...easily satisfied in those respects, I did not, nor do I now, care.

In matters of public concern, the duty of an official is to the people at all times, and there can be no divided allegiance on his part without perfidy.

Private corporations and others who deal with the public should work definitely toward a single end, making no mistakes, and frequently do not scruple at the methods which they employ to accomplish their results, and as a rule they are more ably repented than are the people, who are usually divided in their purposes, and at times but illy served.

This condition of affairs costs the people of this city millions of dollars in one way or another, gives rise to most of the evils in our government, and will continue to exist until such time as they are only those to serve them who are entirely devoted to their interests. Corporate interests and faithless servants acting in conjunction cost more than all other expenditures combined.

Worked for City. So far as it lay in my power, to relieve the people from the drain upon its substance which comes from these fees, and quite frequently I have found it impossible to do so. No man alone can remedy the condition, and about all that he can do is to call attention to it as it exists and to block the execution of as much of it as possible, and frequently the best and only viable method which he has in his power is the undignified proceeding of balking and refusing to act.

In closing I wish to express my deep obligation and my thanks to those members of the different boards and other officials who have assisted and cooperated with me at such a loss of time and money to themselves. I also wish to express my appreciation of honor which you have bestowed upon me.

Several weeks ago to take a trip to Europe. Since the resignation of Messrs. Peery, Wilson and Sablin from the board last year Mayor Lane has gotten ten months of the remaining year spent in acquiring land and preparing for the final evolution of the Olmstead plan of landscape architecture. The members of this board are Dr. J. B. Wilson, Ion Lewis and Dav Rafferty.

The city water board, consisting of Dr. C. H. Rafferty, who has served the city for 17 years, J. D. Hart, R. B. Lamson and W. G. Allen, will retire after today also. To these gentlemen is due the credit of getting under way the construction of the second pipe line to Bull Run. This will cost \$2,000,000. The meter system, an untried experiment here, was also established by this board.

The city health board is not one of those which go with the Lane administration. The health board will hold a regular meeting tomorrow. It is understood, however, that most of its members will then retire. They are: Dr. R. C. Yonney, Dr. G. E. Wilson, Dr. A. J. Giesy, City Health Officer Dr. E. C. Pohl has already resigned. The appointment of Dr. C. H. Wheeler to succeed Dr. Pohl has already been announced by Mr. Simon.

JAP DEDICATION AT A.-Y.-P. ON JULY 21

Seattle, June 30.—The dedication of the Japanese building at the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition, July 21, will be one of the notable events of the fair. The building has been in use since the opening day, and the exhibits are all in place, but the dedicatory ceremonies have not been held.

Hajime Ota, commissioner general from Japan to the exposition, will be the host on that occasion. The exercises will consist of an address by Judge Thomas Burke, who will introduce Mr. Ota.

Ota will then speak for the Japanese commission, and Tachi Takesawa, director of exhibits, will speak on behalf of the exhibitors in the Japanese building. President J. E. Chilberg will represent the exposition, and Mayor Miller the city of Seattle.

An invitation has been sent to Governor Hay to deliver an address at the dedicatory exercises.

A reception will be held for 1000 invited guests, among whom will be the exposition officers, city officers, men and women of Seattle and commissioners of states and counties at the fair.

The Japanese building will be elaborately decorated with flowers and flags of the nations of the world.

Walla Walla, Wash., June 30.—The strict enforcement of the new law prohibiting the smoking of cigarettes has been productive of much lamentation by those addicted to the habit in this city and has resulted in an ingenious scheme to elude the watchful sheriff. OLEQUA MAN SHOT IN STREET FRACAS

Chehalis, Wash., June 30.—Ed Bertrand is near to death at St. Helens hospital in Chehalis from a bullet wound inflicted late last night at Little Falls, Lewis county, by Alex Dean, a logger employed by the Stillwater Lumber company. Bertrand does not know how the shooting occurred, owing to his intoxicated condition when it happened. Three shots were fired, but one of which took effect, passing through Bertrand's intestines, apparently. The gun used was a .25 calibre revolver. It was between 9 and 10 o'clock when the shooting occurred in front of Niemann's saloon. Bertrand, who is the proprietor of the hotel at Olequa, had gone to Little Falls yesterday, and had been drinking heavily. There were no direct eye witnesses to the affair, so far as has been learned.
