Automobile Totally Destroyed.—A seven passenger automobile, belonging to O. L. Chapel, was entirely destroyed by fire at Lakeview, on the Lincoln road, last night. The fire was not caused by any defect in the machine, but by an explosion of the gas tank. Ex-Councilman Harry C. Hunter, Dr. John and P. J. Peterson, proprietor of the St. Johns ferry, were with Mr. Chapel when the accident occurred. Chapel was demonstrating the car for Mr. Hunter, and was only running at the rate of one mile an hour. Chapel is an old and experienced driver, and the accident is not attributed either to him nor the two other occupants of the car. Chapel says that the loss is \$3400, as the car, which had just been overhauled, was utterly destroyed by the flames. Although burned and scorched none of the men was seriously injured.

Failed to Release Latches.—Through an accident to the latches on the Morrison bridge this morning the Morrison cars were prevented from crossing the bridge for a couple of hours until the damaged latches were repaired. In opening the bridge the latches which bind the ends of the rails together across the draw, failed to be released, resulting in two rails on one end of the draw being twisted off. As soon as the rails could be spliced the traffic was resumed, and the trans-bridge passengers in the meantime being forced to cross the draw on foot.

Vaughan Will Leave City.—C. C. Vaughn, the real estate man, who pleaded Robert Dunkel with an iron pipe because Dunkel was escorting his divorced wife, was allowed to plead guilty to a charge of simple assault in the circuit court yesterday and sentence was suspended. Dunkel is said to have dropped the prosecution of the case on the understanding that Vaughn will leave Portland. Mrs. Vaughn secured a divorce a few weeks ago, telling a story of repeated brutalities on the part of her husband.

Satchel Stolen or Lost.—Mrs. E. H. White of the Needlecraft, is mourning the loss of a satchel containing among other things a valuable watch, diamond brooch and a bunch of keys. Mrs. White is under the impression that the satchel was hung on a door knob in the rear of her store, and being temporarily forgotten, someone took advantage of the opportunity and purloined it. Mrs. White is very anxious to get back the watch and is willing to forego the loss of the other articles.

Out for a Good Time.—To prove that the ways of the small fry are exceedingly strange is a report turned in to the police station last night by Mrs. Roy Silvertown of 587 Seventh street. Mrs. Silvertown, according to her own statement, spent yesterday morning shopping downtown. When she returned she found that her 8-year-old son had stolen \$5 from her purse and disappeared. Today the police were still looking for the youngster.

Mr. Simon has now complied with the law requiring candidates to qualify for office. He will now be able to step in and assume the reins of government on July 1 without further formalities.

Exhaust Causes Excitement.—Some unknown person lost a chance to be a hero last night when alarm was turned in to the fire department about 8 o'clock, indicating that the Williamson Fuel company's dock at the foot of Everett street was afire. The firemen discovered that the exhaust from a steam pipe had caused the excitement.

WITNESSES FOR DETECTIVE REED

Judge Gantenhein Finds Defendant Not Guilty of Assault.

W. F. Reed, a detective of the city police force, accused of assaulting William Stevenson with a pair of handcuffs, was found not guilty by Judge Gantenhein in the circuit court this morning, having been tried without a jury. Judge Gantenhein expressed the opinion that the officer should not have been indicted. Reed admitted striking Stevenson with the handcuffs and said he did so while the latter was resisting arrest. Stevenson claimed that he was merely holding out his hands for the cuffs when he was struck, but several witnesses supported the statement of the officer that Stevenson appeared to be looking for trouble and was resisting arrest to the limit of his strength, being under the influence of liquor. The affair took place in a saloon on May 13. Judge Gantenhein, in commenting on the case, said that officers should be supported instead of hampered in enforcing the law. Perhaps Reed used a little more force than was needed, the court said, but it is difficult for a judge on the bench to measure the degree of force needed to control a drunken man who is fighting an officer. As there was such a doubt, he believed that Reed should have the benefit of it and be discharged. Seneca Fouts represented the defendant, Deputy District Attorney Vreeland prosecuting.
