LANE ASKS TO TAKE BACK CONTRACT

board this morning requesting that body to rescind its action by which the city accepted the bid of the Buffalo-Pitts company for a steam roller.

The bid of the company was \$3250 and was higher than the price made by other roller companies, but after a test of the various machines City Engineer Taylor recommended the one manufactured by the Buffalo-Pitts people.

While the mayor's letter has no fault to find with the roller, it states that the contract should be rescinded because P. E. Sullivan, a member of the executive board, was offered "inducements" to award the contract. Following is the brief communication of the mayor:

"To the Honorable Executive Board, Gentlemen—Having been informed by Mr. Sullivan, one of your members, that a representative of the Buffalo-Pitts Steam Roller company had offered him inducements to award a contract to that company in the matter of the purchase of a steam roller by this city, I would respectfully request that the order made by you that a contract be entered into with that company be rescinded.

The letter will be presented to the executive board at its last session this afternoon, and there is no doubt that the mayor's request will be granted. At the meeting the board will also take up some other matters, the outcome of which may prove to be a shock to some of the city officials. While it is generally known that the sentiments of the mayor and the board are all in favor of dismissing Fire Chief David Campbell, it has been thought that they will take no such radical action though they believe Campbell's dismissal would be a good thing for the city.

SEARCHERS FAIL TO FIND BOY'S CORPSE

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Prineville, June 30.—Reports from searching parties dragging the river below the Cove orchard for the recovery of the body of the 12-year-old son of G. W. Kider, state that after 48 hours' search there is little hope for the recovery of the boy.

An eye witness to the tragedy says the boy and his father had crossed the river in a small row boat and were fishing from the west side of the stream. In order to get a better cast, the little fellow jumped into the boat and was casting into the center of the stream the boat being tied with about 12 feet of rope.

In some manner the boat came loose from its moorings and when noticed by his father the boy and the boat were well toward the center of the stream, moving rapidly toward a fall in the river. In fact, it was the fall that prevented the father from reaching the boat just above the fall, but being exhausted, overturned the boat in his attempt to get aboard. The body of the little fellow was never seen again. The search is kept up today by 75 men and boys.

HENEY DUE IN PORTLAND TONIGHT

Auto Bearing San Francisco's Graft Prosecutor Passes Through Drain Without Stopping at 11:15 This Morning.

Excerpt From Journal Correspondent's Interview With Heney at Roseburg.

"If the Hermann case comes to trial, will you be the one to prosecute it?" asked the interviewer.
"I don't know," replied Heney. "Two months ago I received a letter from the attorney general asking me to go ahead with the Hermann case and other land cases on the federal docket at Portland, but I haven't answered yet. My future plans depend entirely upon the developments in the San Francisco cases."

Local attorneys' comment shows the general opinion to be that Hermann will never be tried.

Drain, Or., June 30.—The automobile bearing Francis J. Heney and wife, Dr. Beardsby and J. C. McCarty, Heney's bodyguard, passed through Drain at 11:15 this morning. The party did not stop. They expect to reach Portland this evening.

transact no business whatever while in the north, being merely on a pleasure trip. He is accompanied by Dr. Beardsby, J. C. McCarty, his body guard and chauffeur, besides his wife. This wife left the party at Grants Pass and came to this city on the train to avoid the rough road through Cow Creek canyon. Mr. Heney said that yesterday was the most pleasant day of his journey so far, and that he had passed through some of the most beautiful country he had ever had the pleasure of seeing. He looks to be in the best of health.

Answers Questions Freely.

Mr. Heney answered all questions freely, hesitating at none. "Will the recent decision of the California supreme court affect your attitude in regard to the race for district attorney of San Francisco county?" Mr. Heney was asked.

"It most certainly shall not," he said. "I am in that race to stay."

"And you expect to be elected?"

"I have no doubt of it at all. I am sure of being elected 2 to 1."

The great prosecutor spoke with emphasis and gave notice that nothing would daunt him in his efforts to effect the regeneration of San Francisco.

When asked as to whether the recent decision of the California court would stand, Mr. Heney simply smiled and said he was not expressing any opinion at this date, not having read any newspapers for several days. When asked in regard to the recent attacks upon James D. Phelan, in San Francisco, Mr. Heney refused to talk, saying he was uninterested in the particulars and did not desire to discuss them at this time.

The Binger Hermann Trial.

"I can positively assure you," said Heney, "that if the Binger Hermann trial is not taken up this year it will not be taken up at all. But it is my intention to take it up this year. I am not positive on what date."

NEW BRANCH FOR ST. PAUL RAILROAD

Seattle, June 30.—With the election of H. R. Williams, president of the Chicago, Milwaukee & Puget Sound railroad, to the office of president of the Tacoma Eastern railroad the ownership of the Tacoma line is authentically placed in the list of branch lines of the Milwaukee system. It gives the Milwaukee access to rich timber districts and coal mines.

Announcement is made that the road will be maintained as a separate and distinct corporation under the corporate name Tacoma Eastern, as heretofore.

What the Milwaukee paid for the mountain line and its terminal in Tacoma, including 30 acres of water front tide lands is not stated, but is known to have been something more than \$2,000,000. This line has about 92 miles of track and extends to Glen Cove in the Cowitz valley.

Wager Almost Costs Life.

Bolinas, Cal., June 30.—A discussion arising over the harrowing experience of Stanley Franklin, the young artist who narrowly escaped death in the treacherous Bolinas channel Saturday, resulted yesterday in a wager between Nellie Adams, daughter of W. N. Adams, a pioneer resident of this city, and a girl friend, which almost cost Miss Adams her life.

The tide in the channel was unusually low and Miss Adams wagered with her friend that she could wade across. About half way between the shores she suddenly sank from sight. Coming to the surface she struggled vainly against the strong tide that swept her toward the sea.

A fisherman whose boat was anchored near the mouth of the bay hurried to the rescue and brought the unconscious young woman to the shore. She was resuscitated after an hour's heroic work.
