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Baptist Denomination Be- comes an Incorporation by the Action of Northern Baptist Convention This Morning

With a dignity and harmony that inspired the respect of every beholder, a revolution in the methods of the Baptist denomination was accomplished by the Northern Baptist convention this morning. Issues that have been the subject of contention and have threatened denominational disruption for 100 years were settled forever in the brief space of an hour.

History, as made with twentieth century speed and accuracy. Judge Edward S. Clinch, chairman of the committee on legal relations, and President Harry Pratt Judson were the big men of the session. The feature of the convention, also counted the most important provision for government proposed in Baptist history, was Judge Clinch's report. be specified. The names of the missionary organizations are changed to read "society" in each instance, making more apparent that they are auxiliary members of the central body.

Central Body Established.
The action of the Baptists this morning in accepting Judge Clinch's report makes the Northern Baptist convention the great central body of the whole denomination as it is represented in 35 states, including the District of Columbia.

The convention hereafter will have supervisory and regulating power over that now become sub-organizations. It will have charge of expenditures, bearing the receiptable for all contributions and apportioning sums for the support of various departments of the work.

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BINGEN WINS IN FIGHT FOR NAME
