NEWS FORECAST
OF COMING WEEK

Big Strike Possible—Im-
portant Laws Effective
—Sporting Events.

Washington, June 26.—President Taft plans to leave Washington Saturday afternoon on his special train for the celebration of the centennial of the signing of the Declaration of Independence. The president will be accompanied by James Bryce, the British ambassador, and the French ambassador, Jules Jusserand, and the ambassador from France, and military and naval attaches.

Unless an unexpected agreement is reached, 10,000 skilled workmen, members of the Amalgamated Association of Iron, Steel and Tin Workers, who are employed by the American Sheet and Plate company at Pittsburgh will go on strike Wednesday night, at which time the "open shop" order of the company becomes effective. Many unskilled workmen will also be affected.

Bank Guaranty Laws.
A bank deposit guaranty law, a copy of the celebrated Oklahoma law, with some modifications, will come into operation in Kansas. Nearly 800 state banks will come under the law. The national banks, as a measure of protection, have already taken steps to form among themselves a deposit guaranty and surety corporation.

On the same date the bank guaranty law fathered by William J. Bryan will become effective in Nebraska. It is a similar guaranty as distinguished from the Oklahoma law, where all of the assets of all of the banks are back of the guaranty. In Nebraska only a small portion will be utilized.

Tennessee Goes Dry.
A prohibition law passed by the last session of the Tennessee legislature over the veto of Governor Patterson will come into force Thursday and will have the effect of virtually putting that state in the "dry" column. The chief point of the law is the prohibition of the sale of intoxicating liquor within four miles of a schoolhouse. This will necessarily close the saloons in all cities, and Memphis will have the distinction of becoming the largest city in the world where the sale of liquor is prohibited. Six months hence another prohibition measure is to come into force in Tennessee. This measure will prohibit the manufacture of all intoxicants in the state, and consequently will result in closing all of the breweries and distilleries there.

In North Dakota an interesting measure aimed at the liquor traffic is also to become effective next week. This law requires that all liquor shipped into the state must be inspected by the state pure food commissioner. Only druggists are authorized to sell liquor, and soliciting agents and C. O. D. shipments will be barred.

The American Woman Suffrage association will meet in Seattle, and from present indications it will be the most important as well as the largest gathering ever held by that organization.

In the World of Sports.
Lovers of aquatic sports will have two great events to occupy their attention. The annual race between the Yale and Harvard crews will take place at New London, Thursday, and the next day the varsity and freshman crews of Pennsylvania, Columbia, Wisconsin, Cornell and Syracuse will compete in the annual regatta at the Intercollegiate Rowing association at Poughkeepsie.

Of interest to Americans will be the big two days' celebration at Yokohama to mark the fiftieth anniversary of the opening of that port to foreign trade. A leading feature of the program will be the erection of a bronze statue of Commodore Perry, the American commander who made the bay of Japan that resulted in the opening of that country to foreign commerce.

ENTER ACROBATS FOR SALE TRADE

Authorities Discover New
Method of Importing
Women Into America.

Chicago, June 26.—Federal prosecutors have not relaxed their vigilance in checking importations of foreign white slaves notwithstanding the United States supreme court's decision, knocking out the third section of federal immigration statutes that apply to white slavery. Within the last few months, according to the United States district attorney's office here, no less than 45 persons and 1,000 of their bewildered alien victims have been deported. Opening of the circus season, however, has required special vigilance at ports of entry and interior cities in regard to the acrobatic and equestrian families who come from abroad, for the privilege grand actors to enter the United States has become the last and best device of the white slave traffickers to violate the federal laws without being caught.

Resorts to Tricks.
"Acrobatic families" one sees do dinky things while the band plays are not necessarily real families, says a bulletin issued by the woman's world's committee on legislation against white slavery. The younger ones being quite as likely to be apprentices "bound out" to the master to learn circus stunts as the progeny of the man who is the head of the family. The young devils respond to very different names in the dressing rooms. This fact is so well known to the authorities that bringing girls in as acrobats has been a loophole for white slave traffickers, although they tried it so unsuccessfully that it is now doing real work, for the first time in his life, in Fort Leavenworth with two years more ahead of him and also payment of a fine of \$2500. Assistant United States District Attorney Harry A. Parkin of this city recently explained the workings of the acrobatic scheme in an address to the State Attorneys' association of Illinois.

"He (Lehr) to avoid being caught at New York by the immigration authorities," he said, "had printed large posters about three feet long and about a foot and a half wide containing pictures of two women and a man clothed in the costumes of acrobats. With these he had certain names placed upon the bill, and the advertising revealed the fact or suggested the fact that these impersonators were acrobats bound for the United States, and of course were not subject to the immigration laws. He put the bills in his trunk and carried them in his valise. He got through New York safely with the two women and brought them to Chicago. They were sold into two houses of prostitution, and last December the fact of their importation was revealed. He was extradited the defendant from San Francisco, secured the confession of the man who had actually done the importing, and sentenced the defendant to two and a half years in the federal penitentiary at Fort Leavenworth, and fined him \$2500. The man who actually did the importing returned to France within two months after he had brought these two women to the United States, gathered together four more French women and brought them to New York; but fortunately he was recognized, captured, and the women were taken and deported, and he is now serving a term of four years in the federal penitentiary at Atlanta, Ga.

Import Women.
"There is and has been a systematic attempt, and a successful attempt in most instances, to bring to this country foreign women," Mr. Parkin said. "We have prosecuted cases here involving women from Norway, from Sweden, from Russia, from Poland, from England, from France, from Italy and in one or two instances from Austria-Hungary."

"The statute under which the United States district attorney's office was operated was one which was passed originally in 1875. At that time it simply provided that anyone who brought an immoral person into the United States for immoral purposes. Again, in 1903, the law was amended and a section was added not only prohibiting the importation of women, but also the importation of the importation. Again, on February 20, 1907, congress enacted the third section of that statute, the one which has recently been declared unconstitutional by the supreme court. That law attempted to prosecute men not only for importing and keeping women, but also for supporting or harboring (irrespective of the intent) any woman who had been imported within three years after she shall have entered the United States, shall be deemed guilty of a felony." In other words, congress attempted to put around the women who come to the country a protection during three years, the first three years of their life in the United States. The supreme court has declared that congress has no such power, so that unfortunately we are now without any law to protect women who are compelled in every instance to prove either the importation or the harboring by some one who had something to do with the original importation.

Want New Law.
There now is under serious consideration and the scrutiny of constitutional lawyers, a new federal law, framed on different lines and under the interstate commerce act. As drawn by Assistant State's Attorney Clifford G. Parkin, it is as follows:

"Be it enacted by the senate and house of representatives of the United States of America, in congress assembled, that whoever shall procure, entice or encourage any female person to leave one of the states of the United States of America to go into any other state in the United States of America for the purpose of prostitution or to become an inmate of a house of prostitution, or to enter any place where prostitution is practiced or allowed, or shall attempt to procure or entice any female person to leave one of the states of the United States of America to go into any other state for the purpose of prostitution, or to become an inmate of a house of prostitution, or to enter any place where prostitution is practiced or allowed, or shall receive, or give or
