

NEW PILOT BOAT BE LAUNCHED

Schooner Joseph Pulitzer
to Be Fleeted Next
Thursday.

HAS BEEN FITTED WITH GAS ENGINE

Sailing Schooner Has Been Equipped
With Engines to Do Pilot Cruis-
ing Outside of Columbia Bar—
Owned by Port of Portland.

Having been on the drydock for about a month undergoing repairs, the pilot schooner Joseph Pulitzer will be floated again tomorrow or Thursday. It was expected that she would be off the ways today but the launching was unavoidably delayed.

While on the drydock the Pulitzer has been fitted with a gas engine, for use in connection with her sail and she has also been refitted on the inside, to make room for her engine and tanks, and to furnish better and more commodious accommodations. Although she will be floated again in a day or two, she will not be completed for some time, as there is still considerable work to be done on her.

When completed the Joseph Pulitzer will be used outside Columbia bar, where she will cruise around, putting out on board of ships bound for the harbor.

The steamer Eureka, which has also been on the drydock for repairs will be floated some time today.

WEATHER EXPERTS MEET

Every Civilized Country Represented
at Congress in London.

London, June 22.—Every civilized nation of the world is represented by one or more weather experts at the international conference of meteorologists, which is in session here. This conference is the outcome of a similar gathering of meteorologists from all parts of the world which was held a few years ago and promises to be of unusual importance in extending the scope of scientific weather observation and facilitating the distribution of weather reports and storm warnings on land and sea over the entire surface of the earth.

One of the principal problems to be taken up by the experts during this session of one week is the question of bringing about an international agreement as to the taking and sending by wireless of marine weather reports. The committee in charge of the subject favors a scheme to obtain the adoption by all the leading nations of a uniform method of taking and transmitting wireless meteorological observations so that such observations no matter by what nation taken, will be comparable with the observations taken by any other nation. There is now no uniform system of making such observations and the results, when taken, with the result that it is impossible to compare the reports, as the various features of the weather are not observed and reported in every case.

The report of the committee, which consists of Dr. W. N. Shaw, Great Britain; Professor A. Angström, Sweden; Dr. F. R. F. Froe, China; Rear Admiral H. H. H. Germany; Professor H. H. H. Norway; Professor W. H. H. Japan; and Dr. K. Nakamura, Japan, will be thoroughly discussed and it is hoped a definite plan will be adopted by the various governments.

Another committee, consisting of Messrs. Agassiz, Huxley, Moore and Lieutenant Rykacheff, of the Central Physical observatory of St. Petersburg, Russia, will submit a plan for the establishment of a uniform system of storm and general weather signals by all nations. It is hoped that the adoption of this plan will result in the elimination of the different signals used by the different nations and that the signals will be made possible to make the storm warnings displayed on land or flashed by wireless to the ships on the ocean more intelligible and therefore more valuable for the protection of life and property upon the high seas.

TOURISTS FROM EAST

State of California Brings Large List
From San Francisco.

With the largest list of cabin passengers which she has brought up this season, the steamer State of California, Captain Nopander, arrived at the Alameda dock last night.

Although her steerage list was somewhat light, cabin accommodations were entirely taken. The majority of the passengers on this trip were tourists from the east, who had come to the coast by the southern route.

While many of them expect to remain over in Portland, the majority of them are going on to the exposition in Seattle and some of them intend to take advantage of the summer excursion to Alaska.

Although the State encountered a little northwest weather, her trip was a pleasant one. She carried a large cargo of general merchandise.

FRENCH CRAFT ARRIVES OUT

Barbier Arrives at Falmouth
138 Days Out From Portland.

After a voyage of 138 days the French bark Barbier, Captain Gamet, arrived in Falmouth yesterday for orders.

The Barbier, which left Astoria on February 3, for Falmouth, was one of the grain ships here last fall, and was chartered by the K. G. Gifford company to carry grain to United Kingdom ports. Her cargo was made up of 7,625 bushels of wheat and 44,194 bushels of barley.

The French bark Crillon, another grain ship from Portland arrived at Falmouth on June 20.

RIVER IS AT STAND

After Wednesday the Water Will Be-
gin to Fall.

The Willamette river at Portland practically came to a stand last night and will remain so Wednesday, falling slowly Thursday and Friday. Yesterday the water neared the 21.4 foot mark, while today it is near the 21.3 foot mark.

At all points on the Snake river the water is falling, but from the international boundary the Columbia is nearly at the flood stage. The water will probably fall rapidly after Friday.

OIL BARGE RECOVERED

Wrecked Barge Comes Into Astoria
In Good Shape—To Drydock.

Astoria, June 22.—At daylight this morning the Standard Oil barge No. 91 was wrecked while coming in across the bar, and was towed into this port. She was wrecked on Saturday night, and last night, and comes in here in fine shape. The barge was wrecked 39 days ago, and it is understood that she will be towed up to St. Johns for repairs.
