

WOULD EQUALIZE NEW SITES FOR PERMIT CHARGES FIRE STATIONS

Building Inspector Dobson Sees Need for Revision of the System.

If the present plans of City Building Inspector G. E. Dobson are carried into effect by the city council, the receipts from building permits will be increased approximately 50 per cent. Mr. Dobson says the building revision committee is now considering his suggestions and that these will be favorably recommended to the council.

Mr. Dobson proposes to fix charges for permits hereafter on a basis of cubical contents of the buildings to be erected instead of the flat rate now obtaining. He thinks a reasonable charge would be 10 cents per 1000 cubic feet. In this way the expenses of the office would be more equitably distributed, the large office buildings having to pay a sum in proportion to the size of the structures.

According to rates now in effect permits for all buildings which cost less than \$1000 may be purchased for \$10. Permits for buildings which cost from \$1000 to \$10,000 are issued for \$3 and other buildings permits are \$1.

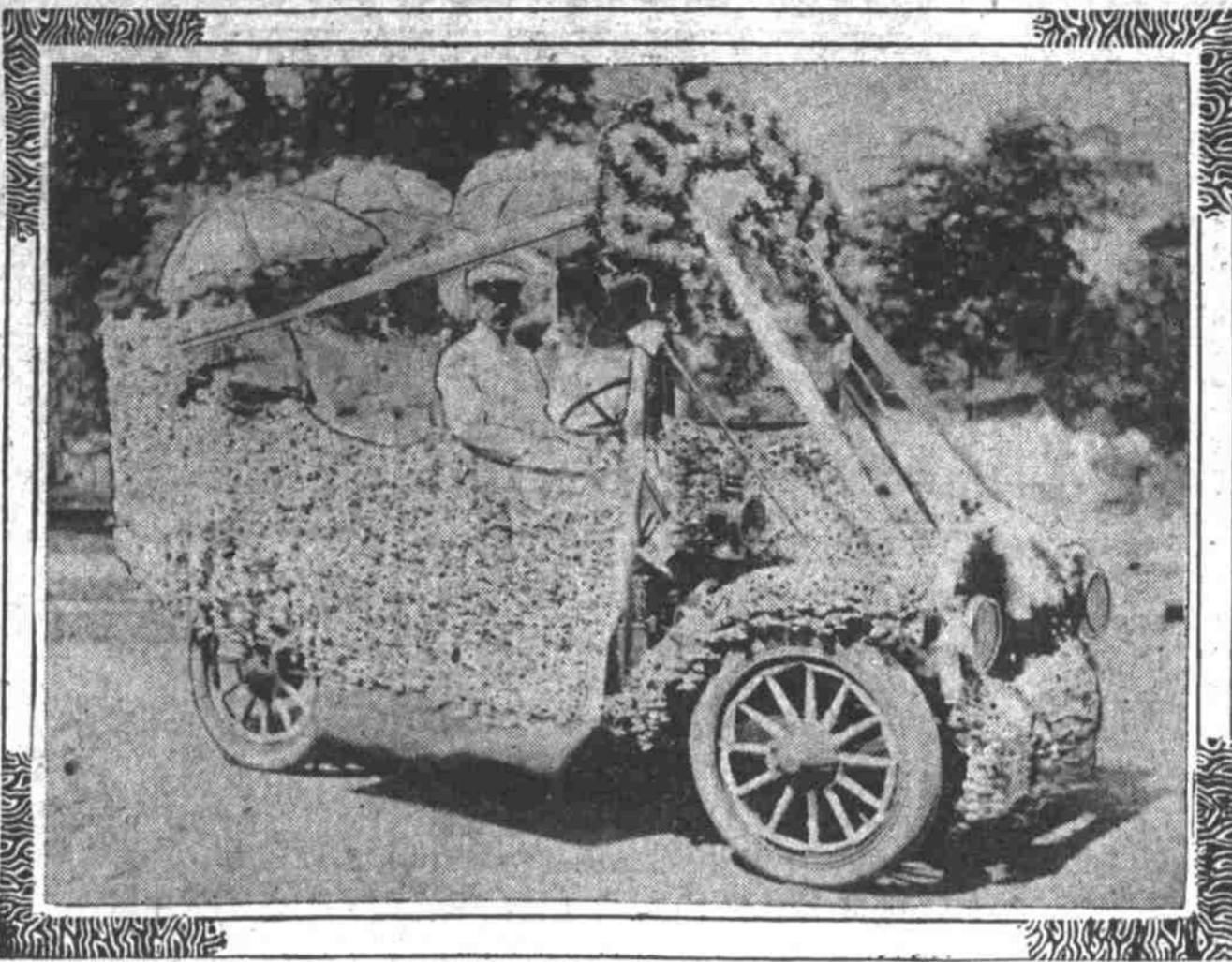
It is seen that under the system of charges now prevalent the owner of a \$10,000 dwelling pays just as much for his permit as does the man who erects a skyscraper worth \$100,000. By fixing the charges according to cubical contents of the building every builder pays a proportionate sum for his permit.

Fire Committee Sees Need for Protection in the Suburbs.

An ordinance drafted with approval of the fire committee of the executive board will be submitted to the city council tomorrow afternoon with the recommendation that if it is passed, so the mayor and auditor will be authorized to draw a warrant for \$2500 in payment for a piece of ground at East Sixty-first street and the Base Line road to be used as a site for a new fire station.

After months of inquiry and investigation the fire committee finally selected the site for its central location with reference to the territory to be served. The ground is so situated that the engine will have a downhill run in all directions when called to a fire. The station is to be erected to furnish fire protection for the Mount Tabor and Montavilla districts. Another ordinance providing for an appropriation from the general fund to purchase a fire station site at Greenwood and Francis avenues is also to be submitted to the council with the recommendation from the fire committee that it be passed. This station was not provided for in the yearly estimates and cannot therefore be bought with money taken from the fire fund.

IF IN DOUBT, ASK YOUR POLICEMAN

Chief of Police Gritzmacher has published a notice calling attention of dealers in firearms, fireworks and all kinds of Fourth of July explosives to the city ordinances regulating their sale. A warning is also issued to everybody who proposes to have a noisy Fourth to keep within the laws.

For the benefit of Journal readers a few of the restrictions of the law are mentioned herewith briefly:

It is necessary for dealers to procure permits from the chief of police before they can sell fireworks or explosives of any kind. No permits may be issued to dealers who propose to occupy buildings where cigar stands or other business houses stored with combustible goods are conducted.

It is against the law to sell toy pistols, blank cartridges or any dangerous explosive device to minors under the age of 18, and it is unlawful for such persons to discharge or have in their possession such weapons or explosives.

Section 1 of ordinance No. 1406 forbids "any person to shoot or discharge within the city of Portland any revolver, pistol, gun, cannon cracker, loaded cane, Dewey chaser or other dangerous mixtures of explosives."

Besides these there are many other provisions of the law which will be strictly enforced by the police during the Fourth of July. The chief advises everyone to be careful and when in doubt ask a policeman.
