\$6,000,000 PAID OUT IN OREGON FOR INSURANCE

Commissioner Koser's Preliminary Report Shows Business Transacted in the State for the Year Ending December 31, 1908.

Salem, Or., June 23.—Insurance Commissioner Koser is preparing a preliminary report of the condition of the insurance business in Oregon. Part of the report has been concluded showing how much business has been transacted during the year ending December 31, 1908, and also showing the different kinds of business, premiums, returned and losses paid.

SEASIDE AGGREGATION WINS FIRST ROUND FOR POPULARITY

The first real hit of the present beach season has been scored by Seaside. Two baby sea lions have been captured by the Seaside aggregation and are being displayed in a specially constructed tank at the Hotel Moore. The lions were caught Sunday morning at the mouth of Elk creek and seem to be lusty and promising infants. At last accounts Ilwaco and Newport both had bulletins announcing that the true Otariidae was extinct so far as the Oregon coast was concerned and that hence the sea lion story is probably a fake. Assistant General Freight and Passenger Agent Ralph Jenkins of the Astoria & Columbia River railroad—the only line running direct to the sea lions—said that the derogatory reports from northern and southern beaches were incited by envy.

Quiet Election at Dalles.

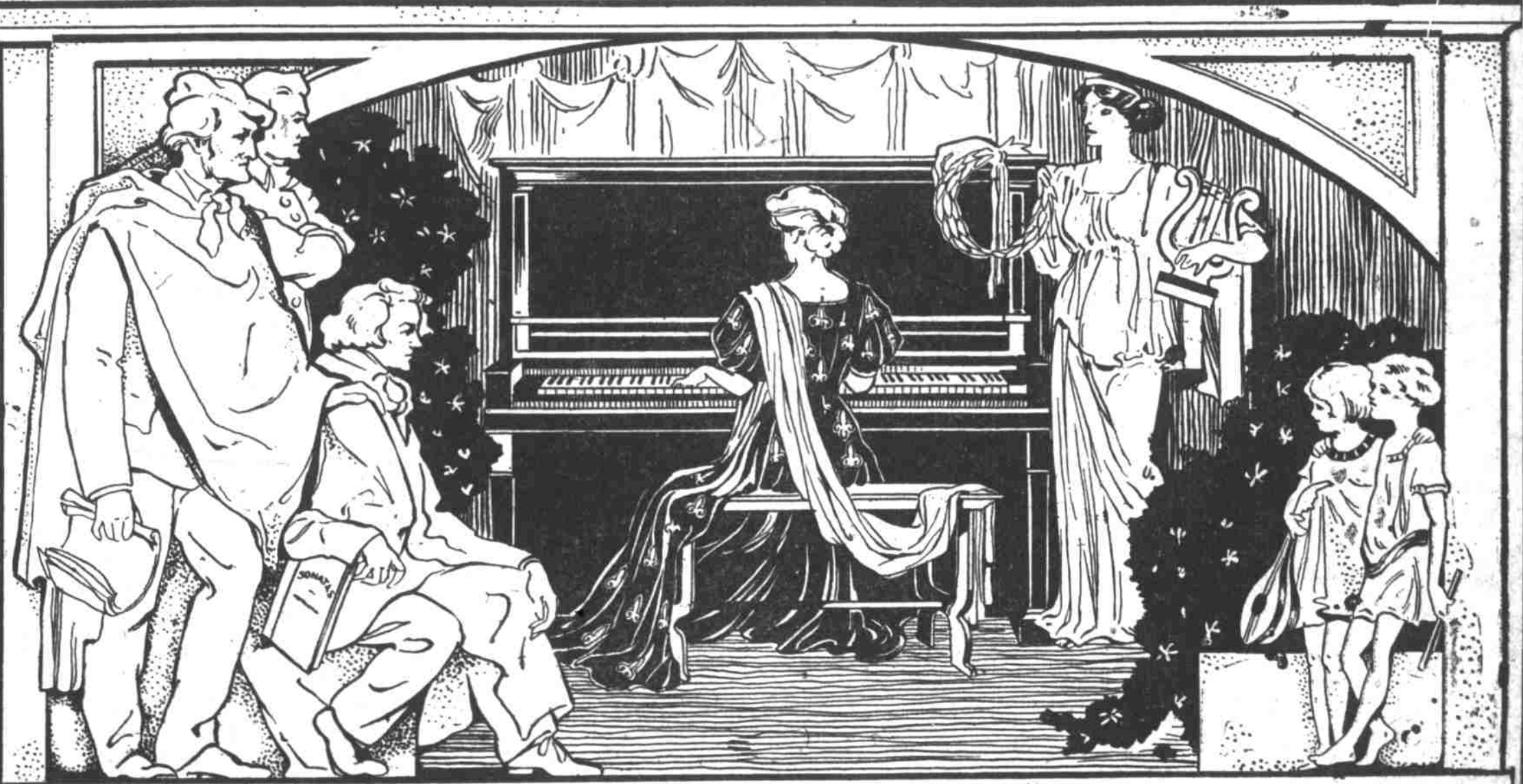
The Dalles, Or., June 23.—The city election Monday passed off quietly, the lightest vote in years being cast. The only contest was for councilman in the first ward, where M. T. Nolan, ex-registrar of the land office, and David Lindquist, a prominent young jeweler, were the candidates. The result was a two to one victory for Lindquist. Both Mayor E. M. Wingate and City Treasurer Ed Kurts were reelected. The other officers elected were: First ward, councilman, David Lindquist; water commissioner, A. Kellar; Second ward, councilman, Grant Mayes; water commissioner, J. W. Koonits; Third ward, councilman, J. P. McInerney; water commissioner, Hans Hansen.

Street paving was to a certain extent an issue in the election, and of the three new councilmen elected, two are in favor of paving and one against. The result of the election means that the council will go ahead with the paving proposition. E. C. Pease was elected school director.
