morning, bringing forth set speeches by Clapp of Minnesota and Lodge of Massachusetts. Both advocated free hides, declaring the American manufacturers were better able now to compete in the production of shoes, harness, etc., with foreign countries than ever before in the history of the country.

A wide division as to the advisability of removing the tariff on hides. The house bill places hides on the free list and it is said by such leaders as Cannon, Delsell and Payne that there will be no compromise. But Aldrich wishes an ad valorem of 15 per cent. The prospects are that the senate will agree to such a rate. Then in the conference the understanding seems to prevail that there will be a compromise and that the law will bring 1 1/2 per cent. The free hide people in droves. Such a campaign as they have made for the past three months is almost unprecedented in the history of Washington.

Today a great delegation from Pennsylvania arrived to use their influence with Penrose, who, up to two days ago, was an advocate of free hides, but who has now joined the protectionists. The senate is able to dispose of this article within the next week it will be doing that which few now believe it can do. Beveridge made a savage attack upon the National Cash Register company in connection with an amendment he had offered reducing the ad valorem duty on cash registers from 30 to 15 per cent. The present rate is 45 per cent.

Senator Beveridge denounced that corporation as a trust which mercilessly attacked rivals and drove them out of business and now enjoys a practical monopoly. He declared that the people of the United States paid \$5,000,000 a year more to the same firm for the same number and style of machines than the English people paid. He submitted a list of comparative prices showing machines were sold for half the price charged in the United States.

Sensors Burton and Dick came to the defense of the company, which is an Ohio concern. Both protested against the senate taking any action until the concern had an opportunity to be heard. Finally an agreement was reached by which the matter went over with Beveridge's amendment pending. In the meantime the federal government was proceeding against the company for violation of the laws.
