WASHINGTON'S SESSION EXTRAORDINARY

THE NORTHWEST will view with curious interest the proceedings of the Washington legislature, which opens in extraordinary session today. Unless something more vital than appears on the surface develops, the need of the session is seriously questioned. The Seattle Times declares that the session is called at the behest of ex-Senator John L. Wilson, owner of the Seattle Post-Intelligencer, who wants Schively impeached because Schively gave public printing to the Times, a rival paper. The P-I justifies the call for the session and demands Schively's impeachment on high moral grounds. About half the state seems to condemn and the other half to applaud the governor for the call. One of the state senators declares he will introduce a resolution demanding that "acting" Governor Hay call a special election for electing a new governor. This is a politician's threat of reprisal on the governor for the latter's attitude toward Schively. It is an impossible resolution because by the constitution of the state the death of the late Governor Cosgrove made Hay chief executive.

Other politicians insist that the state senate will adjourn sine die as soon as called to order, and the rejoinder is that the governor will immediately reconvene it, and thereafter continue to reconvene as often as the senate adjourns. These and many other threats are samples of the animus and venom concentrated in the proceedings begun at Olympia today.

Extraordinary sessions of state legislatures are a hazardous business. Less lawmaking rather than more is widely regarded as the true course. If we attempted less government rather than more we would be better off as a growing belief. The only warrantable occasion for extraordinary legislative sessions is when there is great stress or extraordinary emergency. The multitude usually dislikes extra sessions and would prefer shorter regular ones. These things confront Governor Hay at Olympia, and if he is alive to the situation it must give him pause. The best thing he can do is to use all his powers to minimize the business, shorten the hours of the session to the uttermost and hustle the sessions off to their homes as speedily as possible. The longer they stay at Olympia the less the good that will come to him out of Nazareth.

WHAT WILL TAFT DO?

THE BALTIMORE SUN of a recent date had an interesting and important piece of news from its Washington correspondent—to the effect that President Taft would not sign such a tariff bill as that being constructed by Aldrich. Commenting on the news story the Sun says editorially that its Washington correspondent's representations "may be relied on as an authentic portrayal of Mr. Taft's attitude," and it continues: "He will not stultify himself or, as far as in him lies, permit his party to be stultified, by the enactment, with his approval, of a measure embodying the atrocities of the Aldrich concoction. He will brush aside, without hesitation, the preposterous plea that the revision promised by the Republican platform did not necessarily mean a revision downward. He will exact, as an essential requirement of any bill to which he will attach his signature, a distinct reduction of present tariff rates."

But the Sun, while thus sure that Mr. Taft will not sign the "atrocious Aldrich concoction," suspects that he may sign a bill "patched up in conference," that while making an apparent showing, in spots, of revision downward, will yet be on the whole quite satisfactory to the trusts and of no appreciable benefit to the people. Between his good nature and his inability or reluctance to believe in the rascality of others he may be hoodwinked and won over to yielding acquiescence to what is after all an "atrocious concoction." The Sun suggests that the Aldrich duties are being fixed for the purpose of making some reductions in conference, and yet retaining duties in all important schedules about as high as

those of the Dingley law. This, it says, "will not satisfy the country, and should not satisfy Mr. Taft. For such an outcome as this it was not worth while to assemble congress in extra session and keep the whole country on the qui vive for months. And to prevent such an outcome we trust that the president will take such measures as his official position and his personal relations with individual members of congress lays open to him."

THE BALTIMORE paper's view of the situation is very probably correct throughout. It is incredible that Mr. Taft would sign the bill being framed by Aldrich. But he is not a vetoing president; he dislikes to disagree with congress or the leaders of his party, and he might sign a bill a little less monstrous than the Aldrich "concoction," yet that would be no appreciable improvement over the Dingley law.

THE CRATER LAKE DECISION

AS ENUNCIATED by Judge Galloway, the constitution of Oregon prohibits legislative aid for the Crater lake road, and a permanent injunction issues against disbursement of the appropriation. The possibility is that Judge Galloway is mistaken in what is the law. It is human to err, and even learned judges sometimes disagree. At least, in some points of his decision, a large part of the public will disagree with Judge Galloway. He characterizes the Crater lake project as "sentimental." Many persons of large horizon would call it "business." If some thousands of people annually should be attracted to Oregon, as they would be, by making Crater lake accessible, that would not be "sentimental," but "business."

If these visitors, impressed with Oregon's advantages, bought lands, homes and appliances and began to add to the state's wealth and importance, as they would, that would be "business." As a matter of fact, there is no more sentiment in the Crater lake project than in a cash register, and in denominating it as "sentimental," Judge Galloway is mistaken. The United States government is not "sentimental." It is a cold, calculating business establishment. It has spent over \$30,000 on the Crater lake project, a fact that not only fixes the Crater lake conception as a practical business enterprise, but gives to it the additional distinction of belonging not to Jackson, or Klamath county, or even to Oregon, but to the country. Judge Galloway holds the appropriation to be local and "special," and cites the Maxwell-Tillamook road case as proof. To a judicial mind there may be points of resemblance, but to the layman the Crater lake conception with its plan of capitalizing one of the most famous natural wonders of the world for the benefit of all Oregon is as widely different from the Tillamook case with its little road along the seashore as its pole is remote from the other. There are a thousand little roads along the seashore. There is but one Crater lake.

In support of his view Judge Galloway cites The Dalles and Sandy wagon road case in which the court said: "The general principle to be deduced from all the authorities seems to be this: that whenever an act of the legislature authorizes any public road or internal improvement to be made, or other act to be done, which in its nature is more beneficial to the community at large than to the inhabitants in the immediate locality of the road, or other internal improvements, such act is to be considered a public and not a special or local law." In this decision lies the full warrant, in the view of a layman, for the Crater lake appropriation. The benefit is for the community at large, to wit, all the people of Oregon. The Lewis and Clark fair was held in Portland, and the legislative appropriation was spent in Portland, but the purpose was to attract visitors to Oregon who would be pleased and settle in the state. The late legislature proposed to make Crater lake a perpetual Lewis and Clark fair, by its beauty as a wonder picture to draw people here to see, be pleased and settle. The principle in the two is exactly the same, and on a showing of fact rather than law, if the one was constitutional, so is the other.

THE TRUTH IS BEST

IT IS injurious to Oregon, says the morning paper, to say that Oregon is "bottled up," that it lacks railroad facilities, that therefore its development is retarded, that great areas are and will remain practically unsettled until railroads are built into them. The Journal, the probable object of the criticism, has a clear, constant record as a booster and not a knocker, but in such a matter as this it believes in telling the truth and telling it plainly. It does not believe in deceiving eastern people on this subject, and probably could not if it would. The situation for more than a decade has been lamentable, humiliating, shameful, and the united press of Oregon ought to have been roaring about it this decade back, if for no other purpose than to arouse the people of Oregon from their lethargy and prompt them to action in their own behalf—which they have now made some preparation to take unless railroads are soon built. But the Journal will also be fore-

most in announcing and rejoicing at the news of new railroad building, a little of which is now in progress, and more of which is apparently to be done soon. This paper cannot agree that the press for year after year and from one decade to another should keep silently silent under a great wrong to the state; but none can outdo it in heralding the news of even the partial righting of that wrong, and the betterment of conditions in this respect.

AN EMERGENCY HOSPITAL

THERE ARE still frequent demonstrations of the need of an emergency hospital in this city. Every year that passes without one makes this lack more painfully not to say shamefully apparent. Occasionally there is a flurry of talk about it, but nothing has been done. It may not be possible to establish a hospital this year now, on account of the lack of available funds, but in order that another year shall not pass without providing one, organizations and people of influence should speak out on this subject and voice this demand in no uncertain terms or tone, so that the authorities, as soon as possible, will act. The city requires money for many things, and can't get everything at once, or in any one year; but this matter has been delayed entirely too long already and must not be neglected for another year. Let it be impressed upon the council and mayor this summer and fall that just as soon as money for this purpose can be provided there must be an emergency hospital in the congested downtown district. To put this off any longer would be positively disgraceful to the city.

If the Republican leaders imagine that they can carry Aldrichism and the west too, they are very blind. The whole middle west press is bitterly denunciatory of the course of the party leaders on the tariff. Here, for example, is the staunchly Republican Des Moines Register and Leader saying: "It is a strange situation, surely, when a fight to retain the Dingley schedules can be heralded as a fight for free trade and foreign domination. It is a strange situation when the presidential campaign is being fought on the demand for a reduction from the Dingley schedules, will sit back and allow the senate committee increases to be voted by as bloodless a combination as ever plotted to steal a railroad or loot a bank, without raising a finger to sustain the men who are standing by his personal pledges and by the pledges made by him for the administration."

Last week representatives of ten cities and many districts in the Yakima valley met to consider an irrigation canal project by which it is proposed to irrigate 300,000 acres. With this and another project under consideration, and the United States projects under way, 1,600,000 acres, embracing portions of four counties, will be reclaimed. Consider for a moment the vast importance of this great work. The lands to be reclaimed are practically worthless and uninhabited. Reclaimed and irrigated, they will support probably 40,000 families, a population of 200,000 people. And what is being done in the Yakima valley in this respect can be done to a greater or less extent in many sections of Oregon. Reclamation of semi-arid lands wherever possible, and the irrigation of lands now more or less under cultivation, will in a few years double Oregon's population and products.

The Southern Pacific railroad is to be congratulated and commended by the public, all the way from Portland to San Francisco inclusive—and even far beyond these points—on the reduction of time for a trip between these cities by its new "Shasta Limited" trains and on the splendid trains themselves, one of which was on exhibition yesterday. This big improvement in its service will certainly be greatly appreciated.

It was a happy thought to provide automobiles in which to give the children, especially those of the poorer families, a ride to the public playgrounds today. A large part of older people's enjoyment properly consists in helping to make children happy, and it is needless to say that they will all be happy on account of this ride.

Portland has usually been fortunate in securing the voluntary services of good men—and one woman—for school directors, and never more so, as far as can be judged in advance, than on this occasion, in the election of Mr. R. L. Sabin. He is a business man of much ability and high character, and may be trusted to serve this great school district with fidelity and much usefulness.

The single tax principle so ably enunciated by Henry George is likely to get its first practical trial, at least to a considerable degree, not in the United States, his home country, but in England or in Germany, or in both. In England the budget presented by Lloyd George carries a radical land tax that is largely founded on the principles laid down by Henry George; and it was announced recently from Berlin that the government had officially communicated to the reichstag its approval of the taxation of the land for the purpose of raising local purposes. This method of taxation

is in fact in use now in many German cities. Henry George perceived and declared convincingly a great truth, and truth is hard to kill or suppress.

Referring to an editorial paragraph stating that whereas the Spokane crematory awhile ago was running behind several hundred dollars a month, whereas it now shows a surplus of about as much, Superintendent Daggett of the Portland crematory says the reason of this is that latterly Spokane makes an incineration charge to the contributors of garbage, in addition to the charge for hauling it away, so that the producers of garbage make the crematory, one in Spokane a month, more than self-sustaining. He says further that at an incineration charge of 50 cents a ton in this city a suitable crematory would clear \$5000 or \$6000 a year above operating expenses. The question arises, however, whether it would not be more equitable to require all the taxpayers rather than the garbage producers alone to pay for incineration and provide a surplus for the city treasury.
