NEW SUSPECTS IN SIGEL CASE

One Under Arrest and the Other on Ship for San Francisco.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
 New York, June 25.—Two new suspects were found today in the search for Leon Ling, the Chinese accused of killing Elsie Sigel. One was at New York, Long Island, and the other aboard the steamship Arizona, which was en route from Hampton Roads to San Francisco.
 The Chinese at New York answers the description of the fugitive and he was brought to the city for identification.
 The other "Ling" was found through the roll of the Arizona's crew. He succeeded in getting out of port without attracting any notice. There is no wireless aboard the vessel and unless she is overtaken by a government tug nothing further will be heard of the Chinese until the Arizona puts into port.
 Letters to Two Chinese.
 That Elsie Sigel wrote to both Chu Gain and Leon Ling in terms of affection and that she tried to make sure he was her true love is indicated by two letters found in Ling's trunk. Both letters are dated June 7, the day before the girl was murdered.
 The notes were placed in the hands of Assistant District Attorney Ward and he addressed to Chu Gain. "I don't want you to feel badly because Willie was here tonight. You know that I love you and you always don't mind Willie. Although he is

Notes From the Labor World

The International Printing and Pressmen and Assistants' union will meet in convention at Omaha, Neb., next Monday.

Bricklayers and masons of Akron, Ohio, have signed up a new scale of prices with an increase in wages of 40 cents a day.

At the Union Printers' home at Colorado Springs, Colo., a library has been established which is one of the largest organization libraries in the country.

The Boston Coal Teamsters and Handlers union has elected a committee to make recommendations for rules for the establishment of a permanent local sick benefit system.

President Gompers will sail from New York on the steamer Baltic, on June 23, to study the sociological, economic and industrial conditions of European labor at short range.
 The New York Central Federated union recently adopted a motion granting full privileges of voice and vote, to the delegates of the Women's Trade Union League in the central body.
 Daniel J. Keefe of Detroit, commissioner of immigration, has been elected a delegate to the International convention in July by the Chicago Vessel Union, leaders of whom, of which he is a member, but other locals around the lakes are

determined to unseat him as a delegate, declaring that he is seeking to manipulate the affairs of the union for political purposes.
 At the session of the International Typographical union in St. Joseph, Mo., next August, the delegates from Minneapolis will make a strong fight to have the convention of 1910 held in that city.
 Returns relating to more than 600,000 members of British trade unions show that the average percentage of members returning is 50 per cent. In 1907, as compared with 37 in 1907.

The Florida house of representatives has passed the Farries child labor bill, which makes it unlawful for children under 14 years of age to work in factories, mines, etc., during the months when schools are in session.

Cumberland, England, miners have agreed to accept a reduction in wages following upon similar reductions in Durham and Northumberland. The engineers in the Ashton-under-Lyne district have also agreed to a reduction.

New York Typographical union, No. 6, is developing a plan to erect a building to be known as the Typographical temple, at a cost of \$250,000, to be used as headquarters for that and other organizations in New York.

In Pittsburg, Pa., in some of the largest shoe stores salesmen are not allowed to sit down during working hours, whether busy or not, and they must use their knees, not a stool, as a rest when facing a customer's shoes.

J. C. Balhorn, international president of the Painters union, is in New York at present, where he is attending to arbitration work intended to bring about a reorganization of the craft in that city and put the locals on a firm footing.

Galveston, Texas trade unionists have two candidates in the field for membership in the city board under the commission form of municipal government. The old board has been hiring Mexican labor at \$1.25 a day, while the city scale for labor is \$2 per day.

The voters favoring the system of direct legislation are organizing the state of Washington with a view to pledging all candidates for the legislature to support the initiative, referendum and recall. They are to hold a state convention at Seattle in August.

Children from 8 to 15 years of age are employed in the sulphur mines of Calumet, Mich., to carry the mined sulphur to the surface of the earth. The occupation is very unhealthy, and the children, after two or three years' service, become complete physical wrecks.

In San Francisco the union labor party leaders have nominated P. H. McCarthy, president of the Building Trades council, for mayor; Thomas Finn for sheriff, and H. L. Mulvey for county clerk. These are the three principal offices to be filled at the coming municipal election in that city.
 The Nottingham, England, lace makers' strike ended recently, the men agreeing to resume work. The employers conceded the terms demanded, under protest, stipulating that a joint meeting of employers and operatives be held to consider the matters in dispute.
 The committee of unemployed of the San Francisco building trades council reported recently that when appointed there were 21,000 unemployed in the city, one third members of crafts af-

filled with the council. Since that time the number of unemployed has been reduced to 15,000.
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Politics and Politicians

Hilary A. Herbert of Alabama, who was secretary of the party under President Cleveland, has been selected to act as one of the arbiters in the settlement of the strike differences between the Georgia railroad and its firemen.

Some lively debates are anticipated in the Washington legislature, which meets in extraordinary session this week to consider the situation arising from the alleged mismanagement of certain departments of the state government.

Virginia Republicans, when they meet in convention at Newport, News next month, purpose to adopt a platform along lines of reform never before known in their state. Local option, tax reform and a decrease in public expenditures are some of the planks to be inserted.

The Wisconsin assembly has named an investigation committee and empowered it to investigate the conduct of all the state departments under the La Follette regime, particularly the charges relating to the use of game wardens at state expense to do political work for La Follette's followers.

COINS DO BETTER ON INTEREST THAN AS PART OF COLLECTION

Coins put out at interest will earn more than those saved for souvenir collections, says Professor Byron N. Rooks, expert authority on coinage and counterfeits, who is in Portland from Washington, D. C.
 "Some of the coins I see were hoarded from the latter part of the eighteenth century. They are worth now, some of them, several hundred dollars. But those same coins put out at interest would have earned more than \$1000 in the same length of time. As I grow older in the business I can see that as a matter of profit collecting coins and putting them where they will draw interest for you is the best business."
 At the same time Professor Rooks has a collection of old and curious coins that he treasures highly and he could hardly be induced to part with them.
 "The motto 'In God We Trust' has caused the greatest flurry of recent years among coin collectors," said Professor Rooks yesterday. "As a matter of fact, the motto is of comparatively recent origin. A young man brought me a \$20 gold piece of 1857 the other day, calling attention to the fact that it did not have the motto stamped upon it, and thinking for this reason that the coin must be very valuable. As a matter of fact none of the coins minted at that time bear the motto.
 "The first coins struck by the United States bore no motto. In 1796 the inscription 'E Pluribus Unum' was placed on the coins of this country and was continued until 1834. From the last date until 1866 it was omitted, but it was during 1866 that 'In God We Trust' was first placed on coins for general circulation. However, a few pattern pieces having the motto 'God Our Trust' on them were struck in 1863. The motto 'In God We Trust' after first being placed on our coins in 1866, was omitted on the St. Gaudens design, until it was replaced by order of congress during the latter part of 1908. It will continue to be the motto for our coins."

Under the provisions of the new primary law in Maryland it will cost United States Senator Isidor Rayner of that State \$17,000 to be reelected in 1911, notwithstanding the fact that he probably will be unopposed. He has declined to consent to be a candidate for a third term as governor, which his friends deemed necessary in order to keep him in the limelight until the presidential election in 1912. The belief among the governor's most intimate friends is that he would prefer a judicial position to any other public office to which he might be elected.
