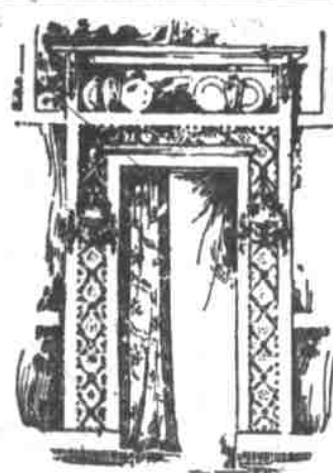

INCOME TAXERS NOT IMPLICABLE**Advocates of Corporation Tax Predict Conversion to the Taft Plan.**By John E. Lathrop.
Washington, June 28.—Although the original income tax advocates persistently allege that the net earnings corporation tax was conceived as a measure to sidetrack the income tax, yet signs are visible here that much of the expected opposition will disappear, and that the amendment will be adopted by the senate and accepted by the house. Its opponents will continue to urge that it does not tax those enormously wealthy citizens who could best afford to bear the burden of government support, and that it is outrageously discriminatory because it taxes corporate owners of a given business while permitting the private owner of exactly the same character of business to escape.

Senator Bourne declares it will be the entering wedge to split the log of corporation abuse, and that great reforms will flow from it. He avers Aldrich was forced by Taft to make the amendment, a thing he did not want, simply because the income tax was to him more objectionable; but Bourne says the country will adopt the amendment to the constitution, for an income tax, so that both reforms will be adopted as direct results of the president's move in forcing Aldrich to his terms.

Chamberlain's Attitude.
Senator Chamberlain continues to object to the plan to substitute the net earnings tax for the original Cummins-Bailey income amendment to the tariff bill, but after he has voted for the Cummins-Bailey amendment, which seems

destined to certain defeat, he will probably support the net earnings amendment.

This amendment does not meet the demands of the country," he said. "It fails to tax those enormous fortunes based on bonds or sources of revenue other than stock in corporations. It is discriminatory also, in that one business, owned by a corporation, will be taxed, while a competing concern across the street, owned by individuals, will go untaxed. I think it has many good points, and under the circumstances it may be a step in the direction of those reforms which are expected by the people." Bourne, Piles, Jones and Dixon hold similar views, and probably all will pursue the course indicated in Chamberlain's case.

The allegation that Taft only a few days ago conceived the net earnings tax scheme is now said to be unfounded. It seems well established that the president had thought of it, even before Congress convened in special session, as a measure adequate to the demands of the country, in part at least.

KAISER'S INDISCRETION CAUSE OF GOSSIP(United Press Leased Wire.)
Berlin, June 28.—Diplomats are gossiping over another of the kaiser's indiscretions, from which, however, Prince Bulow succeeded in extricating him without letting the masses of Germans know that anything had gone wrong.

It was during his majesty's recent visit to Corfu that the mishap occurred. The Turkish-Greek dispute over the ownership of the island of Crete had not been settled, and the kaiser, who is the Greek crown prince's brother-in-law, promised it. He kept his word so far, pleading the Greek cause at Vienna and Rome was concerned but when he got back to Berlin Chancellor Bulow, horrified, pointed out to him that such a course would hopelessly compromise Germany's vast interests in Turkey. So Wilhelm dropped his Greek campaign as quickly as he could, completely stultifying himself with Emperor Franz Josef and King Victor and deeply offending King George.

So far as Germany is concerned, to save the kaiser's face as far as possible the matter is being allowed to drift. If matters come to a head, however, the fatherland, which has little to gain from Greece and a great deal from Turkey, will probably take the latter's side.

Letter Carriers Elect.(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Eugene, Or., June 28.—At the State Letter Carriers' association convention in Eugene Saturday night the following officers were elected: W. F. Daugherty, Portland, president; Otto Graham, Astoria, vice president; E. J. Burroughs, Portland, secretary treasurer; A. D. Welch, Salem, and N. M. Clem, Eugene, executive board; C. C. Henderson, Eugene, delegate at large to the national convention at St. Paul in September; P. P. Holm, Portland, state national vice president. The meeting ended with a big banquet at which Mayor J. D. Matlock and other prominent citizens were guests of honor.

YOUNGSPRECKELS EXPLAINS ACTION**Thinks Graft Prosecution Has Been Doing Cheap Politics.**

San Francisco, June 28.—Political circles are in a turmoil here today following an attack on James D. Phelan by the Call, the charges being that the "people's ballot" sent out by the good government league campaign committee bore marks under the stamps on the envelopes by which a straw voter's identity could be determined.

In an interview in today's Chronicle, alleged to have been given out by John D. Spreckels Jr., at San Rafael yesterday, the Chronicle says: "John D. Spreckels Jr. was interviewed in San Rafael yesterday and his father at Coronado, relative to the candidacy of James D. Phelan for mayor. John D. Spreckels Jr. said: 'What the Call's article said this morning meets with my views. I don't believe my father knew anything of the article before its publication, but if what is stated in the article is true, he will certainly not go back on it or support men of that calibre.'"

Once Attacked Phelan.
"To the question asked whether or not the Call had been loyal and favorable to Phelan in the past, Spreckels said that as his memory served him he remembered that the Call had an article once charging James D. Phelan with a felony and stating that if he got his just punishment he would be wearing stripes in San Quentin. And this is also my own opinion in every respect," added Spreckels.

"Inasmuch as Rudolph Spreckels' private secretary was present in the room where the postage stamps were doctored, according to the Call's own story, it seems to me that my uncle could not have been wholly unaware of what was going on in Phelan's political headquarters."

"I can state positively that the Call will not support any particular person or organization whose aims are not dictated by unselfish intentions and I am quite satisfied that the Call will certainly knock the bottom out of the Good Government league, and it does not hurt me to say that I will never get my vote or endorsement."

Will Back Up Call.

"I am certain and positive that my father will stand behind everything the Call's story stated or implied, to the fullest limits."

"As long as the graft prosecution acts honorably and carries out its intentions the Call will stand behind it. When it goes beyond its province, however, and becomes a political tool, I hardly believe that my father will give it his support in that endeavor."

"The exposure by the papers of Phelan's postage stamp methods will certainly knock the bottom out of the Good Government league, and it does not hurt me to say that I will never get my vote or endorsement."

"Well, I don't know that, but what-

ever it may be, I know that the management of the Call is not to be trusted."

At Phelan's home it was stated here today that he had gone to the country and would not be back until tomorrow.

JACK VERNON, ACTOR, SHOT; WILL RECOVER(United Press Leased Wire.)
Los Angeles, June 28.—Physicians at the receiving hospital announced today that Jack Vernon, the Grand theatre actor who was shot during the performance of a melodrama Saturday night, will recover. The presence of a bullet in the supposed blank cartridge remains unexplained.

The shot which struck Vernon in the right hand and plowed its way to his shoulder, was fired from across the stage and narrowly missed the heads of several persons who were on the boards during the scene.

As Vernon lay on the operating table at the hospital, while the anaesthetic was being administered, he implored the surgeon:

"Say, don't let the reporters get this. If you do, I'll always be Three Fingers Jack on the stage and that wouldn't help my game a bit."

STEPHEN FISHER KILLED BY TRAIN(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Gervais, Or., June 28.—Stephen Fisher, a farm hand, was killed Sunday morning by a train and mangled almost beyond recognition. He was 42 years old. He had no known relatives here. It is conjectured that he was struck by a train No. 13, which passes here at 3 a. m.

A tramp discovered the body and brought the news to town. The accident happened half a mile south of Gervais. The coroner did not hold an inquest.

Thorne With Others Killed Man for \$20,000 30 Years Ago.**(United Press Leased Wire.)
Nevada City, Cal., June 28.—Charles H. Thorne, one of the most notorious criminals in the early history of California, today made application for parole. The application was published in a local paper and caused surprise, as it was not thought Thorne would have the temerity to ask for clemency.

Thorne was sent to San Quentin nearly 20 years ago. He was convicted of one of the most celebrated robberies and murders in the history of the state. He was one of three robbers who held up the Eureka stage, September 1, 1879, killing William Cummings, a banker of Moore's Flat. Cummings had \$20,000 in gold bullion with him and he fought for it. In the melee he was killed. The robbers escaped but were afterwards captured in various parts of the country. Thorne was tried and sent to San Quentin for life. He is believed to have been the one who fired the fatal shot. After being in San Quentin a few years he was one of four men who managed to smuggle in firearms for the purpose of making a jail break. The plan was snatched at the time but later he did make his escape and worked his way east, where he remained until he was recaptured by detectives. It is thought Thorne will not be paroled.

Elbert, Chehalis' first baseman, concealed the ball, thinking to tag Boyle. Instead, Boyle snatched the ball from Stebbick's mitt when the umpire was not looking, tossed it into the tall grass along a nearby fence, and ran around the bases to the amusement of many and the chagrin of others.
