Delight Escapes Conviction.—Andrew B. Delight was arrested on the charge of embezzling \$1500 from the grand court of Oregon of the Foresters of America last night, after having been considered his case for about three hours. He was tried before Judge Cleveland, the arguments being concluded yesterday afternoon. Delight's story in explanation of the alleged shortages in his accounts pointed out that the state was not saved him, for he told where much of the money had gone and apparently convinced the jury of his sincerity in denying the order to his own use, even though he might have been careless in his book-keeping at times.

Many Troubles for Ooley.—C. L. Ooley, a laborer of 408 Elm street, came to grief last night when he started out to subdue the neighborhood in which he lives with an exhibition of physical prowess, and later ended at the Good Samaritan hospital with a compound fracture of the right arm. Leaving a north end saloon at 10 o'clock, Ooley went home and for the benefit of his mate and three children, exhibited the prowess of a trusty right arm. Later in a tussle with Patrolman R. T. Steward, Ooley fell and twisted his arm, breaking it in two places. Ooley, as soon as he is in condition, will be called to answer to a charge of disorderly conduct.

Mrs. Mullen Objects to Allowance.—Miss Clinton Mullen, who claims to be the only heir of Richard Clinton as an adopted daughter, has petitioned the county court to revoke an allowance of \$125 per month to her foster mother, Mrs. E. M. Clinton. In April she petitioned to have the widow of Clinton removed as administrator of the estate. The widow was trying to shut her out as an heir. Mrs. Clinton resigned the place before the matter came to hearing, but an order allowing her \$125 per month for support was left unchanged. Mrs. Mullen now states that this sum cannot longer be paid from the estate except by sale of real estate, and that this should not be done, because her foster mother owns no real estate worth more than \$15,000, besides real property in Ohio. E. B. Dufur is now administrator of the estate.

Boy Shooter is Exonerated.—Winifred Yates, who is about 14 years of age, was exonerated from any suspicion that he intentionally shot Raymond Higgins in the basement of the Stephens school after an investigation in the juvenile court yesterday. This was the second hearing in the case. Higgins and Yates were students at the Stephens school. Yates was showing his playmate a revolver, which was sure was not loaded. It was discharged and the bullet passed through the arm of Higgins. Judge Brownish decided that while no action should be taken, Yates should be made a ward of the court. He was placed on probation.
